RALPH WAYNE TO BE GUEST SPEAKER FR.

The Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet has been set for Friday, Feb. 24 at the new school cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. Guest speaker for the evening will be Ralph Wayne, State Representative for the 89th District.

The installation of officers which has been the main objective of the banquet in years past will not be a part of this year's banquet.

Entertainment will be furnished by the Wheeler High School stage band. Mrs. Harold Lloyd Lee will furnish dinner music.

The speaker, Ralph Wayne was born in Wellington and now lives in Plainview. Education was acquired in many schools with Shamrock listed as having had a part in his elementary education. After graduating from high school at the age of 16, he received a BA degree from West Texas State University in 1953.

Mr. Wayne went into the service in 1954, after which he moved to Amarillo. He was employed by KFDD-TV until 1962 where he served with the news department and as Operations Manager for the station. He remained in Amarillo until 1962.

After living in Plainview for two years, Mr. Wayne was elected to the House of Representatives in 1964. His present offices are Rules, State Affairs, Banks and Banking and Labor. He is a delegate of the National Legislative Conference.

Wayne was named Outstanding Young Man of the Year in Plainview in 1965 and received the Distinguished Service Award. In January 1967 he was nominated for Five Outstanding Young Texans. He was listed in Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges.

Ralph Wayne is active in many organizations. He is a 32nd Degree Mason, York Rite Mason and Shriner. He is a member of Alpha Chi National Honor Society and

Sigma Nu National Fraternity. Wayne is married and the father of three children. He has traveled extensively in Europe, Africa, South America and Central America.

BLOOD BANK DRAWING MARCH 1

Citizens from the North Wheeler County Hospital District will be asked to donate blood to the Red Cross Blood Mobile March 1, 1967. The blood bank will be set up at the Legion Hall.

Workers are making an effort to contact everyone to schedule a time for blood donors. Twelve donors are scheduled every 15 minutes from 8:30 to 2:15. If you were not contacted or did not set a time to make a donation, feel free to "Walk In." A "Walk In" is an unscheduled person who comes when he can and waits a turn. The whole time for your visit will consume less than 45 minutes.

Anyone not contacted by the donor committee is urged to contact Mrs. Ben Rucker, Donor Recruitment Chairman at 3613 or any of the following committee members:

Mr. Jim Wright, David Maley, Hiram Whitener, Herbert Finsterwald, Red Dukes, Lester Leonard or David Britt. These people will be glad to schedule for donating blood on March 1, from 8:30 to 2:15.

In commenting about the upcoming blood bank, Dr. Parker said, "Since this community will soon have a surgeon practicing in our hospital, the need for available blood will increase."

I strongly recommend that the people in Wheeler and the surrounding area served by the hospital, make a definite effort to give blood. We never know at what time it may be needed by any of us - nor whose life it may save!"

Essential Instructions
Mrs. Carroll Adams Red Cross Chapter Chairman of North Wheeler County reports that about one-third of the

donors who came at the blood mobile last August were turned down because of the dietary requirements and restrictions on the use of medications listed below. It is asked that all who plan to donate blood follow carefully instructions to avoid this rejection rate at the blood mobile planned for March 1st at the American Legion Hall in Wheeler.

PROPER DIET: It is important that you eat to maintain your strength, "but avoid fatty foods for four hours PRIOR to donation."

Suggested Breakfast: Fruit, fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar. Cream of Wheat or oatmeal with sugar and trim milk toast with jam, jelly or honey. (no butter.)

Suggested Lunch: Clear soups without fats, sandwiches (no butter or mayonnaise) roast beef, tongue chicken, lettuce, tomato, onion or cucumber (catsup), eggs, if eaten, boiled or poached.

Vegetables: prepared without fat. Bread: toast or crackers, no butter.

Salad: Vegetable, fruit or dry cottage (no mayonnaise or oil dressing.) Use lemon juice, vinegar, salt or sugar.

Dessert: jello or fruit.

ADVISABLE TO FORCE LIQUIDS: Any carbonated drinks, coffee, tea (without cream), water.

