CATTLE—Number, Fed, Feeder

One of America's greatest assets is to produce beef and we seem to keep the total count of cattle high even if we have dry weather and an increased consumption. Beef production in 1967-68 is expected to continue around the 1965-66 level.

CATTLE NUMBERS: The following figures reflect adjustments in USDA livestock estimates. These adjustments

indicate a higher level of cattle numbers in the U.S. than previously reported. The number of cattle on farms declined 0.4 million during 1966 to 108.5 million on January 1, 1967. The number of cattle on farms rose from a cyclical low of 91.2 million head on January 1, 1958 to a peak of 109 million head on January 1, 1965. During 1965 and 1966, cattle numbers declined slightly. Larger cattle slaughter

during the past two years more than offset additions to the inventory from calf crops and live cattle imports. Some further decline in the cattle inventory is expected in 1967. However, beef cattle numbers are expected to increase moderately as they have in the past two years. The number of dairy cattle is expected to decline a little. A 5 percent decline in the number of dairy cattle accounted for all of the decline from January 1, 1966 to January 1, 1967. The num-

ber of beef cattle increased one percent. Beef cows two years and older totaled 34.6 million head on January 1, 1967, up slightly from the 34.6 million a year earlier. The revised data on cows indicates a steady climb in numbers since 1958. There were 24.2 million head on farms in 1958, indicating a 43 percent increase in the nine years. **FED CATTLE:** The supply of young beef cattle at the beginning of this year—either in feedlots or available for feedlot placement, or additions to breeding herds—was up more than 600,000 from a year earlier. Thus, fed cattle marketings in 1967 could be as large or larger than in 1966 without reducing the inventory of calves and yearlings carried into 1968. Continued large supplies of fed beef and substantially larger pork supplies probably will keep fed cattle prices around current levels throughout most of the spring. Some price strength for fed cattle is expected in late spring because of a narrowing in fed cattle marketings over a year earlier, increasingly smaller supplies of non fed beef and seasonally smaller pork supplies. This strength is expected to carry through the summer and through the end of the year. However, with prospects for continued large supplies, the price advance is like to be modest. Consumer demand is expected to continue strong.

FEEDER CATTLE: Because there were 7 percent more cattle and calves on feed January 1, 1967, the number of young animals outside feedlots and still available for either feedlot replacement or for addition to breeding herds was down by almost 100,000 head from a year earlier. Although the supply of young beef cattle outside of feedlots is down slightly from a year earlier, the available supply is adequate to enable a further increase over 1966 in feedlot placements and marketings during the balance of 1967, because about 5.3 million of the 25.6 head of steers and heifers slaughtered in 1966 did not move through feedlots. Many of these in 1966 may not have been suitable for feedlot feeding, however, a considerable larger portion could have been fed.

Due to the large supply of feeder cattle and the lower level of fed cattle prices, it is unlikely that there will be much further seasonal strength in feeder cattle prices this spring. However, expanded feedlot capacity will likely maintain sufficient demand to keep feeder cattle prices above fed cattle prices for the next few months. **PRICE SUMMARY FOR 1967** Average annual cattle prices for the year 1967 are not expected to differ greatly from those of 1966.

Soil and Water Conservation
According to a recent survey by Agricultural Scientist the best time to seed native grasses is between March 15 and April 15. A better stand is obtained in usually a shorter time when seeded at this time. It is generally best to seed introduced grasses, such as weeping lovegrass, between May 1 and June 15th. The best stands of grass are obtained when seeding is done in a prepared dead litter cover of sorghum, such as red top cane. Other suitable seedbeds might be laid out on land with a weed cover or johnsongrass, or old grass that has been plowed with wide sweeps or 'scalped' lightly with oneway or tandem disc. The only grass that has produced a consistent stand when seeded on a clean tilled seedbed, is weeping lovegrass. Seeding weeping lovegrass on a clean tilled seedbed is now recognized as permissible under Great Plains Conservation Program (GP) Seedings. All farmers GP contracts who plan to seed weeping lovegrass on clean seedbeds should contact the SCS office in Wheeler. Payment can be made for the plowing to make the clean tilled seedbed at the rate of \$2.40 an acre. It must be scheduled in the GP contract before the work is started.

