## WARRIORS TRIMMED 42-6

### More Information On FHA Loans

Within one hour after President Johnson Oct. 7 signed a bill expanding financial assistance to rural communities and family farms, the U. S. Department of Agriculture had put the new program into operation. Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman said.

By close of business Oct. 8, loan checks totaling \$16.5 million had been dispatched to more than 1,000 family farms and rural communities the secretary said.

"We welcome the opportunity the Congress has given us to be of greater service to rural America," the Secretary stated. "We intend to continue to move rapidly to supplement conventional credit sources in the recapitalization of rural areas."

The new legislation raised from \$200 to \$450 million the authorized amount USDA's FMS can insure annually for farm purchase and development and rural community facilities.

The act also increased from \$25 to \$50 million the amount of loans the agency can make and hold at any one time prior to selling the notes to private investors. It was this fund the FHA drew upon to speed the flow of funds to disadvantaged rural areas.

Sales out of the fund to private investors under new provisions in the act began Oct. 11 with a \$1 million purchase by the Commerce Trust company of Kansas City. The act permits returns to investors of up to 5 percent; previously the ceiling was 4 percent. The interest paid by borrowers remains 5 percent. The notes are currently being offered at 4.75 percent with the lender agreeing to hold the note for five years.

One of the first loans--for \$32,000--went to the small rural community of Kim, Las Animas, Colo., to drill a well and install 5 1/2 miles of pipeline. Some 250 families in the area have had water rationing since one of their two wells went dry.

Sixty families in Trinity county, Texas, obtained a \$74,000 loan for a well, water treatment plant, storage tank and 12 miles of pipeline. Their water supply has been limited for years.

Fairly small ranchers in Beaverhead county, Montana borrowed \$1 million to purchase and obtain leases on 57,700 acres of land which they will develop into a grazing area and thus obtain land needed to balance their ranching operations.

Getting back on the winning track, the Wheeler Mustangs trounced the visiting Miami Warriors last Friday night 42-6.

After seeing their winning streak broken the week before, the Wheeler Mustangs were slow to get started against the Warriors but when they did, they did with a vengeance and thoroughly waded the purple and white.

The Mustang first unit broke the starting ice midway in the first period with Mike Good capping a 42 yard drive with a 26 yard pass to Tom Smith who easily outdistanced the defense. Bobby Vanpool started right end for the two pointer and this concluded the scoring in the first quarter although the clock ran out with the Mustang on the Miami one yard line.

After the Warriors were unable to gain and had to punt the following the Wheeler touchdown, the Mustang second unit took over with the ball on the Warrior 38. Frankie Rogers, tight reserve halfback, got 12 yards in two tries and Miami was guilty of a personal foul which moved the ball fifteen steps closer and Wheeler had a first down

on the 14. Bobby Ware got nine yards with two carries and after being held to no gain on the next play as Rives was tripped up at the line of scrimmage, Ware got four more to the ones. The quarter ended. On the first play of the second quarter, Rives hit right guard on the dive and got the TD. A pass was no good for the extra points and the lead rose to 14-0.

The Mustangs were forced to play defense the rest of the half which saw the Miami Warriors take the kickoff and move to the Wheeler 17 where the dive bogged down.

The big play in this drive for the visitors was a sneak up the middle by Murphy, the Warrior quarterback, for 23 yards on a fourth and one situation.

Wheeler presented the ball back to Miami three plays after holdup on the 17 by losing a fumble to the Warriors at the 49 in Mustang territory. A screen pass from David Jamison to Fred Good put the ball just shy of the midfield stripe when the fumble bug hit on the next play. Miami was unable to gain past the Wheeler 40 and lost the ball on downs.

After the halftime break, the Mustangs came back and took out their miseries on the Warriors. Taking the kickoff, the Mustangs were jolted by two dipping penalties and found themselves on their own 15 yard line. Mike Good found Vanpool loose at the 30 and hit him with the Mustangs third pass completion and Vanpool headed goalward. With practically every Miami player having a shot at him, Vanpool cut across the field twice and broke in the clear at the Warrior 15 and went over for the third Mustang score. Smith tacked on two points with a sweep around his left end and Wheeler had a 22 point advantage at 10:42 in the third quarter.

