

COMMISSIONERS COURT TO SHOW COURTHOUSE

The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County cordially invites you to Open House at the Courthouse Sunday, October 10 from 2 until 5. The open house is to give citizens an opportunity to see how their money has been spent in the remodeling of the courthouse.

The present County Courthouse was completed May 20, 1926. The remodeling job completed on September 13, 1965 was the first major remodeling project for the structure. Work began March 1, with the sand blasting of the exterior. All stone structures on the exterior were repaired. Interior work included

complete repainting, lowering ceilings, new flooring in some areas and refinishing all woodwork and installation of central heating and air-conditioning.

The work was contracted by Joe Dukes of Boaker for the amount of \$54,991.84. The remodeling was paid for with available funds without additional taxes or issuance of warrants.

Work was done under the supervision of the Commissioners Court: Judge George W. Hefley and Commissioners, Shelby Pettit, No. 1; O.W. Pendleton, No. 2; Clois Hanner, No. 3 and E.E. Henderson, No. 4.

MUSTANGS DEFEAT McLEAN 26-8

Being held to an 8-8 tie at halftime, the Wheeler Mustangs came back in the second half and completely dominated play to turn back the McLean Tigers to the tune of 26-8.

An overflow crowd, estimated at 1500 fans, saw the Wheeler Mustangs continue on undefeated as they romped to their fourth straight win

of the season and their 16th straight over a two year period.

Eight plays were needed for the Mustangs to score after Hardcastle returned the opening kickoff to the Wheeler 42 yard line. The drive was kept alive with a pass interference call against the Tigers on the McLean 33. From the 27, Mike Goad went around his right end on the

option play and worked it to perfection. Cutting inside the defensive end, he went over untouched and the home-towners led with less than six minutes gone in the quarter. Mike Goad added the two points with a sprint and left end.

Defensive play dominated the game until late in the second quarter, the Mustangs reached the Tiger 25 and 29

but were held and threw back the only threat McLean made from the Wheeler 35.

Facing third and sixteen from their 30 midway of the second period, the Mustangs used the quick kick hoping to keep the Tigers bottled up deep in their end of the field. Fred Goad got 47 yards on the kick and it rolled dead on the McLean 23 yard line. The Tigers, however did not roll dead at this point. Fuller was held to no gain on the first play and then the fireworks started. McCarty hit Drew Fuller for a 16 yard pass and just as he caught the ball he was raked by a couple of Mustangs and the ball fell free and Wheeler recovered but the man with the whistle said that the play was dead at the point of completion and the Tigers had the much

disputed first down. The big play came two plays later as McCarty found Bible racing free behind Smith and hit him with a perfect pass. Smith overtook Bible and downed him at the Wheeler 13 but the Tigers had momentum and were not to be denied. McCabe got nine at left end and then Steve Fuller banged into the end over right guard. McCurley added the two points on a crossback and it was a brand new game at 8-8.

Wheeler got a golden opportunity to score right after the intermission but fumbled the ball back to the Tigers at the 12 after recovering a fumble on the 24. McLean was unable to gain and was forced to punt with McCabe getting the kick out to the Tiger 49.

Bobby Vanpool took off around his right end in a sweep and turned it on to outrun all the defenders and crossed the goal line with 7:45 remaining in the third period. One of the Tigers hit Vanpool deep in the end zone after scoring but no official threw a flag even though Vanpool was shaken up by the play for a few moments. The run for extra points was no good and the Mustangs led 14-8.

The Mustangs must have received good words of advice or something a bit stronger at halftime from the coaches as they came back in the second half and completely dominated the play and threw a blanket over every McLean effort to get back in the game. The Tigers were unable to make a single first down in the last half of play so thoroughly did the Wheeler defense do their job.

Co. Agents' Reports

 According to the county statistics, 33 percent of the working people make under \$3,000. This is an indication that we need to know how to fix low cost meals and still stay within the realm of balanced nutrition. First Rule: Avoid getting in a "rut". Keep your meals attractive by choosing a variety of low-cost foods, like beans and frozen orange juice that provide essential food nutrients. Then explore various ways to make them taste different.

