#### Co. Agents' Reports

According to the county statistics, 33 percent of the working people make under \$3,000. This is an indication that we need to know how to fix low cost meals and still stay within the realm of balanced nutrition. First Rule: Avoid getting in a "rut" Keep your meals attractive by choosing a variety of lowcost foods, like beans and frozen orange juice that provide essential food butrients. Then explore various ways to make tham taste differ-

Take the matter of fruits for example. Right now, you' find frozen orange juice is an especially economical source of vitamin C. You need that everyday.

Enough protein for body building and repair, also is important. Choose meet cuts that are in least demand, like churck roast, liver and hamburger. Think also in terms of serving turkey and chicken often. Both are abundant at low cost.

Beans and peas are unusually economical high protein foods. They're always available in abundance. And they can be made into attractive enjoyable dishes that dease the palate. But they aren't "complete protein" foods. They need to be supplemented with an animal protein like meat or cheese.

When you are looking for a low cost, but nutritious and hearty dist to serve your family try this bean salad

recipe. Use 4 cups cooked or canned beans, kidney, pinto, chick peas, lentils or a combination of these. To the beans add 2/3 cups French or Italian salad dressing, 1 medium onion sliced in rings; 2/3 cup chopped celery, /2 cup chopped sweet sickles, salt and pepper to taste and chunks of processed cheddar cheese if you like. Mix all ingredients and chill an hour or more. Stir gently now and then to blend the flavors.

No longer is it necessary to soak dry beans over night to cook them tender. Here's the short cut, Cover beans with water and bring to a boil. Boil uncovered for 2 minutes, remover from heat and cover. Let the beans stand for an hour, then cook according to directions.

Serve your bean salad with bologna slices, rye bread milk and fresh fuit for dessert.

When shopping for bologng, remember that it usually costs less by the piece rather than already sliced. Bolo. and with the circular USDA inspection mark assures you that it was made aly from wholes one meats and other ingredments acce ptable for food.

Wheat Demonstrations

A wheat variety demonstratiin was planted this week on the John Daberry farm at Kelton, Six different varieties were planted in the dem onstration. The plots on each variety is six feet wide and 40 to 50 feet long. Varieties planted are Lancer, Di-23 experimental variety, Improved Triumph, Warrier, Caddo, Kaw, Scout and Tascosa. —his demonstration has been planted to compare the yield between these varieties. Since John Daberry is prove to receiving hail, these plots may turn out to be a hail resistant study also. He has received three hail sotrms during the past two years that has affected his cotton, wheat and grain sorhgum yields. Trees and Shrubs for Wind-

breaks or other purposes Farmers and ranchers may once again obtain planting stock for setting out in early 1966. Some 17 species of trees or shrubs will be available from the Texas Forest service at a delivered cost of \$1.50 per hundred plus the two percent sales tax. It is anticipated that the trees and shrubs will be shpped to landowners starting in mid-February.

Trees available are Austrian pine, Black locust, Black walnut (stratified seed), Catalpa Chinese elm, cottonwood, Lablolly pine, Mulberry, Osage orange, pon derosa pine, redcedar, rose

multiflora, short leaf pine, slash pine, sycamore, euonymus and buffaloberry. These plants must be ordered in multiples of 50 and a total of 100 trees must be ordered. They mau by used for windbreaks, soil stabilization and Christmas tree plantings, but cannot be used for living screens or resold for shade or ornamental purposes. All seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped to landowners starting in mid-February.

More thay a million acres of oats a é planted each year in Texas fa winter and spring grazing for beef cattle. In a 7 year research test at Texas A and M University's livestock and Forage research Center at McGregor, Steers gained 1.7 pounds per day during the winter grazing period. Nov. 15-Mar. 1 and 2.4 pounds daily during the spring period, Mar. 1-June7 for the entire grazing period, with no supplemental feed, the average gain was 2.1

Feed Grain Production

If present estimates are

realized, the nation's feed grain poduction--corn, oats, barley and aorghum grain for 1965 will set a new record. Extension economist John G McHaney at Texas A and M university said the production of about 157 million tons will be due entirely t, high per acre yields, up 15 percent from last year and 8 percent above the 1963 record. The acreage planted is 4 million less than last year and 32 million below the acres planted in 1959 and 1960, just before the feed grain program became effective.

Small grain disease problems can be largely solved by planting seed which have be en treated with a chemical fingicide for disease control.

The treatment process is simple and cheap and excellent insurance against crop losses from seed-borne diseases, says county agent, Charles D Jackson.

Many small grain diseases are caused by organisms carried on the surface of the seed and can be easily c atrolled. Loose smut of Wheat and barley is an exception, ex-plains Jackson. The organism causing this disease is carried inside the seed and cannot be controlled by chemicals.

ment fungicides may be made Mrs. Richard Dyson and in homemade tre wers or by commercial seed treatment plants. Regardless of the equipment used, it is important to get a uniform coverage of seed with the recommended amount of the material, emphasizes the county

Improper coverage of the seed or the use of rates lower than those recommended

greatly reduce the value of the practice.

Because all seed treatment chemicals are poison. they should be handled with care cautions the county agent. No more seed should be treated than will be planted, he adds, and treated seed should never be fed to livestock or poultry or mixed with untreated seed which they may be fed. He advises strict complance with the label information for both use and handling precautions.

Due to the number of materials which may be used, the count agent suggests that farmers needing detail. ed information drop by his office for it. The recommended materials are generally available from farm supply stores, he added.

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




