Wheeler was in an area under alert Friday evening and the cloud had just come over the town when the siren sounded. This was the second night Wheeler was under alert to watch the clouds. An alert was broadcast again Saturday evening, but Wheeler escaped any severe weather all three nights.

Rains began falling late Thursday evening and continued through Friday morning. This amount was 1.48". The weekend closed with 0.10" Sunday and 8:00 p.m. The weekend of rains brought the total for the month to 13.25" and the total for the year now stands at 22.67".

Fire Chief Bob Patterson stated that the storm warning whistle is two 30 second blasts. Wheeler fireman have been on duty at the cellar west of town each night the night has been under alert, however no funnels have been sighted and the whistle has not blown.

Wheeler Girl Witnesses Colo. Flood

On June 13, I went to Holly, Colo. to spend part of my summer vacation with relatives.

On Thursday morning June 17, we left the house to open up the store which my aunt owns there. It had been raining very hard since Wednesday night and the water had risen to the curb. By 6:00 a.m. the rain had stopped and the flood struck without warning. We were stocking the shelves when the water burst through the cement floor, turning over freezers and shelves. By the time I got the electricity shut off and back inside, the water was waist deep. We left the store in water which was then neck deep and struggled to reach high ground. We waded for about 5 blocks when two boys came to our aid.

They helped us to a large truck vehicle which took us out to higher ground. We spent several hours there and then were taken farther north to the Country club, where we spent several days with 150 other people, without food and water except for what little could be salvaged.

On Friday night June 18 the army flew in food and medical supplies. Help and helicopters which were later used to evacuate the remaining people in Holly.

We were vaccinated for typhoid and tetanus before leaving the area. Many babies were without milk. Milk had been flown in but spoiled because of the electrical failure. Many of the babies and small children were sick because of the lack of proper food and reaction to their vaccinations.

Holly was flooded by the Arkansas River and several small creeks, hitting the area three different times. Many cars, homes and business were either destroyed or badly damaged. Saw cars wrapped around light poles and homes where one wall was completely gone. The water would come in one side and if it couldn't find an opening it would just take the opposite wall with it.

ted gang through the water to help evacuate people but were turned over or wrecked by logs that were cricked through the current.

After the waters had succeeded somewhat, two men stayed on the railroad tracks to help kill numerous rattlesnakes which were washed up or crawled there to get out of the water. Later we were told, learn rats had invaded the town to bring more distress to the people. The rats were drawn there by the filth and odor of spoiled food and dead animals.

On Friday June 18, my parents left my sisters with friends and left for Colorado to try and reach me. They arrived about 8:00. They were the first to reach us by car. After three days we were able to get out to Lamar to see if our other relatives were safe. We found them all well and left for Wheeler on June 21 when the roads to the south were temporarily opened.

The ham sandwiches sold by Irene Rogers at Clay Food store tasted good when they reached us with my folks. It was worth every harrowing moment. I met the doctors who were a dream! But

I was really glad to get back to good old Wheeler.

CO. AGENTS REPORT

 How to apply Herbicides
 Herbicides can be useful tools for controlling weeds if they are properly applied, but improper application can cause crop damage and lawsuits from neighbors.
 To get satisfactory results from herbicides, follow the directions on the label as approved by the U S Department of Agriculture. These directions should be followed exactly.
 To avoid chemical wind drift onto susceptible broadleaf plants make applications only when wind velocity is below 10 m.p.h. All herbicide users should have some type of wind gauge in the field so they can know when conditions become dangerous.
 Amine salt or low volatile formulations are safest. They do not vaporize and drift as much as the high volatile formulations.
 These three rules should be followed when applying Herbicides:
 1. Use chemicals only on crops for which they are recommended.
 2. Use only the quantity called for on the label.
 3. Apply the chemicals only at the time recommended on the label.
 Texas A&M University specialist report that the greatest problems with herbicides are occurring where inexperienced operators are making applications. They suggest that even on extremely small plots great care be taken when applying chemicals.
 All interested persons are advised to utilize information on herbicides available at the county Extension office. Complete information may be obtained on spraying any type of weeds of brush.

Civil Defense Q's and A's

Q. Why is it important for schools to have fallout shelters?
A. Youth, the real strength of any nation, are the teachers, scientist and leaders of tomorrow. It presents a great challenge for us to provide the best opportunities for them. This includes adequate community planning to meet any disaster.
 The children are in the school approximately one-third of the day during the school year. The school is a center of the community activities and a natural gathering place. Schools normally include the facilities for mass feeding and have auxiliary power and water supplies. With proper design fallout shelter areas may be included in an improved learning environment.
Q. How do school officials support the idea of fallout shelters in schools?
A. Harold C Brantly, superintendent of United Consolidated Independent school district, Laredo, Texas has some practical facts to support his enthusiasm for the Laredo high school which was built with underground fallout shelter:
 (1) The cost of the school with underground shelter and air conditioning was less than conventional schools; (2) the school appearance was neither drab nor cheap; (3) lower maintenance and longer life; (4) better attendance; (5) better learning situation; (6) sense of security; (7) land saving; (8) year round usefulness and increased capacity; (9) good teachers attracted; (10) service to community defense; and (11) good community acceptance.