Coach Hill began to patch his lineup with reserves and this mixture held the Warriors at bay for their next three possessions. After forcing Miami to punt for the third time in the quarter, the Mustangs had the ball at the Wheeler 37. On the first play, Vanpool got the call and Dorman and Hunter opened the hole and away Vanpool went for 63 yards to paydirt. Dorman's extra point kick was low and the quarter ended three minutes later with the home crew owning the scoreboard by 28 points.

The Mustangs second bunch had driven to the Miami 35 early in the last stanza where they lost the ball on downs and Miami started the drive that culminated in their only scoring of the night. A pass from Murphy to Grantham got 38 big yards in the drive to put the ball on the Wheeler 22. The Mustang defense gave up yardage grudgingly and Miami got to the one yard line fourth down facing them. Lister made it in on the fourth down carry and that was as far as Miami scoring was concerned as the run for the two points failed.

Only 6:44 remained in the game but Wheeler wasn't through. Smith returned the kickoff nine yards to the Mustang 16 and 27 seconds later the Mustangs had more points. Smith found an opening at left tackle and following his blockers with precision, cut for the sideline. Once he got to the Miami 40, it was no contest and Smith sailed on for the fifth Wheeler touchdown. Gary Hardcastle put the ball through the uprights for the 35th light on the scoreboard.

Cale kicked off for Wheeler and three plays later Tucker intercepted a Miami pass and the Mustangs were back in business on the Miami 45. Rogers got four at right end and Ware picked up another four at left tackle. Rives got the first down with a 13 yard jaunt and Robinson added five at left tackle. This group of Mustangs was determined to score and Rogers got the TD as he raced 19 yards around his right end. Dorman kicked the extra point and the scoring was completed with Wheeler on the long end of the 42-6 count.

Every boy that has been out for football this season got into the Miami contest and the second unit that played a big part in the contest was as follows: Stiles and Chambers, ends; Daughtry and Porter, tackles; Holt and Tucker, guards; Moore, center; Ware, quarterback; Rogers and Rves, halfbacks; and Robinson, fullback.

**County HD Agent's News**

During the month of November the Briscoe and Wheeler Home Demonstration clubs received programs on "Holiday Preparations."

"Homemakers of Wheeler county might also be interested in some new ideas in Holiday Dishes since the Holiday season is just around the corner," reported the home demonstration agent.

Management and planning are the key to a successful Holiday season. WHY? There are several reasons. The homemaker can review her menu and see which dishes can be prepared several weeks in advance. This will give her more time to try new recipes; prepare more garnishes to put around salads, meats and also having dishes already prepared she can spend more time with her holiday guests. So remember, if you want a more enjoyable holiday season with less time in the kitchen, prepare ahead of time.

Cranberries are a good that we usually associate with the holiday season. Cranberries are as American as Thanksgiving Day! Cranberry dishes whether served as a sauce, salads, desserts or relish add zest and flavor to any Holiday meal.

Tired of the same cranberry sard; try this one!

**Frozen Cranberry Salad**  
Whip one can of cranberry sauce in mixer. Add 1 no. 2 can crushed pineapple drained. Mash 3 large bananas and add mixture with 1/2 pint whipping cream whipped, 1 small pkg. of the small marshmallows, 1 cup nuts, 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1/2 teaspoon red cake coloring. Mix all ingredients except whipped cream. Whip cream. Chill thoroughly. Then place in freezer. Will keep indefinitely.

**Cranberry Refrigerator Cake**  
2 cups chopped cranberries; 1 large banana diced; 2 3 cup white sugar

**How to Care For Your Deer**

When taking a deer carcass home from camp, don't expose the meat to motor heat or exhaust gases, says County agent Charles D. Jackson. Wrap the meat loosely and transport it on top of the car, in the bed of a pickup truck or in the car trunk.

Butchering can be done professionally, usually at a moderate cost. Locker plants do excellent jobs of aging, butchering, wrapping and quick-freezing the meat. They can take inferior cuts, combine them with pork and make good sausage if you wish.

If you want to butcher the carcass yourself, hang it by the hooks or hook tendons. Split the carcass along the backbone with a meat saw or hand axe. Cut between the last two ribs and through the backbone to quarter the carcass. Discard or use as pet food the badly mutilated portions.

Venison is a dry meat and can be improved by adding butter or margarine, suet or other fat when broiling, pan-broiling or roasting. Use dry heat for tender cuts and moist heat for less tender cuts.

