DR. NEESE ARRIVES WHEELER TODAY BEAUTY PAGEANT IS MONDAY

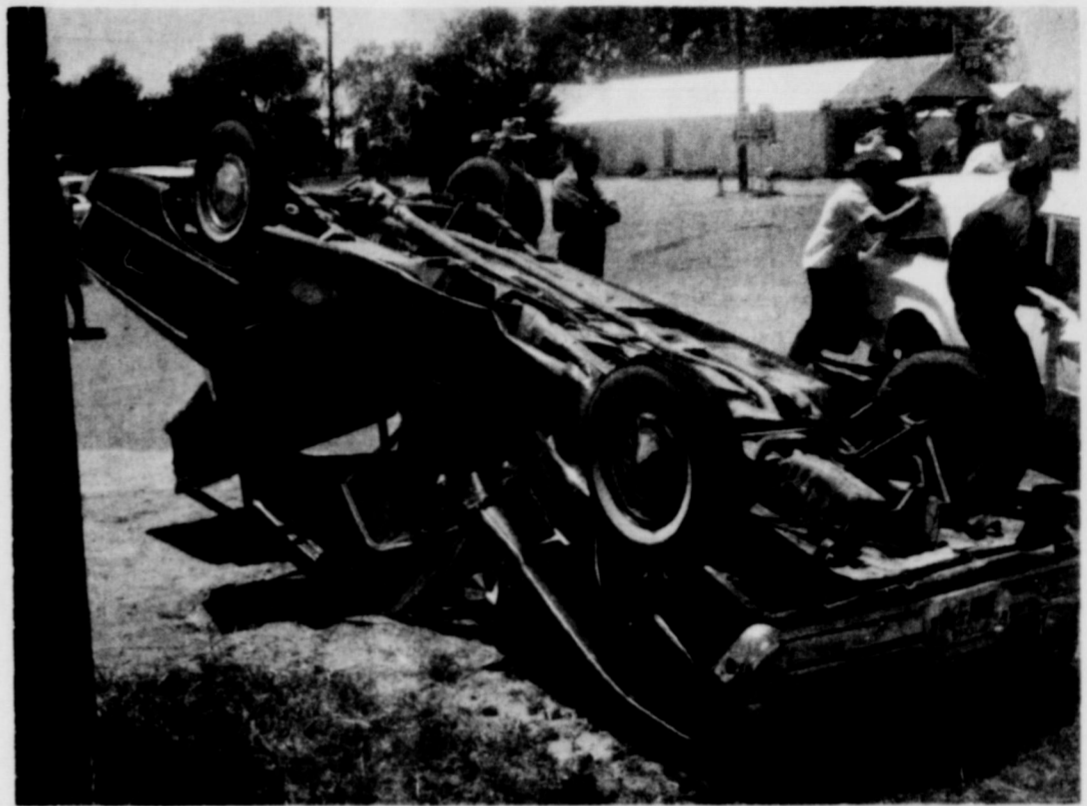

MOBEETIE ACCIDENT CLAIMS LIFE OF MRS. JACK MILLER

A 66 year old Mobeetie woman, Mrs. Imogene Miller, was fatally injured Sunday in a two car collision at the intersection of State Highway 152 and Farm-to-Market Road 48, between New and Old Mobeetie.

According to the highway patrol spokesman, Mrs. Miller was traveling north on the farm-to-market road when the car she was driving collided in the intersection with a vehicle driven by Alvie W. French of Pampa.

French, his wife and two children escaped injury in the accident. Mrs. Miller was thrown from her vehicle and she was taken to Parkview Hospital in Wheeler, then transferred to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo where she died.

The accident occurred at about 12:30 p.m.

Mrs. Miller was a member of the Church of Christ of Wheeler.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. A.W. Carmichael of Hobbs, N.M.; two sisters, Mrs. Lottie Roundtree of Lubbock and Mrs. Maxine Rankin of Friona and one grandson, Bruce Carmichael.

Mrs. Miller's husband, Jack preceded her in death in 1962.

