Chamber Plans to Have Speaker

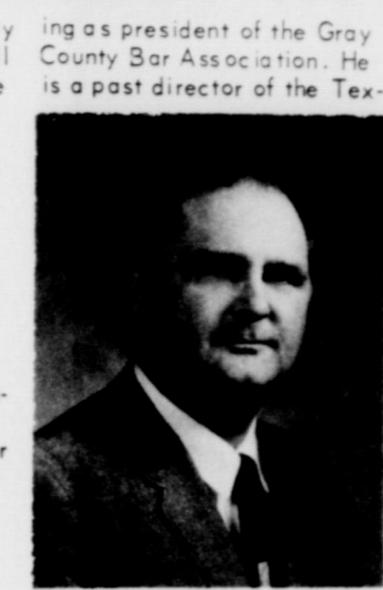
The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will hold its regular meeting, Tuesday, January 16th at 7:00 P.M. at Nora's Cafe.

DON CAIN ANNOUNCES FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Don Cain, Pampa attorney announced today that he will be a candidate for the office of the District Attorney of the 31st Judicial District subject to the action of the Democratic Primary.

Cain, a graduate of the University of Texas Law School, began his law practice here in 1951. He has served as County Attorney of Gray County since 1955. Cain has served his community as president of the Pampa Rotary Club, director of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, president of the Adobe Walls Council Boy Scouts of America, and director of the Pampa United Fund. He is presently serving as president of the Gray County Bar Association. He is a past director of the Texas District & County Attorneys Association.

The 31st Judicial District includes Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Roberts and Wheeler Counties.

"Respect for law and order is vital for our community," Cain said. "Law violators must be vigorously and fairly prosecuted, and the office of district attorney shoulders much of this responsibility. Good law enforcement seeks the support of all citizens of our district."

Cain and his wife, Betty, reside at 1826 Williston in Pampa, with their four children, David, a sophomore student at McMurry College; Dale, a freshman student at Southwestern University; Dennie, an 8th grade student at Lee Junior High School; and Randy, a 6th grade student at Austin School.

YOU MUST REGISTER TO VOTE

This week marked the opening of a statewide newspaper campaign organized by Secretary of State John L. Hill to promote voter registration in Texas. One feature of the registration drive is the publication of an application form which voters may cut out and mail to the county tax assessor collector, who acts as the registrar of voters. The deadline for registration is January 31.

Hill has organized the registration drive in his capacity as chief election officer of the state, a title which the Texas legislature conferred on the Secretary of State last year, along with placing upon him the important new responsibilities in the administration of the state's election laws. In commenting on the drive, Hill said that one of his purposes is to publicize new laws affecting voting rights, which otherwise might go unnoticed by the average citizen.

One of the new laws enacted in 1967 makes registration necessary, for the first time in Texas history, for persons over 60 years old who live in rural communities and towns under ten thousand population. Heretofore, persons over 60 were required to register only if they lived in a city having more than ten thousand inhabitants. Many tax assessor collectors have expressed a fear that lack of information concerning this new requirement will bring about disfranchisement of many elderly voters through their failure to register.

In order to vote in statewide elections, a person must meet the following qualifications on the day of the election: he must be over 21 years old and must be a citizen of the United States; he must have resided in Texas for one year immediately preceding the election; and he must have registered for the voting year in which the election is held.

In order to vote in local elections (county, school district, etc.), he must also have resided in the county for six months immediately preceding the election. Residence in the city for six months is required for voting in a city election.

A new law enacted in 1967 permits voters who move from one Texas county to another within the period of six months preceding an election to vote on state-wide offices and issues if they have lived in the state for a year. Formerly, a voter was totally disfranchised for a six-month period following removal to another county unless the county from which he moved was in the same congressional, legislative or judicial district as the county to which he moved. A constitutional amendment adopted in 1966 authorized enactment of the new legislation.

The Texas election code enumerates "idiots and lunatics and all persons convicted of any felony except those restored to full citizenship and right of suffrage or pardoned" as classes of persons who are not qualified to vote.

Texas voters must register annually. The 1968 voting year will begin on March 1, 1968 and will end on February 28, 1969. The registration period for the 1968 voting year began last October 1 and will end on January 31, 1968. Any citizen of Texas who now possesses the necessary qualifications for voting or who will attain them by February 28, 1969, may register during the current registration period.

Except for three limited classes of voters, all persons wishing to vote at any time during the 1968 voting year must register by the January 31 deadline, even though they may not yet possess full qualifications for voting. The only registration permitted after January 31 is (1) by persons who move into Texas after October 1, 1967, (2) by persons becoming 21 years old after January 31, 1968, and (3) by former aliens who are naturalized after January 31, 1968. The first and second classes may also register during the regular period. Registration certificates issued to persons not yet qualified to vote are marked to show the date on which they will become qualified.

FHA News

1967 A Year Of Growth For FHA

Calendar year 1967 was one of tremendous growth for the Farmers Home Administration in Texas.