Take the matter of fruits for example. Right now, you'll find frozen orange juice is an especially economical source of vitamin C. You need that everyday.

Enough protein for body building and repair, also is important. Choose meat cuts that are in least demand, like chuck roast, liver and hamburger. Think also in terms of serving turkey and chicken often. Both are abundant at low cost.

Beans and peas are unusually economical high protein foods. They're always available in abundance and they can be made into attractive enjoyable dishes that please the palate. But they aren't "complete protein" foods. They need to be supplemented with an animal protein like meat or cheese.

When you are looking for a low cost, but nutritious and hearty diet to serve your family try this bean salad recipe.

Use 4 cups cooked or canned beans, kidney, pinto, chick peas, lentils or a combination of these. To the beans add 2/3 cups French or Italian salad dressing, 1 medium onion sliced in rings; 2/3 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles, salt and pepper to taste and chunks of processed cheddar cheese if you like. Mix all ingredients and chill an hour or more. Stir gently now and then to blend the flavors.

No longer is it necessary to soak dry beans over night to cook them tender. Here's the short cut, Cover beans with water and bring to a boil. Boil uncovered for 2 minutes, remove from heat and cover. Let the beans stand for an hour, then cook according to directions.

Serve your bean salad with bologna slices, rye bread, milk and fresh fruit for dessert.

When shopping for bologna, remember that it usually costs less by the piece rather than already sliced. Bologna with the circular USDA inspection mark assures you that it was made only from whole meats and other ingredients acceptable for food.

multiflora, short leaf pine, slash pine, sycamore, euonymus and buffalobery. These plants must be ordered in multiples of 50 and a total of 100 trees must be ordered. They may be used for windbreaks, soil stabilization and Christmas tree plantings, but cannot be used for living screens or resold for shade or ornamental purposes. All seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped to landowners starting in mid-February.

Oats for Winter grazing
 More than a million acres of oats are planted each year in Texas for a winter and spring grazing for beef cattle. In a 7 year research test at Texas A and M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center at McGregor, Steers gained 1.7 pounds per day during the winter grazing period, Nov. 15-Mar. 1 and 2.4 pounds daily during the spring period, Mar. 1-June 7, for the entire grazing period, with no supplemental feed, the average gain was 2.1 pounds.

Feed Grain Production
 If present estimates are realized, the nation's feed grain production--corn, oats, barley and sorghum grain for 1965 will set a new record. Extension economist John G McManey at Texas A and M University said the production of about 157 million tons will be due entirely to high per acre yields, up 15 percent from last year and 8 percent above the 1963 record. The acreage planted is 4 million less than last year and 32 million below the acres planted in 1959 and 1960, just before the feed grain program became effective.

Small grain disease problems can be largely solved by planting seed which have been treated with a chemical fungicide for disease control. The treatment process is simple and cheap and excellent insurance against crop losses from seed-borne diseases, says county agent, Charles D Jackson.

Many small grain diseases are caused by organisms carried on the surface of the seed and can be easily controlled. Loose smut of wheat and barley is an exception, explains Jackson. The organism causing this disease is carried inside the seed and cannot be controlled by chemicals.

Applications of seed treatment fungicides may be made in homemade trevers or by commercial seed treatment plants. Regardless of the equipment used, it is important to get a uniform coverage of seed with the recommended amount of the material, emphasizes the county agent.

Improper coverage of the seed or the use of rates lower than those recommended

greatly reduce the value of the practice. Because all seed treatment chemicals are poison, they should be handled with care cautions the county agent. No more seed should be treated than will be planted, he adds, and treated seed should never be fed to livestock or poultry or mixed with untreated seed which they may be fed. He advises strict compliance with the label information for both use and handling precautions.

Due to the number of materials which may be used, the county agent suggests that farmers needing detailed information drop by his office for it. The recommended materials are generally available from farm supply stores, he added.