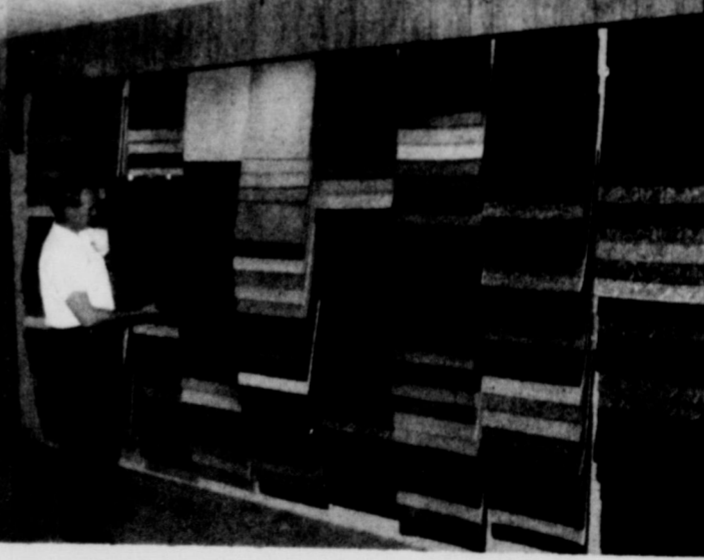

SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH

May has been proclaimed as Senior Citizen month. Did you know that in 1966, there were an estimated 851,705 aged persons in Texas representing 8 percent of the State's population? In Wheeler County alone 15% of the population are 65 years and older. The number of older people is increasing at a considerable faster rate than the State's total population.

A baby born in the United States in 1800 had an average life expectancy of around 35 years. By 1900 the average age a death for babies born that year had increased to 48. Youngsters born in 1966, however, have an average life expectancy of slightly more than 70 years. So rapid has been the increase in life expectancy that a baby born in the United States today has a better chance of living to 60 than a youngster born in 1900 had of reaching its fifth birthday.

As older people continue their rapid increase in numbers and make up an increasingly larger share of the total population, they will receive wider public attention. Their role in politics will become greater, and more attention will be given to their recreation and housing needs, to different kinds of pension and retirement programs and to medical and welfare services for the aged.

Since women live on the average 6 years longer than men, female numerical superiority increases with age. In 1960, there were 1,150 females per 1,000 males 65 to 74 years of age; 1,308 women per 1,000 men 75 to 84; and 1,521 females per 1,000 males 85 or older. Thus, it is recognized that control of property which is increasingly passing into the hands of older people will be largely in the hands of widows. Older women, however, are known to be more interested in security and less in investing in different kinds of risk ventures which have been important in the development of our nation's economy.

A total of 143,000 older Texans were living alone in 1960. Of that number, 73% were females and 27% males. Approximately 6 of 10 occupants of single-person households lives in owner-occupied and the remainder in renter-occupied units. Also in 1960 there were 11,558 older persons living in homes for the aged in Texas. This number has undoubtedly increased greatly, since attitudes of older people toward this type living arrangements are changing materially in the 1960's.

Income continues to be a problem for many elderly people. In 1959 the median income of all families where the head of household was an older person and both husband and wife were living was less than half the income of all families in Texas with both husband and wife living. Older females living alone or with non-relatives had a median income of \$745 in 1959 and older males living alone or with non-relatives had a median income of \$90. Are you doing your part in helping these people?

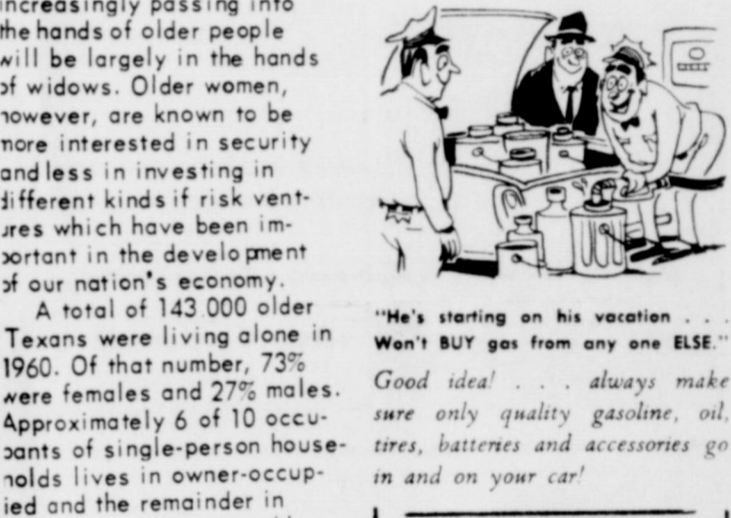