The Wheeler unit composed of Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts County has seen a considerable growth in housing loans. During the period 28 rural housing loans were made.

Economic Opportunity loans were made to low income rural families. There were 52 operating and emergency type loans made for farm operating expenses for a total amount of \$509,173. Included in many of the operating loans were funds for purchase of capital goods items which are scheduled for repayment over several years period.

There were approximately 100 families directly benefited through loans advanced by Farmers Home Administration.

The following types of loans are available through Farmers Home Administration: farm ownership; rural housing; labor housing; senior citizen rental housing; senior citizen housing; direct and insured; farm operating; emergency operating; soil and water; economic opportunity loans to individuals and cooperatives; and association loans for water and sewer and grazing. The FHA office is located at 112 W. Oklahoma Street in Wheeler, Texas.

Hogs: Romarcie is dead, or it had better be as far as the hogmen are concerned. Average hog returns in the last half of December sank to the lowest levels since the middle of February in 1965. It was a struggle at that time to get much more than 17¢ per pound for a top hog. Most forecasters thought if you still have faith in folks who predicted 22¢ hogs by Christmas, see hog prices moving higher in the next couple of months and see good hog men making money into next summer.

Foot and Mouth disease in Great Britain is causing precautionary procedures to be taken in this country even though the risk of any outbreak here is remote. Livestock owners here need to notify me or their local veterinarian if they notice the following symptoms - salivation, lameness and other signs of foot and mouth disease in your herd including (1) marked rise in temperature (2) sticky, foamy and stringy saliva and (3) abortion of pregnant animals.

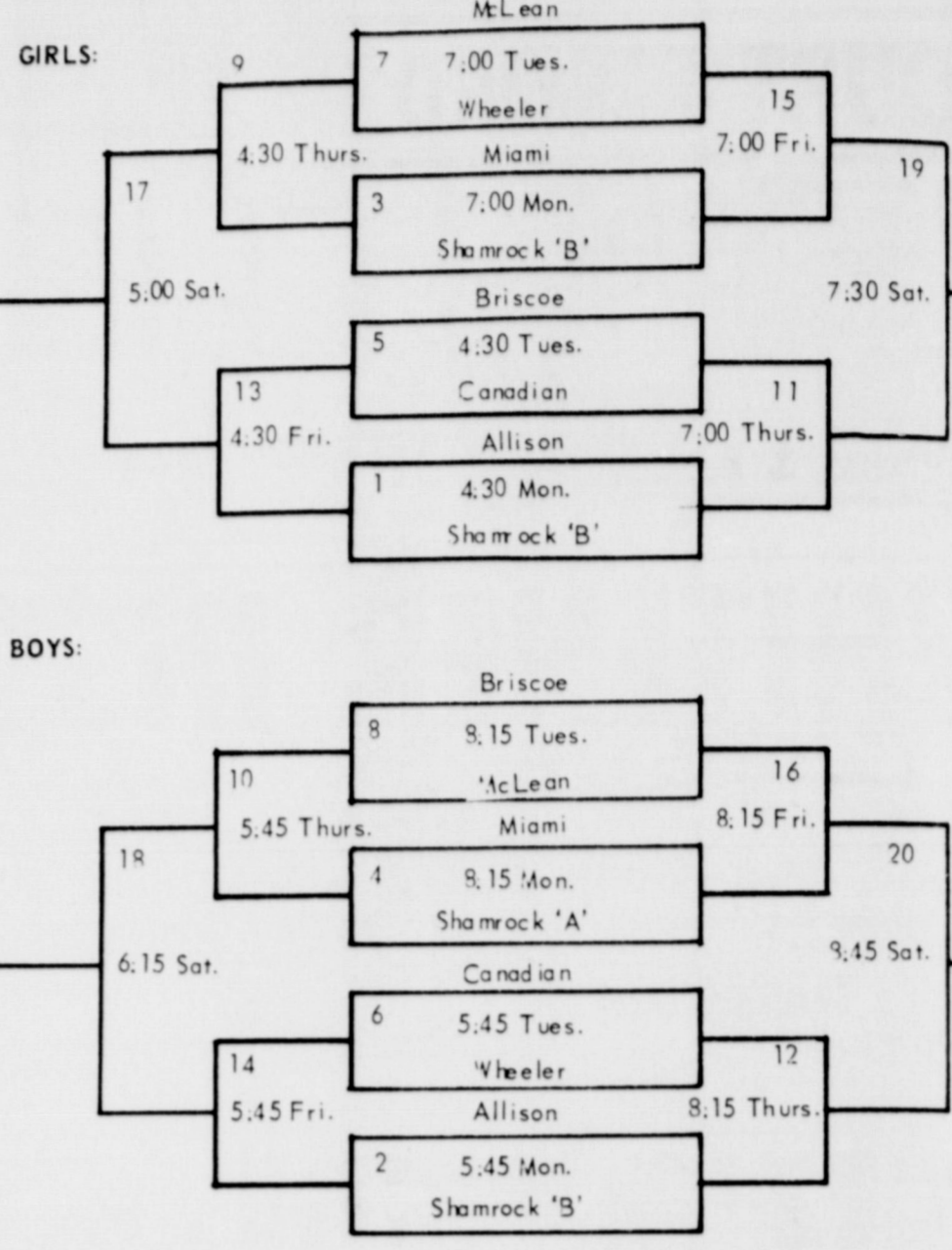

Decoupage? What Is That?

