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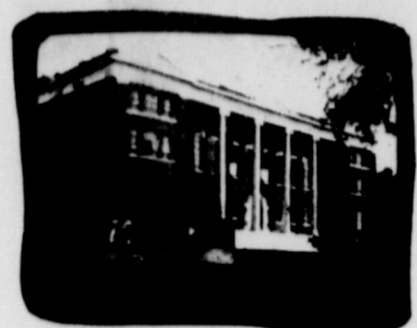

ANNUAL SCHOOL TAX RATE REDUCED

TAX RATE DROPS FROM \$1.35 to \$1.25 PER HUND.

In the meeting with the Underwood-Neuhaues Bonding Company on May 17, 1965 the Wheeler school board found that due to the re-evaluating program recently conducted in our local school district, it will be possible to reduce the current tax rate from the present \$1.35 to \$1.25 on \$100 valuation. The local school board positively assures the public that the total monies derived from this tax rate would adequately finance the current building program under consideration and the cost of local operational expenses. This would also finance any additional personnel and anticipated teacher pay raise made necessary by State Legislation.

We are fortunate in having an increase of 5 million dollars taxable evaluation in the form of industry and

utilities added to our local school district.

Of our total district tax evaluation of 11,500,000, industry and utilities pay approximately \$7,000,000. This represents 60% of the local tax structure. These additions have made possible the decreased tax rate for local tax payers.

Using the \$1.25 tax rate our bonding company representative assured the board that 50% of the rate will adequately pay principal and interest on the proposed \$750,000 Bond Issue. This would leave 75¢ for operational costs of the school program. These facts show how fortunate our school district is to be in a position where such a building program can be constructed using a lower tax rate than the one previously in effect which was \$1.35.

LOCAL SCHOOL BOARD IS PETITIONED FOR ELECTION

A school bond election in the amount of \$750,000 bond issue has been called for Saturday, May 29, 1965 by the Board of Education, according to Mr. Harrison Hall, President of the Board of Trustees.

The Wheeler school Board has received petitions signed by 160 tax payers of the district petitioning the school board to call a bond election in order to provide adequate school facilities, improvements, land and equipment.

Included in the program will be a complete educational plant for grades 1 thru 12. The elementary grade facilities will be separated from the high school facilities by the auditorium, cafeteria, offices and a large lobby. However, the complete plant will be under one roof.

The high school portion will contain complete facilities for high school use including class rooms, science Laboratory, Library, commercial department, agriculture department, home economics department, band room and facilities for music, an auditorium with a seating capacity of 500, with modern and complete stage facilities; Administrative office and storage and supply spaces.

In the elementary wing will be the following facilities: Cafeteria, library for the upper grades, class rooms, multipurpose room, Administrative offices and storage and supply rooms.

For over 4 years your board and superintendent have seen the need for new facilities which would provide for a modern school program both now and for the future for the children of the community.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS FOR THE LOCAL TAXPAYERS' CONSIDERATION

Q. Will my taxes be raised after the Bond election? No, taxes will not be raised - the added money for paying for the \$750,000 in Bonds is provided for in full by the \$1.25 per hundred tax rate just passed by the board.

Q. What will we receive for the \$750,000? A. A new school plant, with auditorium and Cafeteria remodeling of gym to provide for required standards for

physical education program all necessary furniture and equipment, landscaping, curb and gutters, parking area paving, added space for playgrounds and track and field facilities.

Q. How will the \$1.25 tax rate improve the present instructional program? A. First, by providing additional teachers to serve in Foreign Language, Library, Remedial Reading. This will enable our school to

offer a varied program to meet needs of all pupils - 4 years of Math, 4 years of Science, 4 years of English, 3 years of Social Studies, 4 years of Business subjects, 4 years of Agriculture, 4 years of Homemaking plus other needs - such areas as Speech, Music, physical education and health.

Q. Why do we need to vote on Senate Bill 116? A. By doing so, the school Bonds can be sold at a cheaper rate of interest since we would have a better Bond Rating, which will save us approximately \$175,000 in interest over the 25 year period.

Q. Will the new plant provide room for more children than we now have? A. Yes, we now have enrolled 393 pupils. The new

plant provides for 500 pupils.

Q. What do we pay the Bonding Company for representing us? A. The Fee is fixed by state Laws.

Q. What per cent of the taxes will real estate owners (homes, farms, ranches) pay? A. Approximately 40%.

Q. What per cent of the taxes will industry (oil, gas, utilities) pay? A. Approximately 60%.

Q. Why not acquire land for a new site for the new buildings? A. None is available which could be bought or which are conveniently located.

