

Refill the egg whites putting two filled halves toplastic wrap and refrigerate until ready to serve. If desired, reserve about one cup of egg yolk mixture to fill a pastry tube. With the tube, squeeze the egg yolk mixture around the egg where the outsides meet. Garnish with small pieces of pimento.

That's because there are so many easy ways to fix chicken. With a little care in selecting, storing and preparing chicken, even the novice cook can turn out a tasty meal that will win the approval of all the family.

What can you do with chicken? What can't you do with it would be a better question. Can you bake it, broil it, fry it, braise it, barbecue it, stuff it or stew it. Or try cooking chicken parts in vegetable casseroles with potatoes, creamed corn, spinach, broccolu, green beans, mushrooms or tomatoes. And sh..lthat Cog ac Vin. great on pizza. Good chicken meals begin with good quality chickens. One way to assure quality is to look for the circular inspection symbol of the U.S. Department of Ag. on the chicken you buy. This symbol

means that the chicken was healthy, that it was packed that it is truthfully labeled.

Store fresh chickens, loose ly wrapped in the refrigerator and cook 1 to 2 days after buying. Keep frozen chicken until time to thaw and cook them promptly after thawing.

USDA's Consumer and gether. Cover with transparent Marketing Service offers these suggestions for cooking chickens to preserve their natural goodness.

Ready-to-cook broiler fryers are indeed ready to cookmerely rinse them in cold water, drain and pat dry. If the chicken is to be fried, broiled, or oven browned, make sure it is dry because a wet surface will prevent the chicken from browning

Broiler-fryer parts or cupup chickens usually take an hour of cooking in a moderate oven; pan-fried, deep fried or broiled parts cook in 30 to 45 minutes or more depending on the size of the parts.

Frozen chicken parts can also be cooked without thawing. To do this, simply handle them in the same manner as fresh except that the cooking time will be about 15 minutes

Chicken is done when it is "fork tender," or when the meat on the thickest part of the drumstick is soft to the touch.

Many people over-cook chicken, especially the breast, which makes it dry and chewy. When cooking cup-up like the leg. Give the legs a 10 minute headstart before will find that the breast will be more juicy and tender.

The care and storage of cooked chickens is just as important to the health of your family as the care of the uncooked chicken. Cooked chicken should be cooked quickly and stored loosely wrapped in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Don't leave it standing at room temperature. Refrigerate stuffing spearately.

Any leftover broth or gravy should be refrigerated promptly and then reheated to boiling before serving. Use cooked poultry, stuffing, broth or gravy withint 1 or 2 days. Or, store the chick with the broth or gravy in a freezer for up to six months.

LAY MEAT INSPECTOR: The state department of Health has asked my assistance in locating qualified applicants for the position of Lay Meat Inspector I which is utilized in their Division of Veterinary Public Health.

The minimum qualifications for this position require a high school certificate one. or its quaivelant. This position presently has an entrance salary rate of \$372 per month; however, should the proposed salary plan be approved by our State Legislature, which is currently in session, the entrance salary rate will be increased to approximately \$432 per month effective Sept. 1, 1967. Vacanacies for this position presently exist in locations throughout the state of Texas. The job duties will be performed in the State-inspected meat and poultry packing plants.






