MUSTANGS WIN 16-14

Villard Hunter and Tommy Wiley knocked down McLeans Raymond Baker a yard shy of the goal line on a third period two point conversion attempt Friday night allowing Wheeler Mustangs to take a 16-14 victory in an important 2-A showdown. What may eventually turn out to be the biggest single defensive play the Mustangs have executed all year occurred immediately following a scintillating 85 yard pass and run play involving McLean quarterback Joel McCarty and split end Randy Hess. For McLean it was a particularly frustrating defeat. Both teams managed to

match scores in the first half despite three fumbles and a pass interception. Neither team was successful in advancing the ball on its first possession. But after taking the ball on their own 37 following a short McLean punt, the Mustangs drove to the Tiger 35 yard line before a Vanpool fumble ended the threat. McLean unable to move on the ground, attempted its only first half pass on its ensuing possession but Wheeler Safety David Jamison alertly picked off the errant aerial and scampered 35 yards for the game's first touchdown. The tigers, obviously aroused by this quick reversal, marched 88 yards in 16 plays to tie the tally midway through the second period. The visitors produced the necessary first down yardage on three crucial fourth down situations to keep the drive alive. Halfback Jim Hester covered the final steps on a 17 yard dash off tackle and then converted the two bonus tallies on the identical play. Wheeler, with Vanpool and fullback Gred Goad doing most of the damage, marched to the 30 yard line just prior to intermission where McLean's alert defensive secondary knocked down three consecutive passing attempts leaving the half-time count at 8-8. Wheeler began the second half as if it intended to turn the game into a rout. Taking the ball on its own 41 yard line, Wheeler scored in 16 plays. McLean threw up a goal-line defense at its own 7 yard line which threw Mustang halfback Don Rives for a one yard loss on a first down situation. Three consecutive smashes by fullback Goad, however netted the go-ahead score with 2:18 left in the third stanza. It took McLean only two minutes to score its second tally. Baker picked up six yards on two carries to begin the drive before an illegal procedure penalty apparently dulled the Tigers efforts at the 15 yard line. But on third down with nine yards needed, McCarty rolled to his left and pegged a perfect strike which Hess gathered in at his own 40 and outran the Wheeler second to the double stripe. That set the stage for Wheeler's defensive heroics. Neither team could move the ball during the fourth period.

An exchange of punts failed to net either team a break and McLeans last minute aerial assault failed to advance the ball farther than the Tiger 46.

COLTS END SEASON WITH WIN

The Wheeler Colts ended the 1966 season with a 14-0 triumph over the Groom Cubs last Thursday night at Wheeler. This victory gave the Colts three wins against three losses and one tie for the year. Coach Gaines crew got on the scoreboard early as they scored their first TD on the first play they ran from scrimmage. Jimmy Cole returned a Groom punt from the Cub 44 to the 19 to put the ball in scoring position. Dave Britt broke off right tackle and went the distance for the touchdown and added two more points as he ran right guard for an 8-0 lead. The first quarter ended with no more scoring but the Colts took over at the Wheeler 44 early in the second period to set their other scoring drive in motion. Cole got the drive going with a 3 yard gain and Weatherly added 8 more in two carries to put the pigskin on the Groom 45. Britt found room at right end behind good blocking and went all the way for the touchdown on the next play with 5:44 to go in the half. Rodney Weatherly closed out the Colt scoring as he ran the extra points on a keeper at right guard. Groom threatened only once in the game as they got to the Colt 16 but lost the ball on downs. The Colts picked up 6 first downs in the game and netted 125 yards on the ground with Britt getting 107 yards in 11 carries. Groom was able to garner 7 first downs and 83 yards net by rushing.