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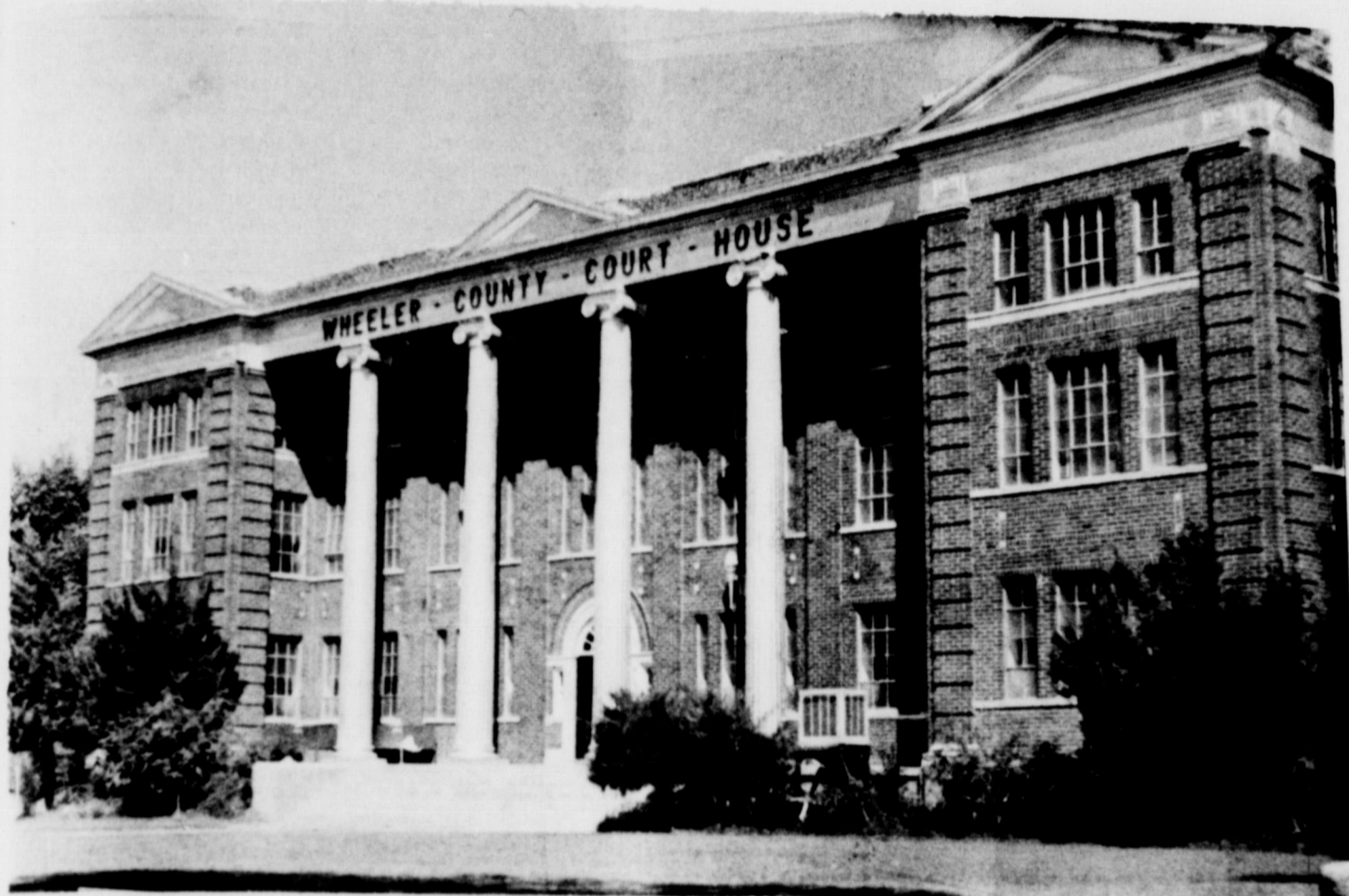