Some cuts of vension and suggested uses are:  
The hind and fore shank for soups, stews or gong for sausage, meat loaf and patties.  
The round of a carcass is usually tender enough for steaks. If less tender use it for Swisssteaks, or grind it for sausage, patties or meat loaf.  
Legs, if small, may be roasted in an uncovered pan without adding liquid. Loin of vension is used for sirloin and paterhouse steak or choice roasts. Shoulder or chuck should be cut into roasts for pot roasting or ground.  
Flank and breast cuts contain considerable meat. Use them for soups, stews or grind for patties, meat loaf or sausage.  
The neck of the carcass should have the tendons removed. It can then be roasted used as stew or ground. Happy Deer hunting, says Agent Charles D. Jackson.

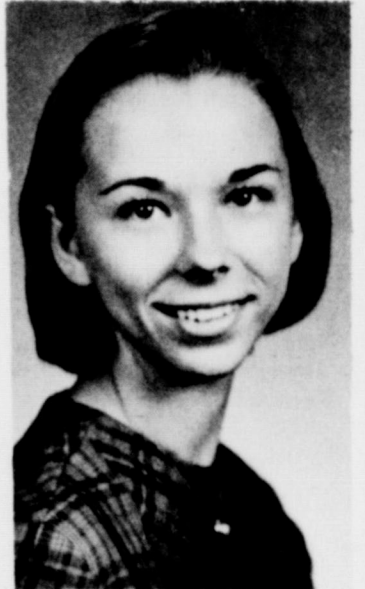

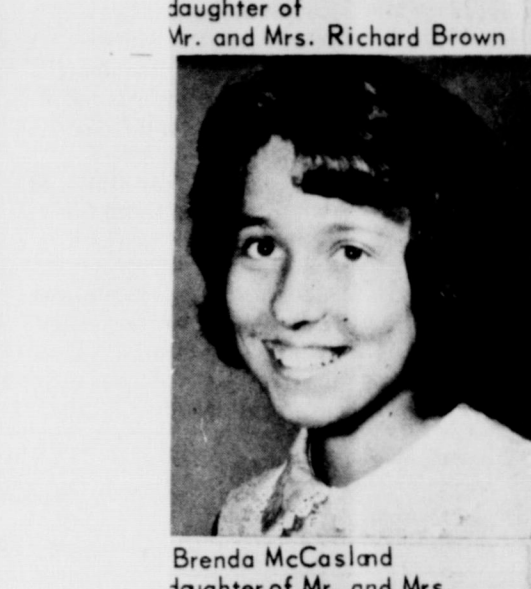

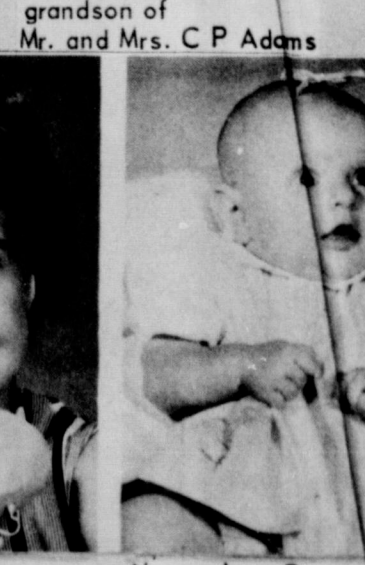

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

Prospects are Bright for  
Wheeler County Crops**

The weather conditions during October and the first part of November have been excellent for late crop maturity. Ideal weather for crops to mature could never have come at a more ideal time for Wheeler County farmers. All sections of Wheeler county will produce greater yields than last year's production. Grain sorghum yields are between 1500 to 2500 pounds per acre with an average of about a ton per acre. This is at least one-third greater than last years crop. Cotton should produce about twice as much as last years crop and may be comparable to the 1963 crop. Vernie Hardcastle, cotton farmer at Wheeler, predicted the 1965 crop would average between three quarters and one bale per acre. Most areas of the county have had favorable weather conditions during the growing season except Briscoe and Mobeetie which may not have received the moisture that other areas received. Greater production is certainly needed this year to counteract the dry year that we had in 1964. Increase in production is due to receiving the proper amount of moisture at the right time and the fertilizer tonnage in Wheeler increased a great deal more during the past four years.

Some matching is still required, particularly of those costs of treating screwworm outbreaks that occur in U.S. areas where screwworms have already been eradicated. However, the maintenance of the screw-worm barrier zone along the U.S.-Mexico border to prevent reinfestation by migrating flies has become a federal responsibility.

