He moved to Mobeetie in 1916 and set up a practice. He practiced in Shamrock one year and moved to Wheeler in 1920 where he maintained his practice until three months ago.

The first hospital to be built in Wheeler was built by Dr. Nicholson. This hospital was operated by Dr. Nicholson until 1961. When health permitted he maintained an office at the hospital March of this year remodeled the building and opened the Harold E. Nicholson, Jr.

He was a shriner and had served as deputy grand master of the Masonic Lodge for the Panhandle area. He was also a member of American Medical Association and other medical associations. Many honors have been bestowed Dr. Nicholson during his many years of service. He was an honorary member of Texas A&M Ex-Student Assoc'n. The local football field. 





Suspension Fences

You can cut your fencing costs almost in half by usng suspension fences, says County agent, Charles D. Jackson.

A suspension type fence is one that is anchored securely on each end with large posts, braces and a "dead-man". Line posts are spaced from 80 to 120 feet apart. Line posts can be cedar. pressure treated pine or steel. Posts should be set

in soil at least 2 feet deep. Wooden posts should be a minimum of 6 feet long, with a 4 inch top. A longer and

The suspension fence ususually consists of 4 to 6 strands of 12½ guage barbed wire. Each strand of wire is stretched taunt so ther is not over a 3" sag between posts. The wire strands are separated with spiral wire stays placed about 15 feet wpart. Do not let the lower ends of the stays t wich the ground, since this defeats the purpose of the suspension. The wire stays are 36,42 or 48' long, depending on the height of the top wire.

Building a male of suspension fence with wooden posts and stays placed 16 feet apart costs about \$350 A standard fence with line posts at 20 feet spacinas could cost \$600 per mile to

The suspension fence sways back and forth in the wind and particularly when animals run into it. The swaying mostion beats the animals awayfrom the fence and there is a little chance of cattle becoming mixed between pastures. There is less fence repair when herd bulls in adjoining pastures run over fences during fights as the fence will spring back to its normal position. The dwinging motion does a lot to discourage fighting through the fence, concludes Agent Charles D. Jackson.