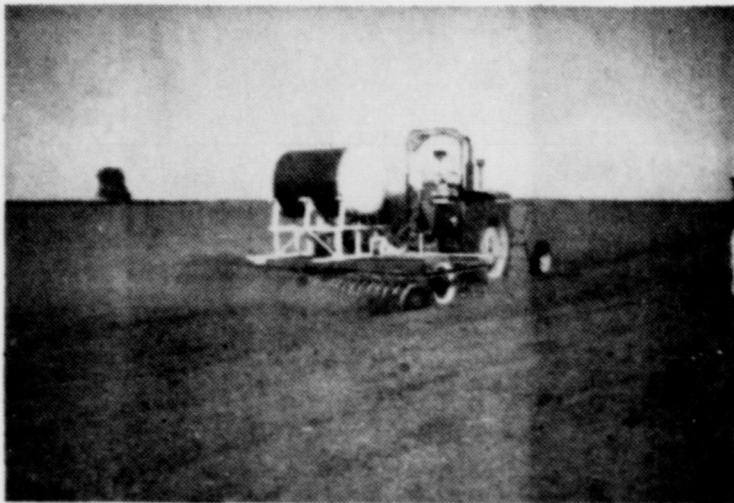

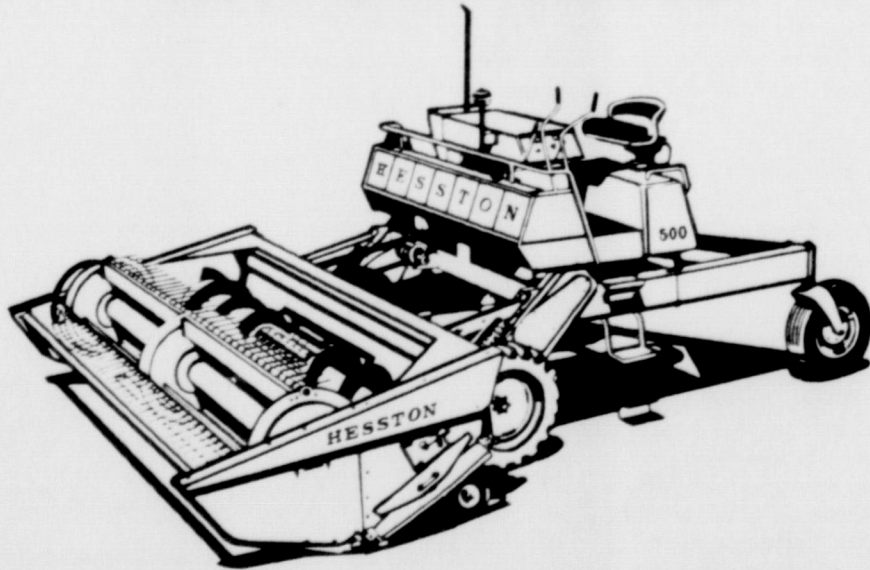

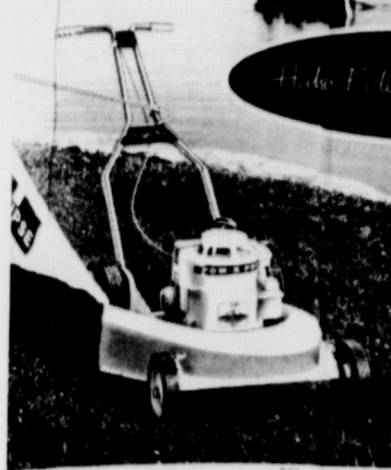

getting close to start a brush control program if it is to be done this year.

For the chemical control of shinnery, we should start our spraying operation when the plant is in full leaf, but not wait until the leaves have reached their mature state. This will usually occur somewhere between the 15th of April and the 1st of June. The best results have been obtained during this time period.

In order for us to see the value of controlling brush on our range land, we only have to visit a pasture that has been controlled. In most cases where there has been proper management after brush control, we can see a vast improvement of the stand and vigor of the native grasses. It is very important in the management of range land to defer grazing for at least 90 days after brush control. This gives the damaged plants a chance to recover before being grazed and will pay off in the amount of forage available in the long run.

Farmers and ranchers that have a good place for a wild life refuge are encouraged to leave these areas for the protection of quail, deer and other wild life. Wild life is fast becoming a very important part of the economy of this area.