REPORT ON HAWAIIAN TRIP

Mrs. J M Glover, a former resident of Wheeler just returned from an interesting trip to Hawaii and the following is a sketch of Hawaii by her.

The climate is never lower than 62 degrees or higher than 89 degrees. It rains often. The plumbing is on top of the ground or is barely covered with dirt. There is no heating or air conditioning systems.

There are great proussions of flowers, vegetables and fruit the year r und. You see miles and miles of beautiful flowers on both sides of well cared for roads.

There is free garbage service. Cocoanuts, bananas, papayas and Dale pineapple grow by the sides of the roads.

There are trucks in the fields day and night rain or shine around the clock. There are also mills for canning for the mainland.

Sugar Cane is a great crop. You see it by the road. They plant cultivate, fertilize and irrigate in one operation. You see men with heavy duck sacks on shoulders dropping plants in ditches, maybe on foot or on donkeys, others follow up and plant. Others will be assembling long long lines of irrigation ditches using water fr an great wells pumped by electricity.

The land, cultivate and harvest at the same time. When a field gets ready they set it afire to destroy foder, usually at night so as not to hinder traffic.

They cut and haul with large trucks to mills, have ground and sent to California for refining.

That makes the C and H California and Hawaii Sugar. There is very little land for sale at all, but by the square foot for \$2.

We saw the great University of Honolulu. The students came from the east and the west world around.

Also saw Diamond Head Mountain and Pearl Harbor and Pearl City.

Saw the boats and great ships came in with fish, even whale fins 7 feet across.

Myra birds were brought in to rid the place of insects. Now they seem to have taken over. They seem so busy and intelligent. They talk all the time.

There are many nice free parks, but living is quite a bit higher than on the mainland. To rent a car is \$10 per day plus mileage and you pay gas. The cheapest gas is 40c per gallon.

History of Hawaii

There are just really about 6% pure hawaiian 1ft since so many have intermarried with Japanese and other races. They were all determined to get an education and worked at any work they could to get one.

In 1820 just 200 years after the pilgrims landed in New England, a group of 77 missionaries left Boston and after 5 months they found land and called it Sandwich Island.

They came over on Big Thaddeus anchoring at Kailua site of Royal residence on April 4. Members of the company paid respect to Lihalo and his routine, after considerable argument the kind agreed to let them start a mission in Kailua with a branch in Honolulu.

All the time the King had a friendly feeling toward the missionaries and more so after they showed great interest in the natives, especially the noble families.

They had 100 in school before they had taught 9 months. They had 24 Alii men and women of royal blood. School was specifically for them.

As soon as the missionaries acquired knowledge to write the language into books they had thousands of pupils and books were in great demand.



Century Plant

Rev Bingham was special leader. Many others such as Judd, Cooke and all worked hard. They began to marry natives and now their descendants own about one fifth of Hawaii.

Rev Bingham and group were profoundly shocked at the behavior of the natives compared to that of New England, so they got calico and made dresses for them to wear.

They had gathering places for them to sing pray and worship. The only trouble was that once in a while cows would eat the walls made of foder. Many were converted and lived normal.

In 1827 there were 27,000 students, 1831, 52,000 more adults than children in 1,100 missionary schools.

This century plant at the home of Mrs. Sara J McCandless bloomed Friday June 18. It reached a height of approximately 15'. Mrs. McCandless does not know when the plant was planted as it was in the yard when she bought the property. The plant will bloom only one time then die. The first century brought to our attention was at the James Verden home. The plant at the Verden home was approximately 30 years old and bloomed June 10, 1965