Specifically, the bill provided the following: \$2,806,200 for maintenance of the barrier zone; \$1,000,000 for eradication activities in Arizona and California of which \$600,000 must be matched by the participating states. \$320,000 for an intensive survey in Mexico to ascertain the exact extent of screw-worm problems and to assist in determining where and how the barrier can best be maintained. Not all of the ramifications of the bill were known earlier this week. Such questions as exactly which costs are required to be matched, what constitutes the barrier zone, etc., are still subject to interpretation, but in effect, Congress agreed that maintenance of the barrier zone is a federal responsibility—a fact that the livestock industry has contended since screwworms were declared eradicated from the southwest in 1964.

Since the eradication campaign got underway in February 1962, the industry state legislatures in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Louisiana have up approximately \$7,500,000 or roughly half the total expended. The livestock industry alone, through the Southwest Animal Health research foundation raised \$4,000,000 on a voluntary basis to carry on the program. Foundation president Dolph Briscoe, Jr., called the action Congress took "This action will ensure that all states will be freed from this insect which caused up to \$100 million damage each year." Briscoe pledged the need support of livestock producers in treating animal wounds and reporting activities to eradication workers. Recent changes made in the federal law that the Farmers Home Administration can make loans in towns up to \$50 size. Shamrock did not become eligible for these loans Oct. 1, 1965. 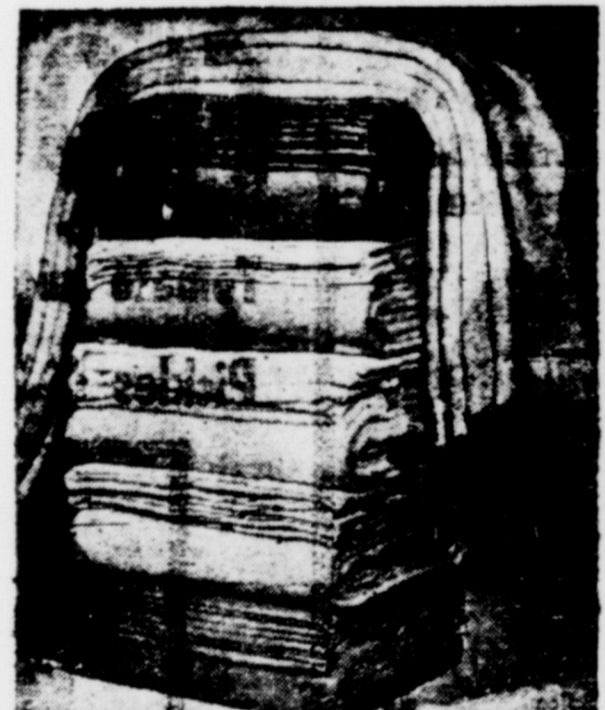

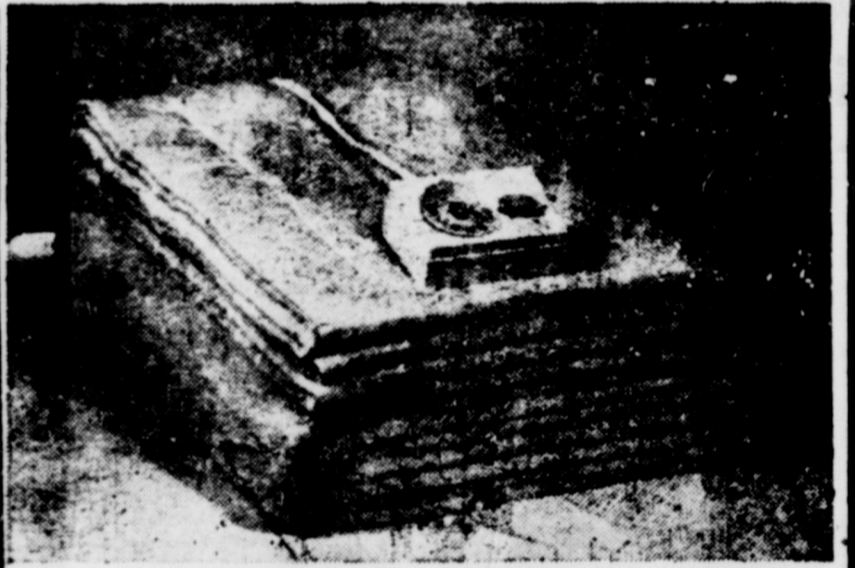
