The newly remodeled

gymnasium will also be open for the inspection of the public. \$55,357 was spent on the remodeling of the gymnasium. The gym served for many years as the auditorium for all school and local functions and is now used totally for its main purpose physical education. The stage was removed and dressing rooms and a physical education room were added in its place. With the removal of old bleachers and the addition of the new folding type seating, the gym has two practice courts and a game court with the seating capacity of

One of the features which is most helpful to the adminstration is the public address system which connects with each room.

The reality of the long dreamed of and much needed school began with the bond election in May of 1965. The bonds totaled \$750,000 which was the first for the school district since the 1940's. The investing of a portion of the bonds in Treasurery Notes at the First National Bank in Wheeler earned \$25,000.

The architectural firm hired for the job of planning the new building was Rittenberry, Alexander and Murchison of Amarillo.

The bids for the construction on the new building were let in March of 1966 with Panhandle Engineers and Contractors of Amarillo submitting the lowest bid. Actual construction began March 28, 1966 with a ground breaking ceremony held on Thursday, March 31.

The new school building was inspected and accepted by the Board Members on February 7 with classes moving into the new structure on February 10.

on Feervary 18 gave the local citizens an idea of what the new building would mean to them personally. The cafeteria is completely new with all new kitchen facilities and cafeteria tables and chairs.

The first opportunity to enjoy the new auditorium will be Sunday with the open house. The auditorium will seat 500 people. The large stage is complete with dressing rooms and adjourning storage and band room.

The balance of the bonds will go for the purchase of equipment, landscaping, curb and gutter and land to be added to the campus.

donors who came at the blood mobile last August were turned down because of the dietary requirements and restrictions on the use of medications listed below. It is asked that all who plan to donate blood follow carefully instructions to avoid this rejection rate at the blood mobile planned for March 1st at the American Legion Hall in Wheeler.

PROPER DIET: It is important that you eat to maintain your strngth, "but avoid fatty foods for four hours PRIOR to donation. Suggested Breakfast: Fruit, fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar. Cream of Wheat or oatmeal with sugar and trim milk toast with jam, jelly or

honey. (no butter.) Suggested Lunch: Clear soups without fats, sandwiches (no butter or mayonnaise) roast beef, tonguem chicken, lettuce, tomato, onion or cucumber (catsup), eggs, if eaten, boiled or poached.

Vegetables: prepared without fat. Bread: toast or crackers, no butter. Salad: Vegetable, fruit or

dey cottage (no mayonnaise or oil dressing.) Use lemon juice, vinegar, salt or sugar. Dessert: jello or fruit. ADVISABLE TO FORCE LIQUIDS: Any carbonated drinks, coffee, tea (without cream,) water.

FOODS EXCLUDED: Fried foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and choco-

Water vapor is used in making cream puffs and carbon di oxide is used in most cakes and breads. Carbon dioxide is formed by using baking soda with an acid. The acid may be cream of tartar, sour milk, fruit juice or molasses. Carbon dioxide is also formed when yeast fer-

ments sugar. The sugar may be placed in the dough or formed by the breakdown of starch in the flour.

Tested recipes include the correct proportions of flour, liquid and leavening agent to produce a good product if you follow the directions. An inexperienced cook

But if you have more experience and just can't resist trying something different, be sure to change your proportions in keeping with the leavening agent you use.

Why not try this new recipe which was given to the home demonstration agent by Gloria Motley of Wheeler. RAINBOW CAKE:

pkg. orange jello pkg. cherry jello pkg. lime jello cups hot water 1/2 cups cold water

cup pin eapple juice 4 cup sugar pkg. lemon jello

cup water 2 cups graham cracker crumbs 2 cup butter or margarine mel+ ed and 2 cups whipping cream

Prepare the fruit three pkgs. of jello separately using 1 cup hot water and 2 cup cold water. Pour into separate 8x8x12 inch pans and chill until firm. Combine pineapple juice and sugar and heat until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat and siddolve lemon jello in hot liquid; add remaining 1/2 cup of cold water. Chill just until

Mix graham cracker crumbs with melted butter. If desired set aside 1/4 sup for garnish. Then press remaining crumbs smoothly over bottom and sides of a 9 inch spring form

Whip cream and fole into syrupy gelatine. Cut the firm orange, cherry and lime jello into cubes about 1/2 inch square. Foled into whipped cream mixture; then pour into spring-form pan. Chill about 8 hours in refrigerator. Before serving, remove sides of pan only. Sprinkle dessert with remaining crumbs. (Makes 16 servings.)



Dean Tipps is a young man, in his early thirties, that is making a success in the business of farming. He operates three farms totaling 714 acres in the north part of Wheeler County. Dean owns two of these farms and leases one from his mother.

Dean made an exception ally good crop in 1966, considering unusually adverse weather conditions. He has just completed re modeling his home from the extra in come. He and his family: wife - Georgia, sons - Dwight and Terry and daughter - Tam my, live in a comfortable stucco house about seven miles northeast of Briscoe, Texas. Dean is proud of his family, his home and that he is a farmer. He takes pride in his land, his livestock and his equipment. He has also recently completed a new barn and workshop to keep his equipment in good repair

One of the first things that impresses you with Dean is his knowledge of his res ources. He know the resour ces that he has to work with and keeps and excellent system of records. He keeps a seperate system of records for each farm. He recently decided not to rent for anoth er year, a 165 acre farm he was renting. His records show ed he was losing money on his maize crops and was only making 76 cents an acre on his cotton on that particular

himself.

Dean is particularly proud of his conservation plans he has on each of his farms. He uses the plans and the records of previous years to develop the next years program. He would like to apply all the needed permanent conservation practices, but is slowed by a lack of finances. He does as much as he can each year. He has developed a Great Plains contract on land he owns. He has constructed a diversion, a system of terraces and seeded land not suitable for farming to native grass through the Great Plains program. He is doing an outstandingly good job of managing his croplands to receive maximum conservation and economic

returns. In addition to his farming operation, he runs a small herd of cattle He tries to maintain a herd of about 34 cows and heifers to be in balance with his forage production. He is particularly proud of replacment Angus heifers for this year. He tries to keep some heifers for replacement out of high producing cows. Dean said he had a 100 percent calf crop for the past two years. This is a very good indicator of an excellent breeding program and a proper balance of forage. Dean uses native grasses, hybrid sorghums and small grains to provide some type of high quality green forage the vear ground.

Dean is always ready to discuss his conservation plan and works with his neighbors in encouraging them to apply good conservation
