



Cotton classing offices are now furnishing micronaire that particular sample. Fine readings, without additional charge on all Smith-Doxey cotton samples submitted for cotton samples submitted for readings. Fineness, dependclassing, John L McCollum, in charge of the southwest area cotton division office of the US Department of Agriculture, Dallas, told me this week.

This is in keeping with USDA's announcement Oct. 25 that micronaire ("Mike") measurements of fineness and the mike reading ranges 3.6 maturity will be included as an additional factor for 1965 upland cotton going under price support loan after Oct.

For the last three years, USDA cotton classing offices of this area have provided mike service, for an extra fee. Now, however, mike readings will a pear on all official classification cards right along with grade and staple, under the Smith-Doxey program administered by USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Mike readings, used widely in commercial channels are measured on a scale from 2.4 to 8.0, in steps of onetenths. It works like this: Compressed air at 6 pounds 

the sample of cotton. A speisters the mike reading of cottons permit less air to pass through. Thus, the finer the fibers, the lower the ing on conditions, can be related to maturity. Fineness and maturity affect the spinability and value of cotton.

Included in the USDA announcement was a schedule of premiums and discounts that will be applied when cotton is put under loan. If through 4.8, a premium value of 14 points per pound will be allowed. No premium or discount will be allowed if the reading is 3.3 through E.5 or 4.9 through 5.1 but discounts from 15 to 300 points will apply if readings are outside these.

start pregnancy testing of beef cows. Pr bably no one management practice can help quite as much to reduce cow herd costs. The charges for pregnancy testing of cows are very minor in comparison to the cost of carrying an open cow through the winter. Remember if a cow is open this fall, it will be two years before she will have another calf ready to sell. Heavy Calves vs Light

An extra \$25 per calf is worth working for and it looks like this can be realized in many cases.

It is an accepted fact that cattle buyers pay a higher price for lighter weight calves of the same quality as their heavier cousins.

Even though you might get a higher price for lighter weight calves, you may still be losing money compared to raising and selling heavier calves. A comparison was made of 32 lots of calves sold at the McArthur Feeder Sales of 1962, '63 and '64. These lots consisted of heavy calves and light calves from the same ranch, the calves being sorted for size prior to the sale. Quality in the same lots from the same ranch was similar.

The light weight lots averaged 359 pounds, and the heavy weight lots averaged 473 pounds. The records showed that the buyers paid approximately one cent pe pounds more for the ligh weight calves.

Comparing heavy and calves from the individua ranches, the heavy calves brought anywhere from \$10 to over \$38 more per head than did the light weights. The average difference pe head was \$24.36 in four the heavier calves, even though the light weight co ves brought a cent more a pound.

There are a number of ways to increase weaning weights. One method, that probably the least expens is to cull the perennial calving cows and use h management during the ing seas, n, to bunch un calf group and get a great percentage of calves durin the early part of the calseason.

Another possibility is a little extra feed to the com during the poor feed seaso prior to calving and afte calving so that the cows produce more milk over a longer period of time. T will cost money, but 20 400 pounds of feed at the right time may very well you back twice the return calf weight for what the feed cost.

Another sure way is to use only performance te bulls proven to be rapide ers, as these bulls wil rapid gaining calves.
