## RODEO-BARBECUE SCHEDULED

Wheeler takes on its annual festive appearance next Thursday afternoon, when the local Riding Club kicks off the Annual Rodeo Celebration with a parade through town, Thursday.

Following the traditional event at 4 p.m., which will feature riders from here as well as other Panhandle Cities and Towns, all roads will lead east to the rodeo grounds where serving of the big free barbecue begins at 6 p.m.

John Barr of Wheeler, "Barbecue King of the Panhandle", will prepare the barbecue, which is being sponsored by the Riding Club and Chamber of Commerce. Wheeler business people will serve the meal. Hundreds are expected here for the rodeo and related activities.

Producer of the rodeo will be Charley Plummer of Elk City, Oklahoma. A Rodeo performance will be held at 8 p.m. on July 8, 9, and 10 and belt Reace will be held Friday between Wheeler and Shamrock.

Included in the rodeo events will be bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, bull dogging, bull riding and ladies barrel race. Heading and Healing will again be held this year the first night of the rodeo only and is open to a limited number of contestants.

Contestants will compete in these events each night during the three-day

rodeo. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children.

Wheeler Bootshop is rodeo headquarters. Entries close at 3:00 p.m. Thursday and persons interested in competing

should contact the Wheeler Boot Shop, Phone 2121. Entry fee for each event is \$15. Added prize money will be offered in bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bull dogging and bull riding.

During the three day rodeo celebration, the Wheeler American Legion Post and Riding club will hold a dance from 9 a.m. to 1 a.m. nightly at the Legion Hall. Play-

ing for the dance will be the Westerners Swing of Amarillo.

Added this year will be engraved belt buckles to the winners of each of the events of the rodeo. These buckles will be furnished by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

In many sections of Wheeler county weeds are about to take over on rangeland, pastures and meadows.

This is especially true where grazing has been heavy in previous years. Many farmers and ranchers are beginning to fight back because weeds compete with pasture and meadow plants for moisture, plant nutrients, light and space.

Pasture and meadow yields may be reduced by as much as 50%. Weed control is necessary for greatest returns from productive pastures and meadows, but it may be unprofitable on low producing pastures or meadows.

Much of the need for weed control can be prevented by seedbed preparation, using adapted plants and the right amount of high quality seed by the proper time, adequate fertilization and proper grazing or forage use.

Once weeds become established they may be controlled by mechanical control, through mowing or cultivation or chemical control.

Chemical control will fit our conditions more than mechanical. Best results will be obtained from chemical control when annual grasses are 4 to 6 inches high and when the broad leaved weeds are in the young rapid growth stage.

I realize this information may be late for Wheeler county, but I would like to pass on the information since a lot of request have been received for this type information.

There may be weeds in this stage on some places or the information may be used later.

Temporary summer pastures and hay crops of annual grasses may be rid of weeds by spraying with 1/2 to 3/4 pound of 2,4 Damine per acre in 15 to 20 gallons of water. This is recommended in planting of Sudan grass, perennial Sweet Sorgrass, Sorghum alnum, Johnsongrass, Pearl Millet and forage sorghums. Do not use a wetting agent because of the high summer temperature at the time of application.

In temporary pastures of annual grasses use 1/2 pound of 2,4 Damine or low volatile ester per acre in 15 to 20 gallons of water with a wetting agent.

For the control of annual weeds, such as crabgrass, sandbur and Colorado grass, use 5 to 7 lbs per acre of sodium TCA in 25 to 30 gallons of water. Do not use a wetting agent. Make the spray application

This treatment is suggested only to prevent weed seed production or when weeds threaten to reduce forage yields. Delay spray applications until these grasses are well tillered, but treat the weeds when they are in the young, rapid growth stage.

If small grains are to be harvested for grain, do not use 2,4D after they have reached the boot stage.

Many people do not realize that weeds may be controlled in alfalfa. Dock, Henbit, mustard and similar susceptible weeds can be controlled in alfalfa by using 1/4 pound of 2,4D butyric per acre in 15 to 20 gal of water with a wetting agent.

This treatment may be applied to established stands or it may be used on seedling stands, provided the seedling alfalfa plants are well rooted and have five to seven trifoliate leaves. Occasionally 2,4D butyric will slow the growth rate on alfalfa, but the plants soon recover.

For the control of susceptible broad-leaved winter weeds, such as mustard in dormant alfalfa stands, 2,4Damine may be used. The rate suggested is 1/2 to 3/4 pounds per acre in 15 to 20 gallons of water with a wetting agent.

Use of this mixture on growing alfalfa may damage the alfalfa stand severely.

A substitute control for annual winter broad-leaved weeds, such as chickweed, henbit and mustard is 2 1/2 to 3 qts of selective dinitros per acre in 30 to 40 gallons of water. Do not use a wetting agent. Do not apply dinitros near the time the alfalfa is to be grazed or cut.

For the control of annual weeds, such as crabgrass, sandbur and Colorado grass, use 5 to 7 lbs per acre of sodium TCA in 25 to 30 gallons of water. Do not use a wetting agent. Make the spray application

when the weedy grasses are in the seedling stage and have no more than four leaves. Dalapon at the rate of 2 to 4 pounds per acre in 15 to 20 gallons of water may be substituted for the TCA treatment. The time of application should be the same as for TCA but use a wetting agent with Dalapon.

Care should be taken when applying 2,4D. Wind velocity should not be above 5 miles per hour.

For complete and detail weed control information feel free to contact the Wheeler county extension office and ask for Texas extension bulletin L-476 Weed control in cultivated pastures and meadows.