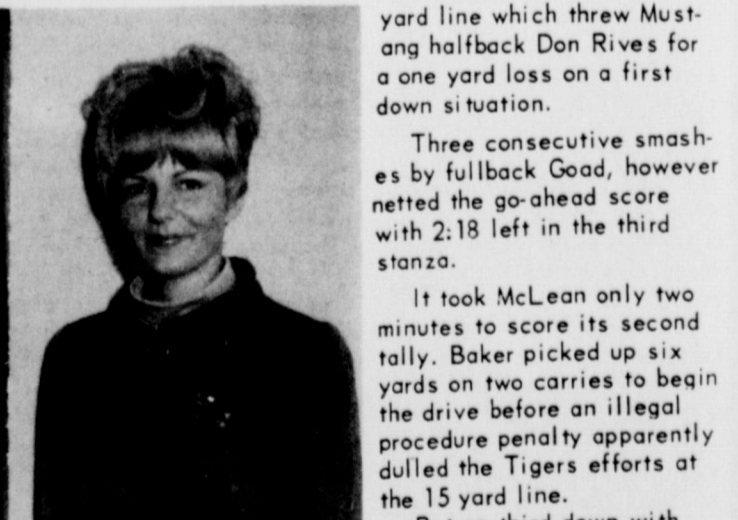

White Grubs In County Wheat

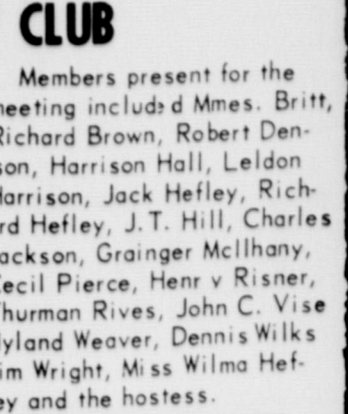

White grubs have done considerable damage to several wheat fields in the county this fall. Preventative treatment is possible, but control after wheat is growing is impractical under dryland conditions since soil treatment must be followed by disking.
Control of white grubs in wheat requires thorough soil treatment with heptachlor aldrin at the rate of 3 pounds of technical material per acre or 6 to 8 pounds of technical chlordane per acre. Heptachlor as a preplant soil application is approved for use only on barley, corn, oats, rice, rye, and wheat.
The preplant soil application of aldrin is approved for use only on corn (at 2 pounds technical per acre) and sorghum (at 3 pounds technical per acre.) These materials can be applied as sprays or granules and should be worked into the top 4 to 6 inches of the soil, preferably during the spring.
SCABIES INSPECTION NEAR COMPLETION
The Scabies inspection program has proceeded very rapidly in Wheeler County. The County Commissioners Court is to be commended for furnishing line up men in each precinct. Bill Roane, inspector for the USDA Animal Disease Eradication Division, has worked full time each week in the county. W.O. Jones with the Texas Animal Health Commission has inspected on days that he was not required to be present at the Amarillo Auction. By Friday November 11 the inspection work should be completed in our county. Without the line up men to show the inspectors where the herds were located it would have taken two or three times as long to complete the program. We hope that the inspection program will be completed in the Panhandle by early spring so that the quarantine set by several Northern and Western states will be lifted for Texas Cattle. Shippers of cattle to these states realize an economic loss on each load of cattle that are dipped prior to reaching their destination.
SOIL TESTING:
The end of the growing season is an ideal time for taking and getting soil tested. Don't wait until the spring rush of the field work to do this important job.
Soil sample boxes, information sheets and tips on how to take soil samples are available from the county extension office.
A soil auger or probe is the best tool for taking soil samples; however, a spade works fine.
A good soil sample is a must if it is to reflect the actual plant food situation in any given field. Several samples should be taken at different spots over the field and then mixed into composite sample for the field.
Each composite sample should be numbered and the information sheet covering the field completely filled out. The information on the sheet is valuable to the soil scientists when they make their fertilizer recommendations.
By taking soil sample as soon as crops are harvested, time can be saved.
The needed fertilizer can be applied when the soil is prepared for next spring's crops.
Fall application or early winter application of fertilizer insures that it will be out and ready when spring planting time arrives.

Wheeler County IRRIGATION

Irrigation is playing a more important role in the Wheeler County agriculture each year. At the present time there are sixty-five to seventy-five irrigation systems in operation in the area. More systems are being installed each year.
Cooperators with the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District have a great variety of systems. Some of the things which influence the kind of system to be used are soils topography kind of crop to be irrigated, acreage to be irrigated, water supply, labor supply and financial resources of the farmer.
Most of the local farmers have sprinkler systems. Some are hand moved and some are power moved. There are several types of power moved sprinkler systems.
Some of the farmers have flood type irrigation systems. This type system is found on the tighter soils. Some of the flood type systems are of the furrow method and some use the border method. Some are graded systems and some are level systems.
Four types of water supply are used. Some pump from wells, some from lakes some from shallow water tables with manifold systems and a few pump from creeks.

