
**Beene Hostess for October Meeting**

Cotton classing offices are now furnishing micronaire readings, without additional charge on all Smith-Doxey cotton samples submitted for classing. John L. McCollum, in charge of the southwest area cotton division office of the U S Department of Agriculture, Dallas, told me this week.

This is in keeping with USDA's announcement Oct. 25 that micronaire ("Mike") measurements of fineness and maturity will be included as an additional factor for 1965 upland cotton going under price support loan after Oct. 31.

For the last three years, USDA cotton classing offices of this area have provided mike service, for an extra fee. Now, however, mike readings will appear on all official classification cards right along with grade and staple, under the Smith-Doxey program administered by USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Mike readings, used widely in commercial channels are measured on a scale from 2.4 to 8.0, in steps of one-tenths. It works like this: Compressed air at 6 pounds

pressure is forced through the sample of cotton. A special air-flow instrument registers the mike reading of that particular sample. Fine cottons permit less air to pass through. Thus, the finer the fibers, the lower the readings. Fineness, depending on conditions, can be related to maturity. Fineness and maturity affect the spinability and value of cotton.

Included in the USDA announcement was a schedule of premiums and discounts that will be applied when cotton is put under loan. If the mike reading ranges 3.6 through 4.8, a premium value of 14 points per pound will be allowed. No premium or discount will be allowed if the reading is 3.3 through 5.5 or 4.9 through 5.1 but discounts will apply if readings are outside these.

approximately one cent per pound more for the light weight calves.

Comparing heavy and light calves from the individual ranches, the heavy calves brought anywhere from \$12 to over \$38 more per head than did the light weights. The average difference per head was \$24.36 in favor of the heavier calves, even though the light weight calves brought a cent more per pound.

There are a number of ways to increase weaning weights. One method, that probably the least expensive is to cull the perennially calving cows and use better management during the breeding season, to bunch up the calf group and get a greater percentage of calves during the early part of the calving season.

Another possibility is a little extra feed to the cow during the poor feed season prior to calving and after calving so that the cows produce more milk over a longer period of time. This will cost money, but 200 to 400 pounds of feed at the right time may very well pay you back twice the return calf weight for what the feed cost.

Another sure way is to use only performance bulls proven to be rapid gainers, as these bulls will be rapid gaining calves.