Q. Why not remodel present High School? A. Space of only 8100 square feet is not sufficient for the 136 people now in High School cost of remodeling would

cost over 2/3 of the cost of a new building.

Q. What about playgrounds? A. When the old buildings are removed, space behind the new building will be provided.

Q. What about teacher's workrooms? A. Plans will provide for both elementary and High School workrooms.

Q. Why do we need extra classrooms? A. The old plant does not have classrooms for the needed expansion of our curriculum.

Q. Why expand the curriculum? A. Colleges are increasing their entrance requirements, so that our children will need to be trained better than ever before in order to be accepted.

Q. What fee do we pay our

SENATE BILL 116

This bill by-passed by the Legislature of Texas in 1955. It was sponsored by school people - School Boards, school administrators, by the Texas Education Agency and by the State Board of Education in order to provide means for financing new buildings, and for protection of the taxpayer.

First, this bill limits indebtedness to 10% of assessed valuation and our \$750,000 in considerably undervalued property. This bill also sets a tax rate maximum of \$1.50 and this means that the Board could not exceed this figure. In fact, the \$1.25 rate just passed by the Board for 1965-66 will finance our needs both for operation and for paying off the Bonds for years to come.

Finally, by coming under this Bill, we get a bond rating by Moody Investment Service, New York City, which will enable us to sell the Bonds for a much lower rate of interest since we will have a better credit risk. Our figures show that over a 25 year payment plan we can save as much as \$175,000 in interest alone.

By no means does this mean that your tax rate will be raised. It will remain at \$1.25.

County Agent's Report

Charles Jackson
If you are planning to build some new fences this spring, try using electricity as a barrier.

Electric fences are inexpensive, easy to erect, require little maintenance and are effective. When deciding whether to use an electric fence or not, several factors should be considered.

A primary factor to be looked at is what will the fence be used for. Principal uses of the fences are supplementary fencing and fencing marginal land which does not warrant an investment in permanent fences. They may also be used to discourage predatory animals and for placing inside bullpens or horse pens as additional protection.

When using the electric fence, the following precautions should be taken. Use only approved controllers. Although the fence requires low voltage, improper amperage can cause death. Under no conditions should a homemade controller be used. Instructions

which come with each controller should be followed closely.

The fences should be properly grounded and all connections to posts should be insulated. The fence to operate at its maximum level, a ground rod should be installed to provide contact between the moist earth and the controller.

If the fence is to be used along a public highway or near other areas of farm traffic, it should be clearly marked with appropriate signs every 200 feet and gate openings provided with insulated rubber grips.

The electric fence is a helpful farm tool but can be as deadly as a rattlesnake when abused.

Ant Control
Ants are becoming a nuisance in homes and lawns in many sections of the county. These pests can be effectively controlled when recommended insecticides are used.

Among the more popular and effective insecticides for any control are chlordane and dieldrin. These may be applied a long window and door sills, foundation cracks, baseboards and other possible nesting places for ants. Some nesting places for ants are behind walls, in closets, in furniture and other dark undisturbed places.

When a nesting place is found, one of the following practices may be followed to destroy the nest.

Effective control in most instances, depends upon location and destroying the nests and thoroughly treating the area with proper insecticides. When ants are found in the house they may be controlled by applying 2-3 percent chlordane or 5 percent dieldrin household sprays. Repeat the application as needed to maintain control of the pests.

Outside the home, apply a band of insecticidal dust or spray around the foundation wall and treat all nests found in the yards. For outside control, 10 percent chlordane, 2 percent dieldrin or 5 percent heptachlor dusts are effective. Granular formulations and sprays of these materials are also available and are convenient to use.

Q. What areas of Texas are safe from atomic fallout?
A. None. Fallout from a nuclear explosion, accidental or enemy could be dangerous in any area of Texas from El Paso to the Louisiana border and from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley.

A. What determines the fallout area?
A. There is no simple answer to this question because of the many variables such as weapon, material used wind and weather conditions height of explosions, terrain and etc.

Q. How does size of bomb affect fallout area?
A. You can not see, feel, hear, taste or smell radiation. Geiger counters or other monitoring devices are necessary to detect and measure radiation.

Q. How can I tell if dust is radioactive?
A. Larger fallout particles near the blast might look like sand or ashes. Further downwind it would be like pepper or just like dust.

Q. How can I tell if dust is radioactive?
