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





... And Nothing But

The famous phrase has a round. rolling rhythm: "the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the command? It is an old, old problem. Almost

2400 years ago Euripides said: "The tongue hath sworn, but the mind is unsworn."

How can we persuade a man's mind to deliver what his tongue and Dub will drive Fats truck has promised? In an earlier day the law relied mainly on the witness dread of immediate divine retribu tion. But few people nowadays are kept honest by the fear of a heav. enly thunderbolt.

Accordingly, the law now seeks to harness the power of the witness own conscience. To that end, the form of the oath may vary somewhat to fit the particular creed of the individual.

Thus a Christian may swear on the New Testament, a Jew on the Old Testament, and a Mohamm dan on the Koran. And a Quaker to whom swearing is abhorrent may merely "affirm" that he will tell the truth.

This represents a continuing effort by your local Extension Service office to be sure that all producers have the up-to date ii formation that will enable our local farmers and ranchers to continue to improve their level and efficiency of production These guidelines are concerned with wheat, grain sor ghum, beef cattle, cotton, sudan and sorghum hybrid grazing, stocker calf production and range management. The guidelines include the latest information from research and local result demonstrations. The information was pulled together from many sources with the assistance of our Extension Service University. The local farmers and ranchers that are members of the sub-committees had an active part in

developing each guideline. Everyone connected with farming and ranching should find at least one phase of each guideline that will benefit his farming or ranching interest MEAT IMPORT LAW:

.L. 88-482 enacted in August 1964 has now been in effect for about two years. It was designed to limit imports of beef and certain other meats in the U.S. if they exceed a certain quanity.

The Secretary of Agriculture is required to estimate at the beginning of each calendar year what the total U.S. imports of certain meats will be during that year. This estimate is reviewed and re vised quarterly during the year.

A formula for establishing the level of import gotas is available in the law if the y are necessary. Quotas are to be imposed when the mport level estimated by the Secretary for any calendar year equals or exceeds 110 percent of what the quotas would be.

> 848.7 million pounds. Imports can be expected to increase or decrease as the U.S. market becomes relatively more or less attractive than other foreign markets. High cow prices of the last year, plus anticipated strength for the next two years should stimulate imports of beef. Any increase, of course, depends upon whether sufficient supplies are available in the meat exporting countries for shipment abroad.

Commerce -- The colorful history of Wheeler County is reflected in its place names. Many things influenced these place names. Most of the names can be traced back to early families in the area. Also, the geography of the land often determined the name.

ed in a survey of Texas geographical names being compiled by Dr. Fred Tarpley of the Department of English at East Texas State University. A study of Wheeler County names was undertaken as an English class project by Mrs. Anna Tinsley of Commerce.

Residents of the county who provided information for Mrs. Tinsley's study are Mr. Ray D. Brown of Allison. Mr. John Cullers of Shamrock, Mrs. Lou Dean Douthit of Briscoe, Mr. Arval Montgomery of Shamrock and Mrs. Sallie B. Harris of Wheeler.
