RODEO-BARBECUE SUCCESS

The tenth annual Wheeler riding club rodeo was held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 8-9-10 and the Wheeler rodeo arena and certainly was the best rodeo to be presented in Wheeler. Added to the prize money this year was the awarding of Silver belt buckles to the first place winner of each event. These belt buckles were furnished by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

Rodeo activities got underway with the downtown parade in which local and area riding clubs paraded. Represented at the parade were the Wheeler county 4-H Texans leading the parade, the Shamrock Sheriffs posse, Tula riding club, Sayres Little Wranglers, a group of youngsters on Shetland ponies and the White Deer riding club. Otto Mangold of Pampa was present with his covered wagon and Bus Walker drove the Wheeler riding club covered wagon in the parade.

Activities at the rodeo arena got under way with the serving of the barbecue furnished each year by the Chamber of Commerce. 1723 lbs of beef were cooked in the pit to serve the hungry crowd which had then gathered for the finest performance of the rodeo. In addition to the meat the crowd received beans, onion, pickles, peaches, bread and ice tea. Leon Moore and Robert Denson were in charge of the serving and they stated that 1350 plates of food were served. John Barr, Barbecue King of the Panhandle, prepared the meat for the barbecue. Mrs. Gladys Oglesby, Mrs. Hammie Herd, Mrs. Bob Hutchinson and Mrs. C. L. Moore prepared the cookers of beans used.

Extra good crowds attended the three nights of the rodeo with excellent weather with the exception of a minor shower Thursday evening which delayed the activities for a short time.

L. H. Davidson, president of the Wheeler riding club, stated in behalf of the club that all support given by the towns people and merchants was deeply appreciated. The club deeply appreciated the belt buckles donated by the Chamber of Commerce and extended thanks to Wheeler Boot Shop for serving as rodeo headquarters, Leon Moore and Robert Denson for getting the barbecue ready to serve, the workers who served and Gulf for furnishing the excellent PA system for the rodeo. Mr. Davidson stated that it takes the cooperation of the community to put on a rodeo

such as this and the riding club certainly had the communities cooperation. The amount of food consumed by the Thursday night crowd was 1723 lbs of beef, 140 lbs of beans, 110 gallons of ice tea, 11 gallons of pickles, 9 gallons of barbecue sauce, 36 gallons of peaches, 50 lbs of onions and 2,000 miniature loaves of Meads Fine bread. This food was furnished by local merchants and individuals.

This years concession stands were run by the riding club and the Rainbow Girls Chapter.

Mr. Davidson pointed out that the riding club would hold an election of officers at their meeting on July 27 and he urged all members to be present at the meeting. The meeting

will be at the rodeo arena.

Co. Agent Reports

When the fish population in a pond becomes unbalanced with small stunted fish or rough undesirable fish, it is best to remove all fish and start over with balanced stock.

If the pond contains adult fish, pond owners should not stock the pond with fingerlings obtained from state or federal hatcheries. Certain fish are cannibals as well as predators and a few adult fish can eliminate every fingerling in a short time.

The use of rotenone is recommended as an easy and practical way to remove most kinds of fish from private ponds. However, even if used as recommended, rotenone seldom gives a 100 percent kill of bullhead catfish. Other materials are available that will give a complete kill of bullheads.

Fish killed with rotenone are edible. Rotenone is not a poison in the true sense of the word since it kills fish by suffocation. People, cows, horses, sheep, pigs, chickens, cats, dogs, snakes, frogs and other vertebrate animals are not affected when they swim in or drink water treated with rotenone.

It is unlawful to use rotenone in any public body of water. It is to be used in private bodies of water for management purposes.

Stock Your Pond with Whatever Kind of Fish You Like to Catch.

If you are a catfisherman only, there is no reason to stock other species; the same goes for bass or sunfish.

Many sources recommend stocking a forage fish along with large mouth bass. The practice is not necessary in Texas and is even detrimental in some cases. The female bluegill, a forage fish can spawn as many as four times a year in Texas, resulting in thousands of small bluegills that never reach edible size.

If a pond owner desires sunfish in his pond, the most suitable species is the redear. The redear spawns only once a year and thereby lengthens the time before overcrowding occurs.

The pond should always be stocked with fingerlings that are approximately the same size such as those obtained from the state or federal hatcheries.

Fingerlings should never be taken from a nearby stream or pond and adult fish should be removed and the pond stocked with a balanced number of fingerlings.

