From the Postmasters Desk:

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect, Monday, May 1, Postmaster Jamison announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's. The rate increases for

both surface and airmail -- averaging 13%--were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail opera-

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post offi-

ce, Postmaster Jamison said. This was the first increase in international rates since July 1961

The increases are: 1. Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13¢ a half ounce to 15¢. 2. Airmail to the rest of the Western hemisphere remains 15¢ a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico. 3. Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15¢ a half ounce to 20¢. 4. Airmail letter rates to the rest of the world remain unchanged at 25¢ a half ounce. 5. Aerogrammes and Air post cards increased 2¢ from 11¢ to 13¢ each.

6. I tems sent by air, other then letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10¢ per

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



the western part of the state, points out Wiese. Weed losses run up to \$48 million annually in the High plains and this amounts to about one-third of the losses

on all crop land in the state. Overall, the Texas situtation looks like this. Weed losses amount to \$774 million every year. Losses on range land amount to \$367 million; on field crops, \$260 million; and on other crops, \$147 million.

The set illustrates both annual and perennial weeds most common to West Texas and how they rob the soil of moisture and nutrients, the agronomist points out. And, in turn, the slides clearly show how weeds rob the farmer and rancher.

This new approach, in lieu of an annual weed control conference, is a joint undertaking of Texas A&M University and the Texas Weed control Ass'n.

The slide set accompanied with a 15 minute taped narration is noncommercial and is available to all interested individuals and firms.

Generally a storm cell containing tornadoes moves from the southwest to the northeast. However, DON'T DEPEND ON IT! Tornadoes have been known to travel in every possible direction. They have been known to lash from side to side. For no apparent reason, they may go forward along a track, lift and appear on another track anywhere from 50 yards to 4 mile to one side, then move back. They are totally unpredictable in behavior.

Tornadoes are most likely to occur in mid-afternoon, generally between 3 and 7 p.m. But, they have occurred at all times of day.

Precipitation is often associated with a tornado. It generally occurs first as rain, frequently accompanied by hail just preceding the storm and as a heavy downpour immediately to the left of the tornado's path.

If you have no chance to retreat from a tornado, the best protection is take cover in an open ditch. You might attempt to drive away from one, but this is harzardous since a secondary funnel may form in front of you. Your best judgement might be used as to wether to take cover or try to escape.

The noise of a tornado is loud and distinctive. When nearby, the roar is intense. often described as resembl ing the noise of several trains moving through a tunnel. When the funnel is well above the ground, a peculiar whine may be heard like the buzzing of many insects or airplane engines. These sounds may forewarm you of a approaching funnel. Don't turn in an alarm just because you hear them, but DO report suspicious noises.

start several thousand feet above the earth's surface and some never reach the ground. Others touch the ground and rise again. Only the spinning funnel which reaches the ground is termed a tornado.

The official designation of this cloud formation is cumulus mamma.* The Bottoms of the cloud are marbled due to downward currents of cold air inside. Clouds of this nature are often observed in the vicinity of tornadoes and violent hailstorms. However, the presence of such clouds gives little warming of the appearance of a tornado, since they are generally not formed until after a storm cell has been produced.

Twisted Horizontal funnels contary to popular belief most tornado funnels are not the straight up and down type. They can be crooked, horizontal or in nearly any position. A large number of funnels lying nearly horizontally are often overlooked.

Funnel in front of low clouds - tornadoes are often obscured by clouds and dust, It is rare that a tornado cell will have only one funnel in it. You should watch for more than one, even though only one is on the ground. REMEMBER TO WATCH FOR THE SECONDARY FUNNEL.