FOODS EXCLUDED: Fried foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and chocolate.

Following are revisions of "Instructions to Blood Donors."

1. Proper diet: While it is not desirable for donors to ingest heavy,

fatty meals, they should not go without food at the regular mealtime prior to donation. Light refreshment such as fruit juices, bread crackers, dry toast, raw vegetables, jam, jelly or honey, skimmed milk, black coffee or tea is desirable during a 4-hour period prior to donation.

Please do "not" eat fats (such as cream, butter, fatty meats or fried food) for at least 4 hours before your appointment.

2. Fire-fighters: Volunteer or regular fire-fighters should not donate blood within 36 hours of a possible call-for-duty. In smaller communities where much dependence is placed on the volunteer fire-fighter, it would be advisable to divide these volunteers into two groups, each group to donate alternately.

The program will begin at 9:50 a.m. with the welcome being given by Arling Cordell.

The first speaker will be James T. Smith of the U.S. Geological Survey, Austin. Mr. Smith will use the subject "Ground Water Resources."

At 11 a.m., Norman Brent Area Management Specialist, will speak on "Management Problems Associated With Irrigation."

One hour, 12:00 noon until 1:00 p.m., will be devoted to the serving of the barbecue luncheon and inspection of exhibits.

"Sprinkler System Design" will be the topic discussed at 1 p.m. by C. Wayne Keese, Extension Service Agricultural Engineer. At 2 p.m. Dan Rummell, Area Entomologist will discuss "Insects in Wheeler County."

The subject of John Shanklin, REA Agricultural Engineer, at 2:30 p.m. will be "Well Construction and Design."

County Agent Jackson will talk on "Grazing Hybrid Sudan" at 3:30 p.m.

At 4 p.m., all of the specialist appearing on the program will participate in a panel discussion, including a question and answer discussion.

Drawing of the door prizes at 4:30 will conclude the day's activities.

Wheeler School To Have

OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY

The Wheeler School Board and faculty takes pride in extending an invitation to the Open House for the new School Plant. The Open House will be held Sunday, February 26, 1967 from 2:00 to 5:00 P.M.

The building measures 466' x 110' and was built at a cost of \$625,988. The structure will accommodate

500 students and is divided into 50 rooms. In addition to the classrooms, the building includes Cafeteria, Auditor-

ium and Administrative suite of offices.

The newly remodeled gymnasium will also be open for the inspection of the public. \$55,357 was spent on the remodeling of the gymnasium. The gym served for many years as the auditorium for all school and local functions and is now used totally for its main purpose physical education. The stage was removed and dressing rooms and a physical education room were added in its place. With the removal of old bleachers and the addition of the new folding type seating, the gym has two practice courts and a game court with the seating capacity of 800.

One of the features which is most helpful to the administration is the public address system which connects with each room.

The reality of the long dreamed of and much needed school began with the bond election in May of 1965. The bonds totaled \$750,000 which was the first for the school district since the 1940's. The investing of a portion of the bonds in Treasury Notes at the First National Bank in Wheeler earned \$25,000.

The architectural firm hired for the job of planning the new building was Rittenberry, Alexander and Murchison of Amarillo.

The bids for the construction on the new building were let in March of 1966 with Panhandle Engineers and Contractors of Amarillo submitting the lowest bid. Actual construction began March 28, 1966 with a grand breaking ceremony held on Thursday, March 31.

The new school building was inspected and accepted by the Board Members on February 7 with classes moving into the new structure on February 10.

The All-Sports banquet was held in the new cafeteria on February 18 gave the local citizens an idea of what the new building would mean to them personally. The cafeteria is completely new with all new kitchen facilities and cafeteria tables and chairs.

The first opportunity to enjoy the new auditorium will be Sunday with the open house. The auditorium will seat 500 people. The large stage is complete with dressing rooms and adjoining storage and band room.

The balance of the bonds will go for the purchase of equipment, landscaping, curb and gutter and land to be added to the campus.