Applications for stock fish may be made at any time. However, fish are delivered only once each year during the summer or early fall.

Pond owners should never hedge on the size of the pond in an effort to get more fish. Just as range land has a certain capacity for a specific number of animals, a pond can only support a certain number of pounds of desirable fish.

CIVIL DEFENSE Qs & As

Q. How can we get fallout shelters in our schools?

A. There are two ways to get fallout protection in our schools: 1. by modification and improvement of existing school buildings. Many of our school buildings would already offer a small amount of protection from radioactive fallout. Through community effort this protection could be increased.

2. By the incorporation of fallout shelters into new school buildings. It is possible and practical to design efficient and attractive schools that also include protection against radioactive fallout.

Q. Would the inclusion of a fallout shelter space in a new school increase the cost of school construction very much?

A. Not necessarily. There are several factors that would affect the construction costs of a school building designed with fallout protection. Design, local soil and geographic conditions are probably most important. Community school needs would be another important factor.

Q. How does the maintenance costs of the fallout shelter school compare with our conventional schools?

A. Maintenance costs have been found to be lower at the Laredo, Texas, Brenham, Texas and other schools with fallout shelters included in their design. The elimination of dust and grime have been found to be important factors. The elimination of windows and cheaper heating were important. School officials anticipate a longer school life.

Q. What effect has fallout shelters in schools had on students?

A. School officials have found improved learning situations. They had better attendance and have indicated a sense of security. Outside distractions have been eliminated with the pleasant controlled classroom conditions.

Q. Have school officials had any problems in securing good teachers for the Laredo, Texas, school built with underground fallout shelter?

A. The school has attracted teachers who formerly taught at such places as Dallas, Houston and Corpus Christi. A teacher said, "You don't know how nice it is to have 25 kids looking at you and listening instead of daydreaming and staring out of the windows."

Q. Do students feel more secure in a school with fallout shelters?

A. A teacher noted that the school "creates a definitely secure state of mind in the students, young as they are. They read of Viet Nam or other alarming newspaper headlines and say calmly, 'Well, we're safe.' It gives them a good feeling."

Q. How did the community accept the new fallout shelter building in Texas?

A. There was good acceptance. Everyone appreciated the beauty, comfort and safety of the building on an extent there was a great increase in land value demand for homes in school neighborhoods faster than had been built.

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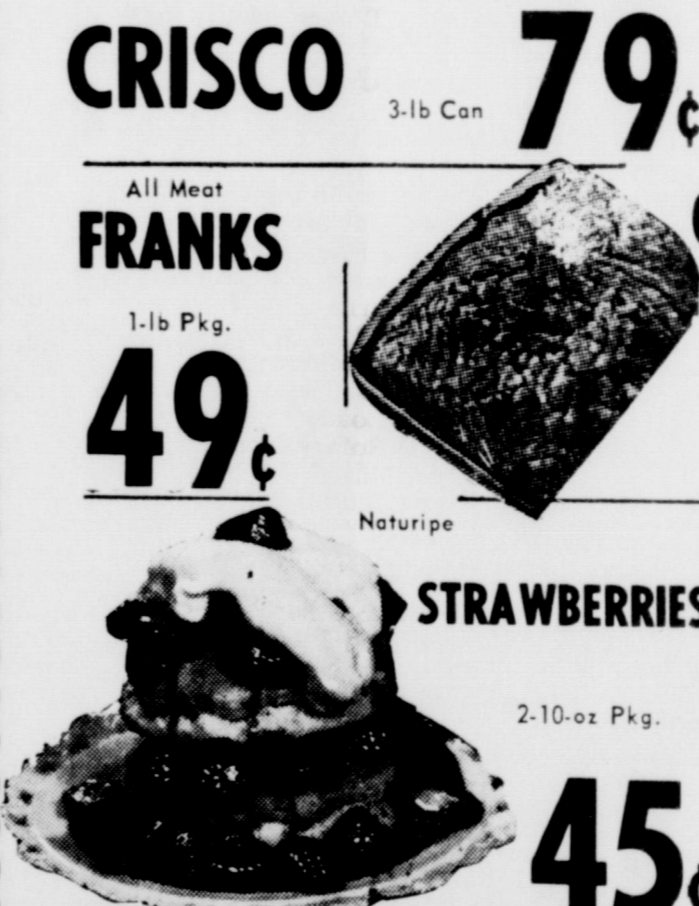