If you have a problem with brush, you can obtain both technical and financial help through the Great Plains Conservation Program administered through the Soil Conserva-

tion Service assisting the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, or through the ASCS program. Now is the time to make preparation for a brush control program if you intend to go into it this year.

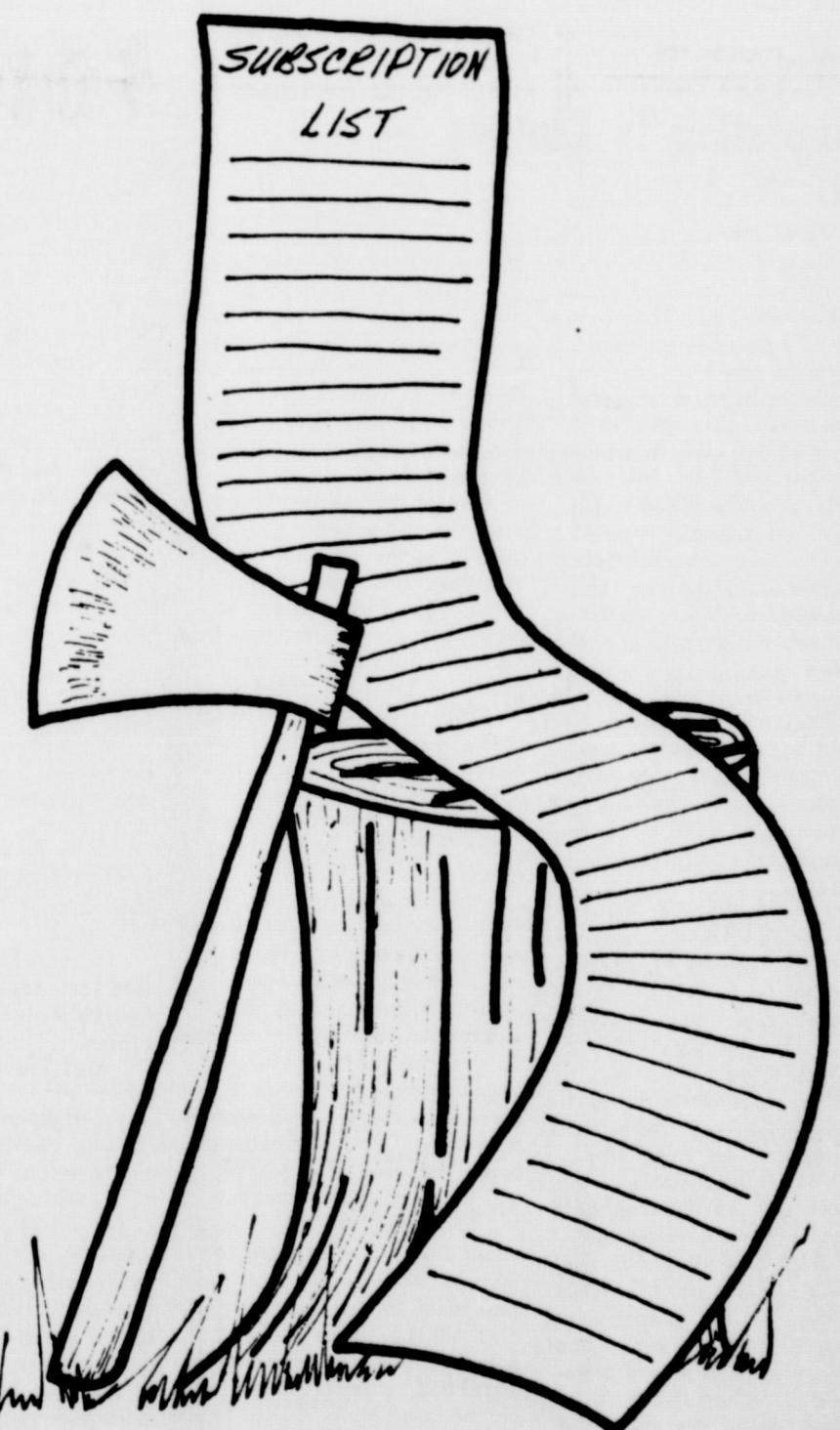

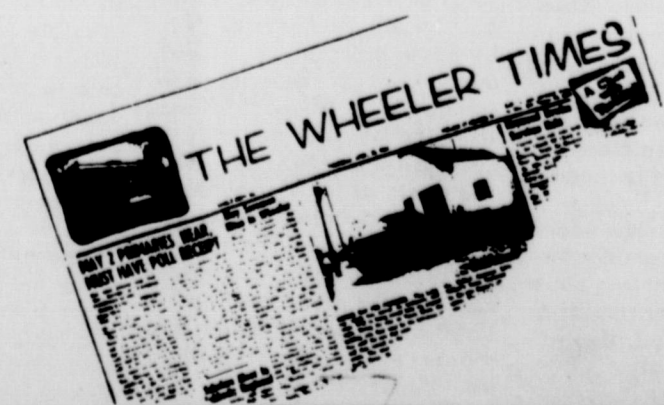

Disposable apparel is made from a thin netting of rayon or nylon sandwiched between layers of specially processed cellulose. Other disposable garments are made of spun-bonded olefin or saran. The materials, before being made into apparel, can be treated to make them fire-retardant, water and abrasion resistant - or even luminous, as in jackets for highway workers. How are these garments being used? Women and girls enjoy the novelty of disposable garments as well as the ease of care. Some women are using them for maternity apparel. Others find them ideal to wear while doing messy household chores such as cleaning the oven. For the bride disposable bridal gowns are available as well as bridesmaid dresses and flower girl dresses. For the do-it-yourself cutup, a gold or silver evening gown can be created from a packet of paper on jewels, pattern and paper fabric. It is thought that dresses which are copies of original Paris designs will soon be available. Men and boys are also enjoying disposable garments. Probably the biggest success story is the disposable swim suit for men. It is available at many hotels which either sell or give them to the traveling man who would like a swim but hasn't brought his suit. These garments are made of olefin and resemble lightweight vinyl. They will last from three to five wearings. One paper manufacturing company is testing paper gold slacks, underwear and coveralls. For boys, there are disposable football jerseys. velop a machine which will cut and seal a number of garments in one operation. However, the notable fact in the world of disposable items is that their success is not always dictated by cost. For years housewives laboriously emptied vacuumcleaner dust bags, when the handy throw away