Are You a Creative Cook?

Are you a creative cook? One of those women who just can't resist substituting something for at least one ingredient in every recipe? If you are, perhaps you could use a few pointers, especially in preparing doughs and batters.

Remember that each ingredient in a recipe serves a particular purpose. Your substitutions must be accordingly. If you substitute almond extract for vanilla, you will change only the flavor of the product. But if you change the leavening agent in a recipe, the results may be drastic unless you know how to substitute and keep the same rising ability.

Most pastries are leavened by air, water vapor, carbon dioxide or a combination of these. Beating egg whites and sifting flour are ways to put air in a product. Water vapor is used in making cream puffs and carbon dioxide is used in most cakes and breads. Carbon dioxide is formed by using baking soda with an acid. The acid may be cream of tartar, sour milk, fruit juice or molasses. Carbon dioxide is also formed when yeast fer-

TO ALL RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Wheeler, Texas, on March 14, 1967, which election was duly called and ordered by ordinance of the City Council of said City on February 15, 1967, and which ORDINANCE is made a part of this notice, and reads as follows:

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF WHEELER CITY OF WHEELER

ON THIS, the 15 day of February, 1967, the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, regularly convened at a special meeting in the CITY HALL of said City, with the following members of said City Council present, namely: Don Earney, Mayor; O.B. Burton, Alderman; N.D. Ware, Jr., Alderman; Jack Helton, Alderman; Robert Denson, Alderman; C. Harold Nash, Alderman and Lillie Carlyle, City Secretary and, with quorum being present, the following proceedings, among others, were had, to-wit:

Mayor Don Earney introduced a proposed ordinance calling a bond election, hereinafter set forth, which was read in full, considered and discussed. Alderman N.D. Ware, Jr. then made a motion that the ordinance be finally passed and adopted. The motion was then seconded by Alderman Robert Denson and

carried the following vote: AYES: Mayor Don Earney and Aldermen O.B. Burton, N.D. Ware, Jr., Jack Helton, Robert Denson and C. Harold Nash; NOES: None Thereupon, the Mayor announced the ordinance finally passed and adopted, and said ordinance as passed and adopted by the City Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Wheeler, Texas, is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE

Calling an election in the City of Wheeler, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified electors of said city, who own taxable property in said city, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition concerning the issuance of \$55,000 of street improvement bonds; providing for notice of said election; and enacting provisions incident and relating to the subject and purpose of this ordinance.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, deems it expedient to issue bonds of said City in the principal amount of \$55,000 for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and accordingly desires to submit to the qualified electors of the City, for their action thereupon, the proposition hereinafter set forth for the grant of such authority as therein contained; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in the City of Wheeler, Texas, on March 14, 1967, which is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this ordinance, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors

of the City of Wheeler, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Wheeler, Texas, in the principal amount of FIFTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$55,000), maturing serially or otherwise, as may be determined by the City Council of said City, the maximum maturity being not more than twenty (20) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, interest payable annually or semi-annually as may be determined by the City Council of said City, for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and to levy an annual ad valorem tax on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof as the same matures, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended?"

II. That said election shall be held in the regularly established election precinct of said City (all of said City being included in and composed of one election precinct); and that the polling place for the holding of said election shall be at the CITY HALL in said City, and A.B. Crump is hereby appointed Presiding Judge and Laura Guthrie is hereby appointed Alternate Presiding Judge of said election.

That the Alternate Presiding Judge above named, in the absence of the Presiding Judge above named, shall perform the duties of the presiding judge in such election; and the Presiding Judge shall appoint for such election three (3) qualified voters who are residents of the election precinct to serve as clerks in said election; provided, however, that if the alternate presiding judge is present, he shall be appointed and counted as one of such election clerks.

III. That absentee voting in said election shall be conducted at the City Hall of said City in Wheeler, Texas, and the City Secretary of said City is hereby charged with the duty of conducting absentee voting in said election, as required by law.

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only those resident qualified electors of the City of Wheeler, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election.