NEW PATTERNS ON THE LAND

"Texans built enough of the new, evenly spaced parallel terraces last year to reach from Texas to Maine--more than 2,200 miles," according to H.N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple. "In fact, nearly half the terraces built in Texas were the new kind."
Cooperators with local conservation districts built more than 5,000 miles of all kinds of cropland terraces last year. 2,265 miles were parallel, as compared to 984 miles in 1965, 440 in 1964.
"This isn't just another Texas brag," Smith continued. "Terraces spaced an even number of rows apart and without point rows are called parallel terraces," P.M. Price, Texas State Conservation Engineer, SCS, pointed out. "They really save time and money for the farmer and they do a good job of conserving soil and water."
Parallel terraces are spaced to fit both the farmer's equipment and the lay of the land. For example, they might be built 24 rows apart or 72 row apart, depending upon the slope. Three, four six or eight-row equipment could be used in either of the above cases.
Designing, laying out and building this kind of terrace system, however, is not an easy job. Price said it takes more engineering time to design and stake a parallel system. They may cost more to build. Shorter terraces with more grassed waterways may be needed. More cuts and fills are used.
"Our engineers are willing to take the extra time to figure out parallel terraces," Price said. "Some short cuts have been developed and we're getting more efficient in working out these modern conservation systems."
Price thinks that in another year or two, 50% to 75% of the terraces built in Texas will be the parallel type.
Landowners and operators like them--from city farmers to soil and water conservation district supervisors. They are easy to plow and they save time and fuel.
They also eliminate or greatly reduce short rows or uneven length - point rows. Some landowners say they would not have built terraces if SCS had not worked out these which are much easier to farm.
"Cost - share from the Great Plains Conservation Program and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has helped many farmers build these terraces. Technical help from the SCS and loans from the Farmers Home Administration have also helped get this job done. Price concluded.

Kidwell Pledges HOME FREEZER—Buying & Using

 Not all families will make the same use of a home freezer. Some will want to put in as much food as can possibly be frozen; others will freeze only certain kinds of foods.

In selecting a freezer, one of the first things to think about is whether the freezer will provide the amount of freezing and storage space needed.

Other factors in deciding on the make of freezer to buy are the dealer's reputation for fair dealing and his ability to give prompt service.

In general design, home freezers fall into two classes, chest and upright. The chest freezer is low, with top opening, the upright is higher and opens at the front. If well built, the two types will operate equally well.

A freezer that opens at the top has a natural advantage in keeping temperatures low. When its lid is lifted, there is very little exchange of cold dry freezer air with warm moist outside air. With an upright, cold air tends to spill out when the door is opened.

An upright freezer occupies less floor space than a chest freezer but upright freezers usually cost a little more.

Before installing a freezer, the user will need to make certain the motor is designed for the electric system in the home.

The home freezer should always be grounded to prevent the possibility of shock to the user.

The purpose of packaging food for freezing is primarily to keep food from drying out.

Food not adequately packaged will lose quality and nutrition value in spite of efficiency of the freezer.

The quality of food that can be frozen successfully at one time depends on the kind of food, size, and kind of package and design of the freezer. When food freezes too slowly, loss of quality or even spoilage may result.

For quickest possible freezing each package should be in direct contact with a refrigerated surface. If packages are massed, those at the center may not freeze fast enough to keep the food from spoiling. Leave a little space between packages to allow for circulation.

Have you ever forgotten to take meat out of the freezer? At the 54 Study club Mrs. Weems was telling others a dish made from frozen hamburger meat.

Two pounds frozen hamburger meat; 1 package onion soup mix; 1 can tomato soup; 1 can cream mushroom soup; Pour ingredients over meat, place in 350 degree oven and cook for 2 1/2 hours.
