Old Mobeetie Jail Has Black History Display

The Old Mobeetie Jail will celebrate Black History Month with a pictorial display of Lt. Henry O. Flipper, West Point's First Black Graduate and America's First Black Officer who was stationed at Fort Elliott, Texas in 1879, beginning February 5, 2001. Henry Ossian Flipper was born a slave on March 21, 1856, in Thomasville, Georgia. He began his education in a woodshed where an old slave taught him the alphabet. After the Civil War, his father, a skilled shoemaker and carriage trimmer, prospered and hired the wife of a former Confederate Captain to tutor Henry and his other three sons. In the fall of 1872, Henry learned about a vacancy at West Point Military Academy. After passing the qualifying examination, Flipper received his appointment on May 25, 1873. Flipper became the first black graduate from West Point on June 14, 1877, after enduring four years of loneliness and isolation among the predominantly white cadets who from time to time harassed and mistreated him. When Flipper was handed his diploma, he received a standing ovation from his classmates and the spectators for his four years of dedication

Major General John Schofield, West Point's Superintendent, gave a tribute to Flipper's bravery against isolation and exclusion by his classmates. He stated, "No white cadet had ever been burdened with the hope of an entire race on his shoulders. Anyone knows how quietly and bravely this young man-the first of his despised race to graduate from West Point-has borne the difficulties of his position; how for four years he has had to stand apart from his classmates as one of them but not of them...." Henry 0. Flipper became the first black officers in the United States Military Service.



there were Valerie Ryals of Burleson, "Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2001 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.





Program Offers Landowners Choices

The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) provides to farmers and ranchers that wish to enter into a 5-year contract to solve their natural resource concerns. Most of the EQIP contracts will be written within designated priority areas across Texas. During the 2000 program year, at least 75 percent of EQIP funds are targeted to these areas, with up to 25 percent to be used to cover state-

Either way, if you are looking at EQIP as a tool to help you solve your resource problems; you need to know that certain choices exist. You can decide on several important considerations. Those could include:

1. You choose to develop your conservation plan, because EQIP is voluntary.

2. You determine who will help you develop your plan either the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) or other qualified service providers. Your plan will have to meet the local NRCS field office technical guide standards to qualify for EQIP, and be approved by the local conservation

3. You will have conservation practice alternatives to pick from as you determine how you will solve your priority resources concerns.

4. You determine what cost-share rates you can accept for implementing structural and vegetative practices. This will affect your contract applications in the ranking.

EQIP applications will be accepted throughout the year. However, the ranking and selecting of offers of pro-
