Q. Will my taxes be raised after the Bond election? No, taxes will not be raised- the added money for paying for the \$750,000 in Bonds is provided for in full by the \$1.25 per hundred tax rate just passed by the

board. Q. What will we receive for the \$750,00? A. A new school plant, with auditorium and Cafeteric remodeling of gym to provide for required standards for

Q. How will the \$1.25 tax rate improve the present instructional program.

A. First, by providing additional teachers to serve in Foreign Language, Library, Remedial Reading. This will enable our school to

SENATE BILL116

This bill by-passed by the Legislature of Texas in 1955. It was sponsored by school people - School Boards, school administrators, by the Texas Education Agency and by the State Board of Education in order to provide means : for financing new buildings, and for protection of the taxpay-
