



ZIP CODE for Packages

Use of ZIP Codes will make it easier to mail packages after January 15, Postmaster Virgil Jamison, Jr of Wheeler said today.

New rates and a new system of identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law pound parcel destined for by President Johnson on September 30, 1966, the Postmaster pointed out.

The rate increases will average about 10¢ a parcel, Jamison said. Starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. Wheeler The size and weight increases will be in five annual steps, the las coming on July

Use of ZIP Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional

centers in the country. By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all Post Offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numb-

ers of the ZIP Code represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the

nations 33,000 post offices.

The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three local delivery to 60¢ for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to 1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,800 miles.) The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the Post Office Department. 

By Charles David Jackson SUPPLEMENTAL PHOS-PHORUS CAN UP % CALF CROP, WEANING WEIGHT

With green grazing being limited, beef cattle producers need to give special consideration to supplying phosphorus for their herds. This mineral is deficient at times in all sections of Texas, with late summer, fall and winter being critical periods in all areas.

Cows fed phosphorus supplements where the deficiency occurs may average as much as 200 pounds heavier than those not receiving the supplemental. Calves may weight 50-70 pounds more at weaning age, calf crops can be increased as much as 30 percent and cows may conceive earlier after calving.

Practical methods of supplying phosphorus to range cattle include soluble phosphorus in drinking water and phosphorus supplements in mineral feeders.

Where the water supply of cattle can be controlled, adding phosphorus to the water may be the most satisfactory method. Monosodium phosphorus may be added to water troughs by hand while there are automatic dispensers which add the desired amount of mineral solution to a given amount of water.

Where the mineral is added by hand, recommendations generally call for 1/4 ounce of monosodium phosphate per eight gallons of water or 4 ounce per head daily. A stock solution of two and one-half pounds of this phosphate per gallon of water or 100 pounds to 40 gallons of water is recommended when using an automatic dispenser. This machine automatically proportions

the mineral to the water. Sheltered mineral feeders offer protection from wind and rain and thereby lessens waste. The weathervane type is satisfactory if kept level and treated with a rust preventive. Having the feeding trough 12-18 inches above the ground will permit calves free access to the mineral. be divided so that only salt may be supplied in one compartment and additional minerals in the other.

A mixture of one part salt and two parts steamed bonemeal by weight is recommended for self-feeding where phosphorus is highly deficient. Half and half mixes are best under borderline conditions whereas bonemeal without salt is recommended in saline areas, as in sections of the Gulf Coast. Where salt is fed in mixtures to control protein supplement intake, bonemeal should be fed alone

Additional information on phosphorus and other minerals needed by beef cattle is available at the county extension office.

More New Recipes

While visiting my brother in Houston during the holidays, I ran across some recipes that I would like to share with you. The menu is called See-You Down -The-Road Supper consisting of Schwencke Chowder, Pizza Hash, Hazel's Bean Salad and Meringue Cake Pizza Hash: Chill a 1 pound can of corned beef has. Cut into six slices and arrange in a baking dish. Sprinkle one cup shredded sharp processed American Cheese. Combine 1 (8 oz) can tomato sauce, 1(3 oz) can broiled mushrooms, drained; I teas. garlic salt, ½ teas. crush oregano. Spoon over hash. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese. Bake in a moderately hot (375 degrees F.) oven about 2 minutes or until the hash is well heated, the cheese melted and sauce bubbly. Make 3 servings. Schwencke Chowder

Cook 1/4 cup c hopped onion and 1/2 cup chopped raw bacon until the onions are soft and golden. Stir in 2 cups creamstyle corn. Heat throughly and add 34 cup milk, 14 cup minced parsley, salt and pepper to taste. Cover and let cook gently about 15 minutes. Makes three to four

Hazel's Bean Salad Combine two cups sugar, 1 cup of water, 2 teas salt Cook 10 minutes. Cool. Add 1 cup vinegar and 1 small can each: Kidney, green, wax and Lima Beans, all drained well. Cover and allow to stand in refrigerator as long as feasible preferably overnight. Before serving, add 2 cups chopped celery, 1 large onion(sweet) 1 green pepper, sliced or diced; salt and pepper to taste. This make about 2 quarts of salad but it's a whorthwhile project for it keeps getting better and better as it stands.

Meringue Cake: Beat two or three egg whites until they stand in soft peaks. Then continue beating while you add gradually 1 cup sugar. Lightly fold in one cup chapped nutmeats and add one cup finely crumbled soda cracker crumbs Place in a very lightly greased pan and bake in a moderate oven (350) 15 to 20 minutes. Let it cool a few minutes. Prepare a package of whipped topping or use 2 cups lightly sweetened whipped cream, whipped. Mix with one cup pineapple or apricot preserves. Spread on top of the cake and sprinkle generously with coconut plain or toasted.


