COUNTY AGENT: Max Hatter has been assigned to serve as County Agent for Wheeler County. He will take the position now held by Charles Jackson on June 1 of this year. Jackson will be transferred to Cass County, the present location of Hatter. While serving as Cass County Agent the past 3 1/2 years, Hatter was active in developing a type 11 Brucellosis program, promoting the Screw-worm Eradication program, and promoting a County 4-H camp, where 50 members attended each year. Fourteen short courses in adult education programs were held in Cass County in 1966. A day show and livestock show facilities were initiated during his term as county agent. Prior to his appointment to Cass County, Hatter has served as assistant County Agent in Gregg County and

Henderson county. In each of these counties, Hatter has been recognized for his outstanding work with young people.

Hatter is a 1961 agricultural graduate of Texas A&M University, majoring in Ornamental Horticulture. There he was a distinguished student and a member of the Agricultural Council.

He is a native of Moody, Texas in McLennan County where his dad and brother operate a 1500 acre diversified feed grain and cattle farm. He was a Texas Lone Star Farmer in FFA in 1956. His wife, Ellen, is a graduate of Baylor University. She formerly taught at Los Fresnos High School in the Rio Grande Valley. They have two children, Cynthia Ann 5 and a 3 year old son, Walter.

More Funds for GP Conservation

Wheeler County farmers and ranchers will be interested to know that more funds for the Great Plains Conservation Program has been made available.

According to Mr. Sam Studebaker, President, National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Dis-

tricts, in his Tuesday News-letter dated April 18, 1967 we find the following statement:

"President Johnson has released \$2.3 million for the Great Plains Conservation Program impounded last year. Congress has appropriated this as an increase to accelerate the program of needed conservation measures and

practices in this vast region. However, last fall, the administration impounded the money and portions of other federal appropriations in an effort to slow down the economy."

The president's current action will allow the Soil Conservation Service to sign cost-sharing contracts that have long been awaiting the availability of funds. In appropriation hearings held in Washington several days ago

it was pointed out that enough conservation plans had been prepared and contracts readied for signature, to enable SCS to use all of the unexpended amount by June 30, 1967 - the end of this fiscal year.

The amount of money allocated for Texas was not given, but it would appear to be a sizeable amount since we have 99 counties in this program.

Home gardeners are reminded that not all insecticides are recommended for home garden insect control. Poor insect control may result from the use of the wrong insecticide and perhaps a bigger problem could come from insecticide residues on the treated vegetables.

The Food and Drug administration, has set certain restrictions on the use of insecticides applied to edible crops. Observance of these restrictions will protect the consumer from harmful residues.

Information on controlling insects in the home garden and a list of insecticides which are widely used and are generally available are included in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden."

We suggest that gardens be checked frequently for insect infestations and if they are found, that control measures be applied before the situation gets out of hand.

A copy of L-642 is available from the county extension office for interested persons.

Spring Cleaning Days Are Here

While we are doing our spring cleaning let's not forget the garage and the outdoor living area.

When getting ready for the outdoor living, treat chairs, tables, grills and children's wading pools to spongedowns with a high concentration pine oil solution. You'll remove winter's dust and grime disinfect and deodorize at the same time. Use a giant-size sponge for quicker clean-up and a hose to rinse down your outdoor furniture, cooking equipment and the children's play things.

If your garage is good for nothing--including the family car--organize a family clean-up team and see how useful a garage can be.

1. Be daring with your throw-away operation. You'll be surprised how many products you intended to use are too old to be efficient or have evaporated.

2. Make a clean sweep of the garage with the biggest broom you can find. Use a snow shovel for a dust pan.

3. After the sweep-up, mop the floor with a pine oil disinfectant. This treatment degreases, disinfects and deodorizes all at once. Then use the hose. Remember to hose down after sweeping if you use the hose before you've swept up, you'll have mud puddles from the dust and dirt.

4. Short of hanging up the car, get as many items off the garage floor as possible.

5. Organize with pegboard. Hang garden equipment from hooks, add shelves for paint, patio and garden products, car cleaning equipment and outdoor gear.

6. Spray storage hint: Hang up a shoebag for your aerosol products. That way they'll be easy to see and get to.

7. If the garage is still overcrowded after you organize, consider storing some necessary items in the attic. Garages are often damp and if there is anything which could be damaged by mildew move it upstairs.

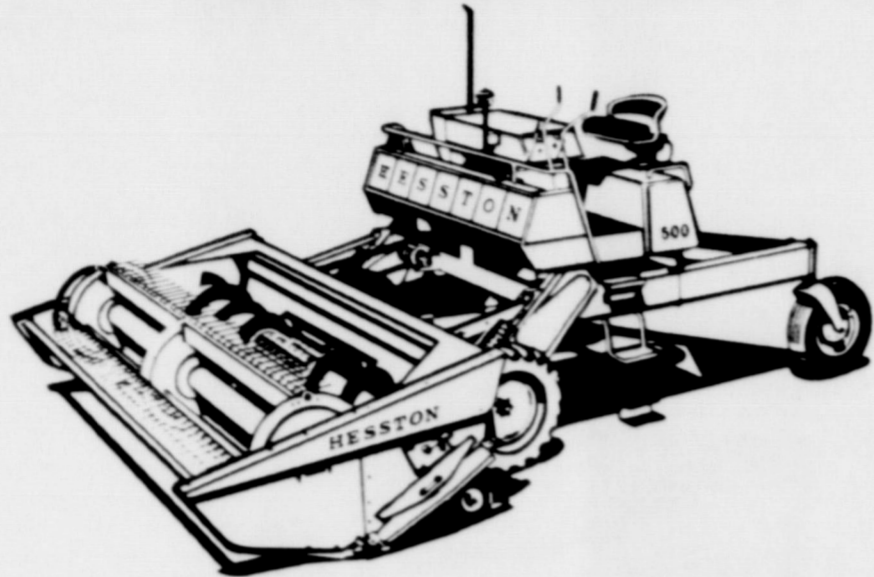

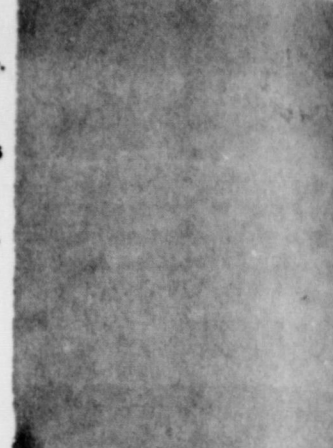

We just got through passing the revisions to the Criminal Code in the House that will plug up a lot of the loop holes in favor of the criminals. The Senate is still wrestling with versions but ours is supposed to be a lot better for the honest people. Then the two bills will go to a joint study committee to get worked out.

I just about decided that trying to predict what happens in politics is harder than predicting the weather. Just about everybody thought the Governor's Liquor Bill was dead as a doornail when they suddenly brought it out of Committee by a 10 to 7 vote. They swung three members over and 4 of them were not at the hearing. Now they are working hard to round up enough votes on the floor.
