Construction of the new school plant has been delayed by an appeal by the Lela Board to the State Board of Education. (The Wheeler school was given the recent decision when their appeal was heard by Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education.) The State Board will hear the appeal on September 6 in Austin.

Local Firemen At Training Sch.

The following members of the Wheeler volunteer fire department are attending the 36th annual Texas Firemen's Training school on the campus of Texas A&M. They are Earl Barnes, Fire Marshal and Paul Topper, of Wheeler.

The greatest benefit gained from the school is the reduction in fire losses through more efficient methods of fire fighting learned during the training.

Instruction includes 12 separate 30 hour courses in firefighting, fire marshal training, fire department officer training, instructor training, pump maintenance, pump operation, armed services and specialized fire protection.

Top instructors and technical advisors will assist in the school. These include representatives from the liquefied petroleum gas industry, the Texas department of Public safety, fire and arson investigators, fire apparatus and equipment specialist, and guest instructors from fire departments, industry and the armed services in Texas and other states.

31 Years Of Service To Mobeetie

The postal patrons on Mobeetie rural route got together Saturday evening to honor their mail carrier, Grady Harris, who retired after 31 years of faithful service.

The 60 guests were entertained with a "This is Your Life" program giving the life of Mr. Harris from the time he finished high school in Vernon until he retired from the Post Office department and moved to Wheeler where he and Mrs. Harris are making their home at 700 Shamrock Street.

Mr. Harris's step son, James Horton acted as Master of Ceremonies in the absence of Rev. Uzzle who was unable to be present. Mrs. Muel Trout, who has known Grady from the time he moved to Mobeetie in 1918 and in the fall attended A&M College at Bryan and graduated in 1922 with a degree in agriculture and Dairy husbandry. During his stay in college, he was a member of the Ross Volunteers which was open to a select few of the top 30 juniors out of the 1921 class of 300.

After graduating, Mr. Harris returned to Mobeetie and was engaged in farming with his father. Later he served as County Agent at Clarendon for a few years. In 1924 he finished a school year as a member of the Miami faculty and taught vocational ag. One of his pupils, Mrs. Kenneth Corse was a Mobeetie postal patron when he became associated with the Post Office.

Before joining the postal department, he worked as a salesman covering parts of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas and Louisiana and worked with International for six months before opening business in Mobeetie selling farm implements.

Mr. Harris volunteered for service during the first world war and served 70 days. He was drafted into service in World War II and served 17 months overseas. He was classified as a First Lieutenant when he received his discharge.

Prior to taking over the mail route Mr. Harris served 12 years as Post Master. Mr. Harris only had one of the Mobeetie routes and traveled 42 miles each day. When the routes were combined for a total of 79 miles Mr. Harris stated that he had only half as many patrons

when he retired as were on the route 25 years ago on a shorter route. At the beginning of the program, Mr. Harris was seated in an office chair which later was presented to him by the patrons on his route. The inscription read: "Presented to Grady Harris by his patrons after 30 years of Postal service."

Production varies according to the age and conditions of the tree. He has one favorite tree that produced nine bushels of peaches last year. Of course his average will be much lower than the above figure, but conditions in Wheeler county are ideal for growing peaches for anyone that uses good orchard management. Peaches are selling for \$2.50 a bushel when the buyer does the picking.

Peach orchard establishment offers a great cash crop potential to anyone that works and carries out good management practices. Wheeler county orchards have been gang down hill in recent years because no young men have been establishing orchards and the old established orchards have trees that are deteriorating.

The slogan, "It pays to advertise" was proven in Wheeler county this month. John Sartor, the peach man around Wheeler, came by the office one day to tell me that he had a peach orchard with 2,000 trees with ripe peaches ready to be marketed. After discussing this problem with Jerry Sinise, agriculture editor with the Amarillo Globe News, he decided to take a picture of John and his wife picking peaches and run an article concerning the peach crop in the Amarillo paper and publicize it over Cotton John's program. The article was so successful that John sold his entire orchard in two days. During one period John counted 68 cars in his orchard at one time. This publicity also helped other growers to sell their peaches. I think that anyone with a product to sell could gain information from this success story.

LOCAL PEACH CROP BEST IN SEVERAL YEARS

The 1965 Wheeler county peach crop is one of the best crops ever produced. More total bushel of peaches were produced several years ago since there was a greater number of orchards but the quality of peaches is higher this year. This week I visited with L. A. McWhorter who has 1200 tree orchard about one mile east of Wheeler. He said that his peaches are of better quality this year than any year he could remember and his orchard was established in 1940. Varieties that he raises include Golden Jubilee, Hale Haven, Elbertas, J. H. Hale, India, Chinese and Elberta Cling. The demand is so great for Wheeler county peaches that Mr. McWhorter has a hard time getting people to leave peaches on the trees until they are ripe. He specializes in selling peaches to families that plan to prepare peaches for the freezer for family use. Buyers will travel from many different places to purchase his peaches. He has steady customers from Potosi, N.M.
