It seems that dry weather creates many problems. In dry years the grasshopper count always seems to increase and it appears that we are in for another heavy infestation in Wheeler County. The "Grasshopper Adult Survey," which was conducted in the fall of 1966 revealed that two-thirds of Wheeler County has eight or more grasshoppersper square yard. his population is as heavy as any in the United States.

nsects and a rapid growing fungus that is deadly to grasshoppers could reduce this count. Of course we can't depend on any of these factors, especially the heavy rains after the grasshoppers hatch. In fact we are beginning to wonder if it is every going to shower.

Grasshoppers are much easily controlled if the hatchng beds are sprayed soon after the hoppers are hatched and before they spread to other greas