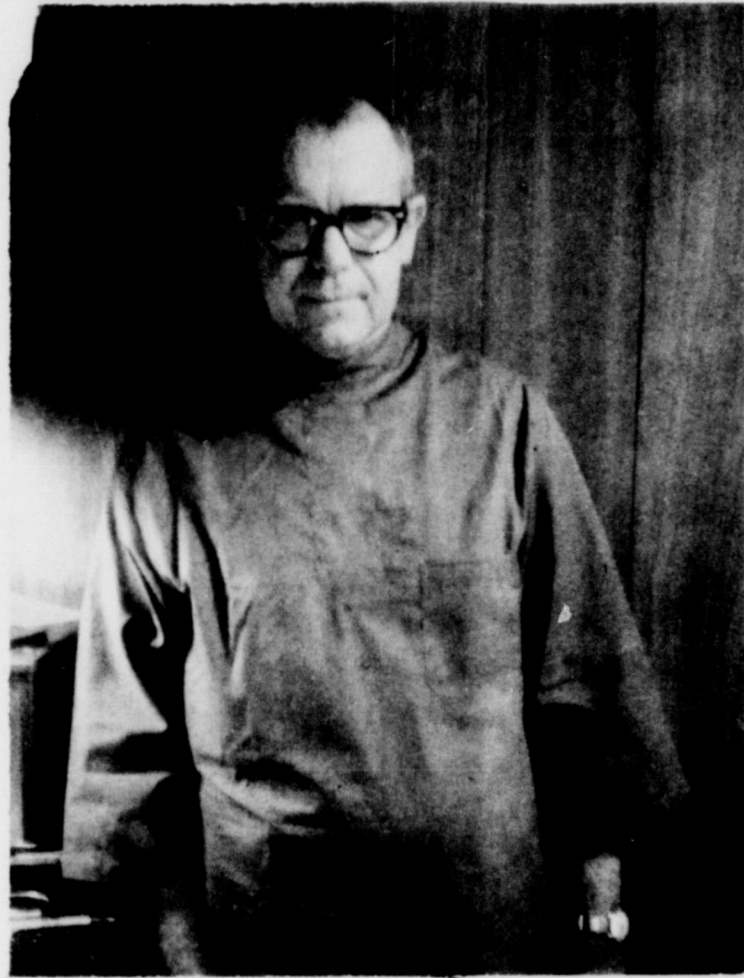

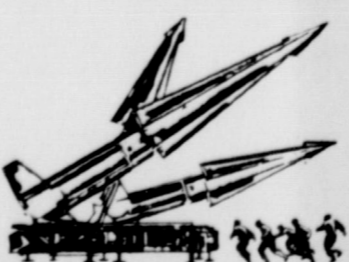
Fire Department Called Out Twice

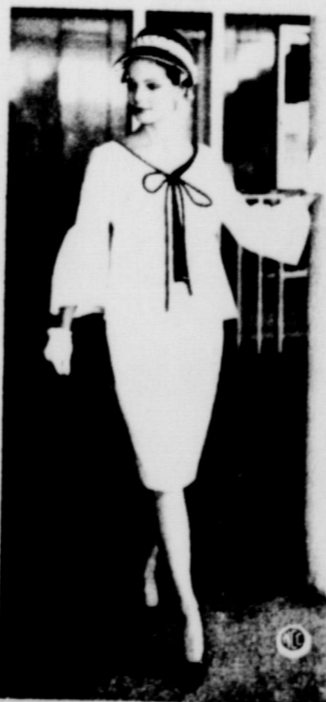
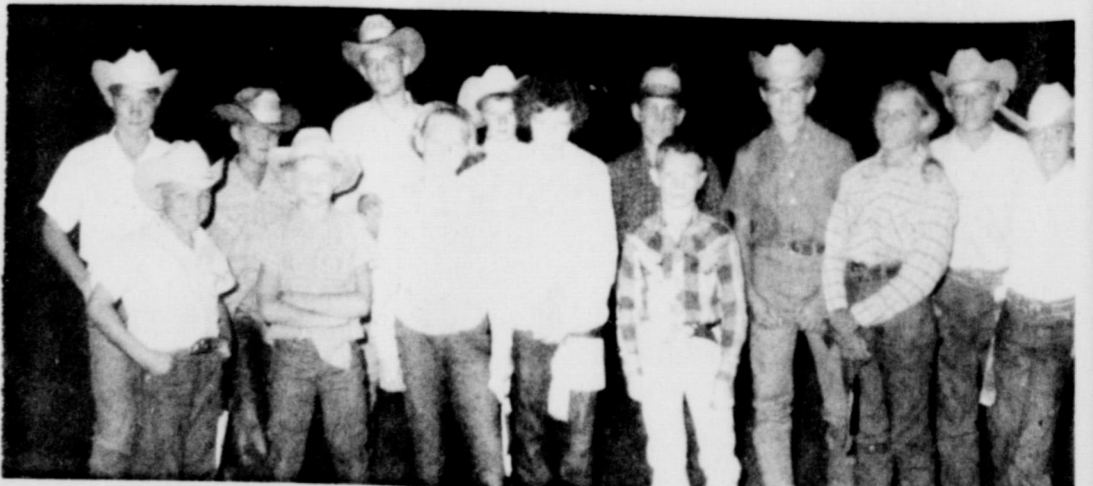
Annual G.B.Cole Reunion Held