bag came along they purchased it enthusiastically even at an extra cost. Disposable handkerchiefs have almost become a necessity in the American way of life. Other disposables may be just as taken for granted in the future. It is almost impossible to think that in the future a housewife may be able to purchase inexpensive paper garments in cartons of a dozen or so, at a local supermarket along with her groceries. But for the present, despite the proliferation of garment styles and types since the first paper dress, many disposable items are available only in certain areas and others are available only in large department stores.

Natural Gas News
Chicago-Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America has been authorized by the Federal Power Commission, Washington, D.C., to construct and operate facilities to connect its system to the large gas supply the Company has under contract in southeastern New Mexico. Approval for the 20.6 million dollar project--which includes about 256 miles of new pipeline extending to the Company's mainline in the Texas Panhandle--was granted March 30, and gives NGPL a direct route to the east gas reserves located in the Permian-Delaware Basin area. F.P. Burns, NGPL's executive vice president of production, Amarillo, in response to the FPC order said, "Our Company will diligently continue efforts to purchase additional gas reserves in

the area to meet demands of our customers in the Midwest." Project plans call for new pipeline to be constructed in Eddy, Lea and Roosevelt Counties, N.M., Moore, Potter, Randall, Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer, Bailey and Hutchinson Counties, Texas. NGPL already has about 44 miles of 20 inch diameter line in Eddy County, N.M. The line delivers gas to Transwestern Pipeline Company under a temporary exchange agreement authorized by the FPC in 1965. Under the new FPC order, NGPL will deliver its Permian-Delaware reserves to market when the new line is completed--and will no longer receive gas from Transwestern in the Texas Panhandle. The new facilities are expected to be in service for the 1967-68 winter heating season.

A Chat with The Editor

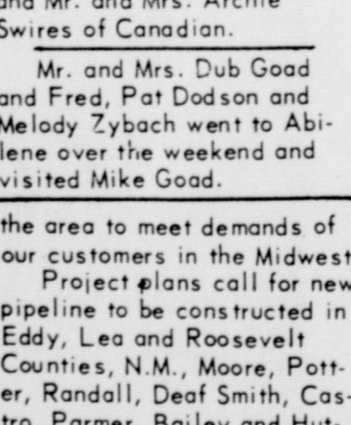
