Arville Dean was holding the hose at the time of the explosion; he turned the butane off and rolled on the ground, "As I had been trained to do."

The trio got into their pickup and drove a mile to the trailer house parked at the farm. Mrs. Darville Atherton "took the wheel" and started to the hospital with the injured. They had travel ed only a few miles when a tire blew out.

'Modern Communications and transportation "Baker points out, "have made possible a new kind of functional rural community that has a population base adequate to support a large num ber of basic public services. Generally this new type of community includes two or more rural counties and at east one small city which is the focal point of local economic, educational and social activity. Areas of this type can undertake development programs that no single county or community could afford.

In addition, Mr. Baker's instruction listed the contributions to be made in rural areas development by USDA agencies that do not have nationwide, countylevel field staffs.

For example, the Consumer and Marketing Service will provide Technical assistance in the area of marketing services and food assistance programs. The Farmer Cooperative

service will help provide advisory and educational

The Forest Service, thand private program, will provide technical assistance in each area where forests are economically important.

The Rural Electrification Administration, working through its borrower organiza tions, will furnish credit-find ing aid for commercial and industrial projects.

Support efforts of the Agricultural Research Service, the Cooperative State Research Service the Econo mic Research Service the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and the Statistical Reporting Service were also listed.

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SAFE PICNICS

By Vivian Warminski The roll of the sea, the echo of the mountain, the whisper of the balmy breeze all tell the tale of July picnic month.

When nature calls you to the great outdoors, be prepared for that favorite American summer pastime -- picnic ng. It is a good idea to keep a few supplies on hand for that impulsive excursion. But before you lay in store these picnic makings, the cautions you to be informed on the causes and prevention of good poisoning.

The best way to prevent infectious bacteria from grow ing is to keep food either hot (above 120 degrees) or cold (below 50 degrees.) Of course, this is not always possible, but when perishables are part of the picnic festivities, a cooler is an ab solute necessity.

The major cause of poi soning bacteria is the uninformed or careless food hand. ler. Open cuts, sores or boils can contaminate both the food and the equipment you are using. Dangerous microorganisms can also be carried by flies, cats dogs, rodents and unclean uten-

It is a good idea to have the salad dressing or mayonnaise out of such picnic favorities as potato salad and cole slaw until you are ready to eat. Foods with mayonnaise or saidd dressing are particularly susceptible to food poisoning bacteria. If a pre mixed salad must be taksmall containers rather than in a large one.

Nevery carry hot foods, such as fried chicken, baked beans, macaroni and cheese or casseroles, unless they are packed in an insulated container - or are thoroughly chilled first, refrigerated and then reheated at the picnic.

If you don't want to carry a cooler plan your picnic meal around fool proof foods such as bread, cheese, hard cooked eggs, fresh fruit, etc.

any canned meat or poultry product that you can carry in the can, such as corned beef chili, ham or some of the dry or semi-dry sausages and children of the service like salami, summer sausage, and on their way to Germany thuringer and lebanon bolo

Be careful of leftovers. cream sauces and other foods which are not reheated to the boiling point. They are potential sources of food poisoning. Another thing to be aware of is that foods which have been handled a lot, such as salads, sandwich fillings and casseroles are more susceptible to food poisoning bacteria than are many other foods.

If it is not possible to take canned meats, raw meat can be taken to be cooked at a picnic if it is carefully wrapped and chilled. It would be a good idea to freeze the meats beforehand to insure they'll stay cold