IV. That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and there shall be printed on such ballots the following:

FOR: The issuance of \$55,000 street improvement bonds as submitted in the proposition
AGAINST: The issuance of \$55,000 street improvement bonds as submitted in the proposition

V. That, concerning said proposition, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

VII. That a copy of this Ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

VIII. That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to post notice of said election at the CITY HALL in the City of Wheeler, and at three (3) other public places within the City of Wheeler, all of which notices shall be posted not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

IX. That the City Secretary is further authorized and directed to cause said Notice of Election to be published in the WHEELER TIMES, a newspaper published in and of general circulation in Wheeler, Texas, which notice shall be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in said newspaper, the date of the first publication being not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided herein and in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the applicable laws governing general elections.

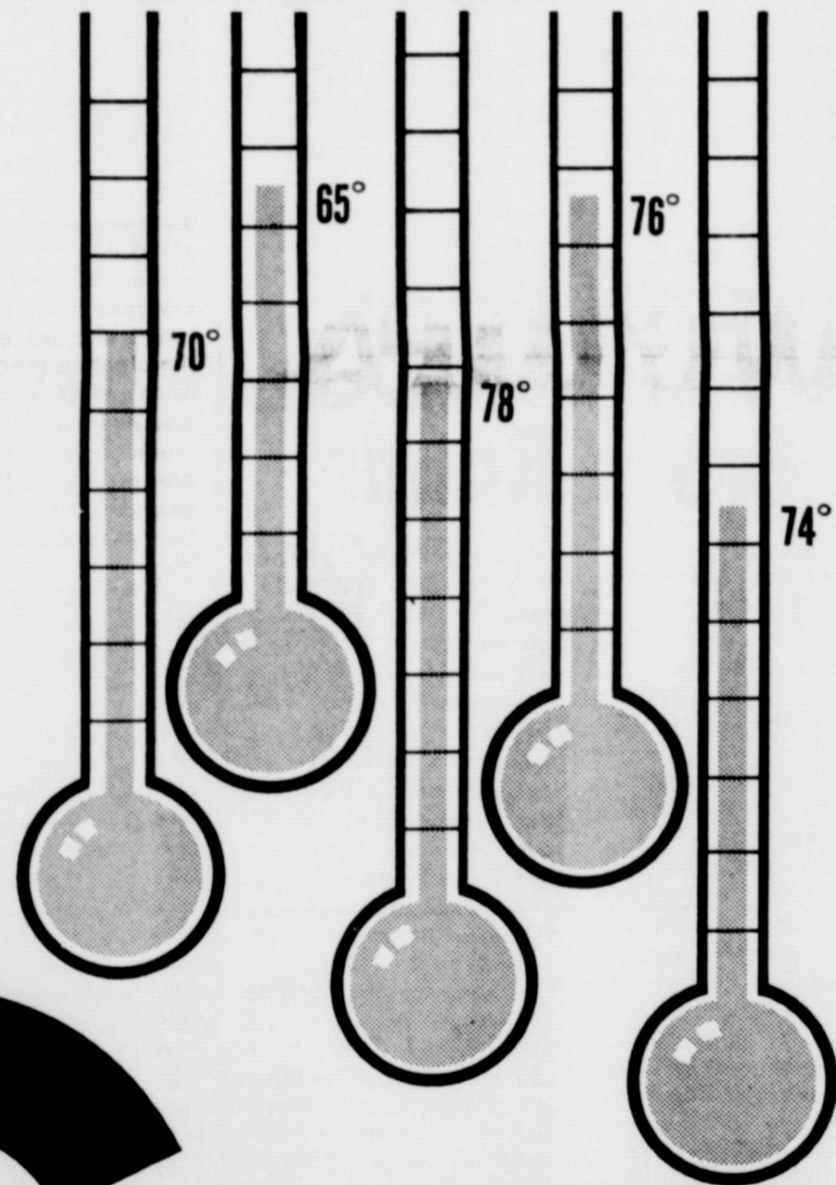
