Texas A&M University has a forage testing service. We have information sheets and collection bags in our office. We figure a 10% crude protein hay at four bits a bale would be worth twice or much as a bale of 5% crude protein hay at the same price. 

June is National Barbecue Month and with the advent of warm weather, the "outdoor chef" at your house is probably getting ready for this first debut of the season. Why don't you let him try one ham from San Angelo and Mrs. of these tasty barbecye sauce Eula Markham were dinner Hot Barbecue Sauce:

You'll need one cup tomato juice, 4 cup bron sugar, 4 cup lemon juice or vinegar, 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper, 1 8 teaspoon allspice, 1 bay leaf, 1 tablespoon diced green pepper, 1 teaspoon chili powder, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard and 4 teaspoon ground cloves.

Combine all ingredients and mix thoroughly. Use as a marinade or for basting meat during cooking. Makes 114

Tart Barbecue Sauce: The recipe calls for 1 cup soy sauce, 1 cup salad oil, 34 sup lemon juice and 1 split garlic clove.

Combine soy sauce, salad oil and lemon juice. Mix to blend and add garlic clove. May be brushed on meat during cooking or used as a marinade. Makes 21/2 Cups.

Barbecue Sauce is no good without the barbecue, so treat the whole family to one of the most favored of beef cuts, steak.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recommends that you select 1 to 2 inch steaks from the rib, short loin or sirloin. For delicious eating, these cuts should have little connective tissue and some marbling of fat through the

Start the Barbecue charcoal grill, 30 minutes to one hour before placing the steaks on the grill. The coals should be red and burned throughout.

The length of time that the steaks should remain on the grill depends on personal taste as well as how hot the coals are. A general rule would be, 1 inch steak, 10 minutes for a rare steak, 15 minutes for a medium and about 20-25 minutes for well


