## HISTORICAL MARKER TO BE **ERECTED FOR MOBEETIE**

The official Texas Historical marker for the "Town of Mobe etie," will be erected soon today announced Mrs. Grady Harris of Wheeler, chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey

Committee. The marker will be placed at Mobeetie on Highway 152 Dedication plans will be announced by Mrs. Harris.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 18 x 28" and is sponsored by Isabel and Mabel Huselby in honor of their father, Mark Huselby.

This is the 19th official Texas Historical Marker to be errected in Wheeler County The inscription on the marker reads:

MOBEETIE Oldest Town in Texas Panhandle. Originally a trading post, 2 mi. south, 1874; moved nearer to Fort Elliott 1875. Earlier called Sweetwater, was renamed in 1879. Courthouse was complet-

ed by Mark Huselby, First County Tax Assessor and other citizens. Popular with Hunters, Cowboys, Gamblers--Town

in 1881 became Judicial

Center of 35th District. Temple Houston, son of the hero, Sam Houston, was first district attorney and the first State Senator for

this district. After bypass by the Santa Fe Railroad (1888) and a destructive 1898 tornado,

(Incise on back) Isabel and Mabel, In memory of their father, Mark Huselby.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5- year RAMPS program to record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey Texas history. More than 3,300 official Texas Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPS program was begun in 1964.

Thismarker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours and to acquaint the people of Wheeler County with their own unique historical past.