 Decoupage? What is that? It is an aged art, so old it seems new, revived by contemporary craftsmen for both pleasure and profit. Webster's International Dictionary defines it as the art of decorating surfaces with paper cut-outs.
 Decoupage had its beginning in Venice, Italy in the 1700's. It soon spread all over Europe. Many exquisite works were done and these can be found in museum's today. The work lasted until the nineteenth century and then disappeared. It was revived again in America during the 20th century. Since then, its popularity has had its ups and downs.
 Decoupage consists of cut-outs (pictures, poems, maps, lace and etc.) pasted on a prepared surface to be decorated. It is then antiqued and varnished until the cut-outs can no longer be felt.

 Decoupage can be very expensive if a person doesn't know what to buy. If careful and certain of what a person wants, it is an inexpensive creative tool. The main ingredients for a successful decoupage project are patience and effort.
 During the last two weeks of January, the Home Demonstration Agent will be demonstrating the Decoupage procedure to the Home Demonstration clubs in Shamrock, Wheeler, Kelton and Briscoe. If you are interested in learning, please contact the agent for time and place of the club nearest you and attend.

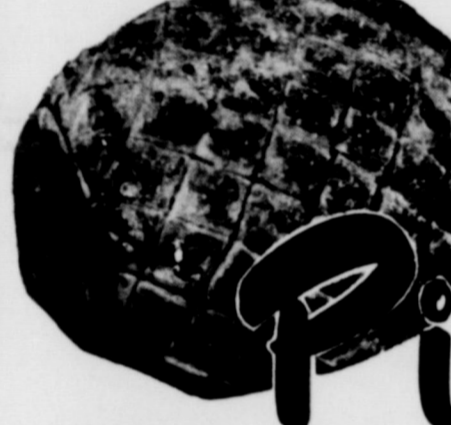

Soil Conservation News

Donald A. Williams, the man who has headed up the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service for almost half of its 32-year history, has been selected as one of five outstanding federal careerists to receive the 1967 Rockefeller Public Service Award.
The honor, made possible by a grant by John D. Rockefeller 3rd and administered by Princeton University, recognizes Williams' guidance of the SCS from the dustbowl age to today's complex soil and water conservation programs.
A tax-free cash award of \$10,000 will be made to Mr. Williams and the other awardees at the Washington Hilton Hotel on Dec. 6.
The Rockefeller Awards were created in 1960 to bring to the public attention the high caliber of men and women in the Federal career service," according to Robert F. Goheen, president of Princeton.
"Recipients are the people in our national government who make the wheels go round," Goheen said, "who set the example for thousands of younger, promising officials, and who year by year increase the efficiency of the accomplishments of the many departments and agencies that serve the American people."
Williams early recognized the revolutionary changes that were taking place in agriculture and conservation programs when he took the helm of the SCS in 1952. From a basically erosion control job, he has guided his agency through growth that has brought flood control, urban conservation, regional resource development and many additional responsibilities. His philosophy is that soil and water conservation is interwoven into everyone's existence.
"Conservation is everybody's business because it affects everybody—in the

cities as well as on the farms," Williams says.
"For example, it is necessary to keep silt out of harbors, in addition to keeping topsoil on the land. We have long recognized that much of the choicest agricultural land was being diverted to other uses—subdivisions, factories, airports, housing developments. So we now classify soils for non-agricultural uses," Williams said. "Today this work involves metropolitan planning and zoning boards and the blending of rural and urban interests in land use."
A native of Clark, South Dakota, Williams received his B.S. degree in civil engineering from South Dakota State College. He later did graduate work at the same college and at the University of South Dakota. In 1956 he received an honorary degree of Doctor of Agriculture from South Dakota State University, the first such degree ever awarded to a civil engineer.
Williams joined the Soil Conservation Service in 1935 and held a number of jobs as a field engineer before coming to Washington in 1950.
He now serves as consultant to the Ford Foundation and has been advisor to the governments of 17 countries on problems of soil and water conservation. He has been consultant to the Agency for International Development in Latin America and Asia, and directs projects in several countries. He recently returned from three weeks in India where he reviewed the Soil Conservation Service technical assistance program there.
Williams received the Distinguished Service Award of the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts in 1957 and the Distinguished Service Award of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1958.

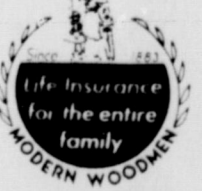