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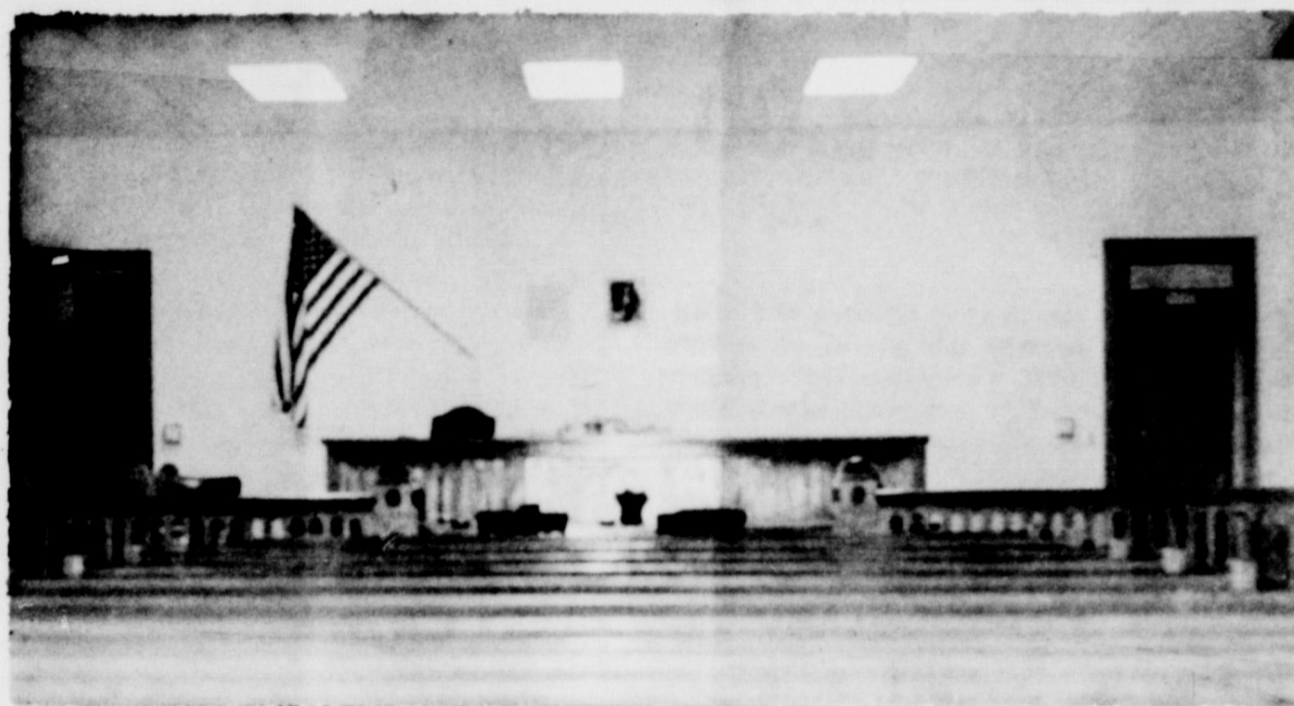

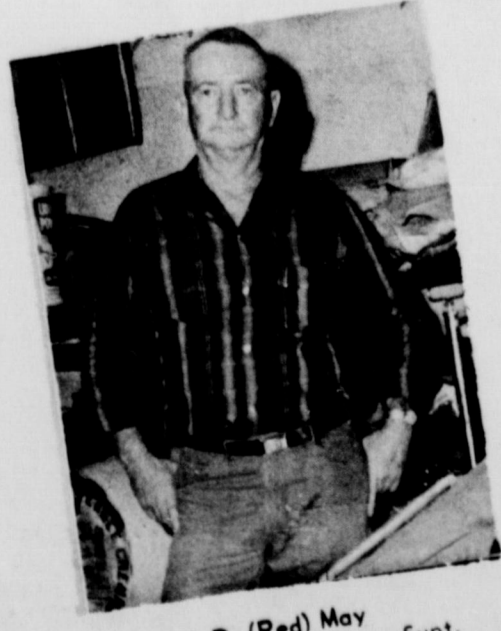
