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SPS Sets 1966 Construction Goal

1966 construction and investment program which calls for the investment of an estimated \$19,353,000 in facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A.R. Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

Comparing our construction program with a military program, 1966 could be called a year when we go to strengthen and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build an already strong interconnected electric system facilities which will provide greater service reliability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with a total of \$7,500,000 of the total construction program designed for the construction and investment of the electrical systems which bring the power from the generating plants to the areas served by the electric company.

Principal result of this construction will be that backbone transmission or principal electric lines linking the three large generating stations will be a 230,000 volt line. This line, northeast of Hills Station, northeast of Hills, Plant X, in Lamb County and Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, N.M., the three generating stations.

An 80 foot electric transmission line structure can be lifted and set into place in 8 1/2 minutes with Southwestern Public Service Company's new hydraulic crane. Southwestern Public Service Company has announced a 1966 construction program calling for the investment of \$19,353,000 in new facilities, with a large portion of the additional investment to be in transmission lines.

to move four times more power than we are able to now transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone', or main, line is an addition to existing facilities, and means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system. In other words, there are other transmission routes in addition to this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

Watson went on to point out that the generation and transmission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

Major construction will begin during 1966 on another 210,000 kilowatt steam-electric generating unit at Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo. This will be the third generator installed since 1960 at this location and will increase the capability of the plant to 435,000 kilowatts. Completion of the new unit is scheduled for mid-1968.

Farmers who are receiving payments in connection with participation in farm action programs are being asked to let the ASCS County Office know what their Social Security numbers are.

According to Elbert Zybach, Chairman of the ASCS county committee, a form requesting this information has been mailed to all known producers who receive program payments, to be filled out and returned to the county ASCS office as soon as possible.

He explained that beginning January 1, 1966, the identifying Social Security numbers will be entered on payment drafts to producers, and will be used by the Department of Agriculture in reporting such payments to the Internal Revenue Service.

Riding Club Calls Jan 4 Meet

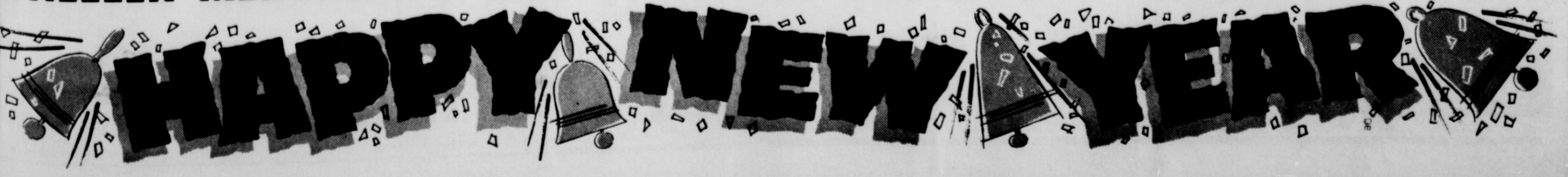
The Wheeler Riding Club will meet January 4 at Holdem implement. The purpose of the meeting will be general business.

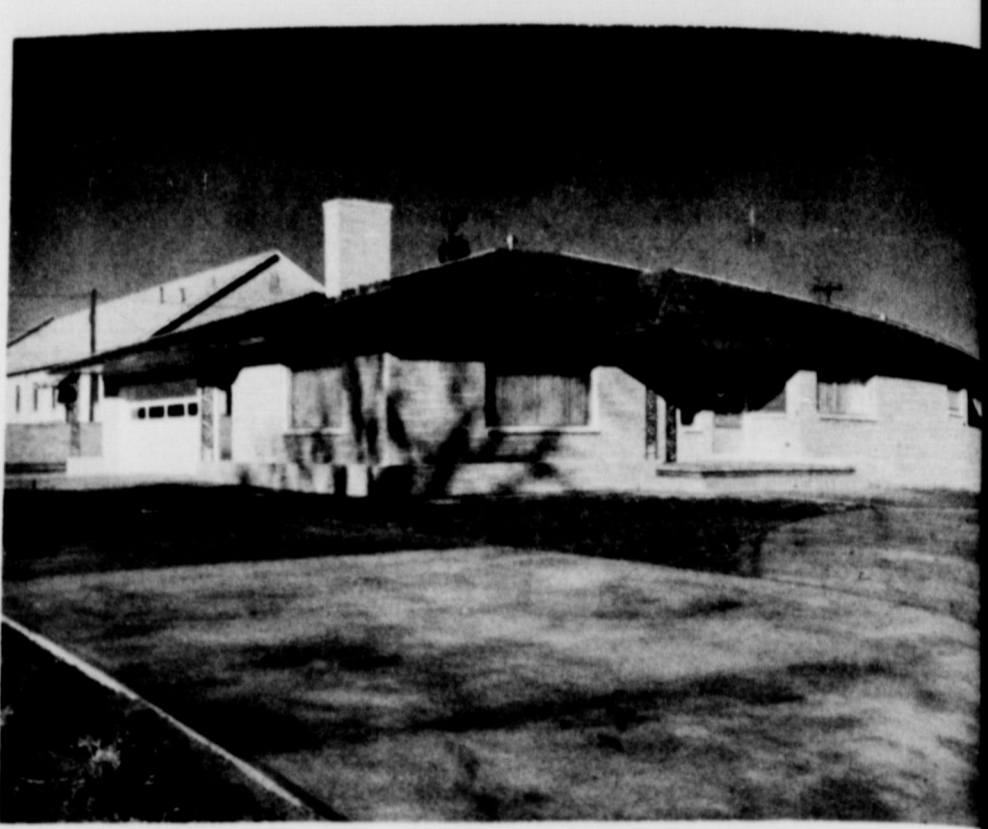

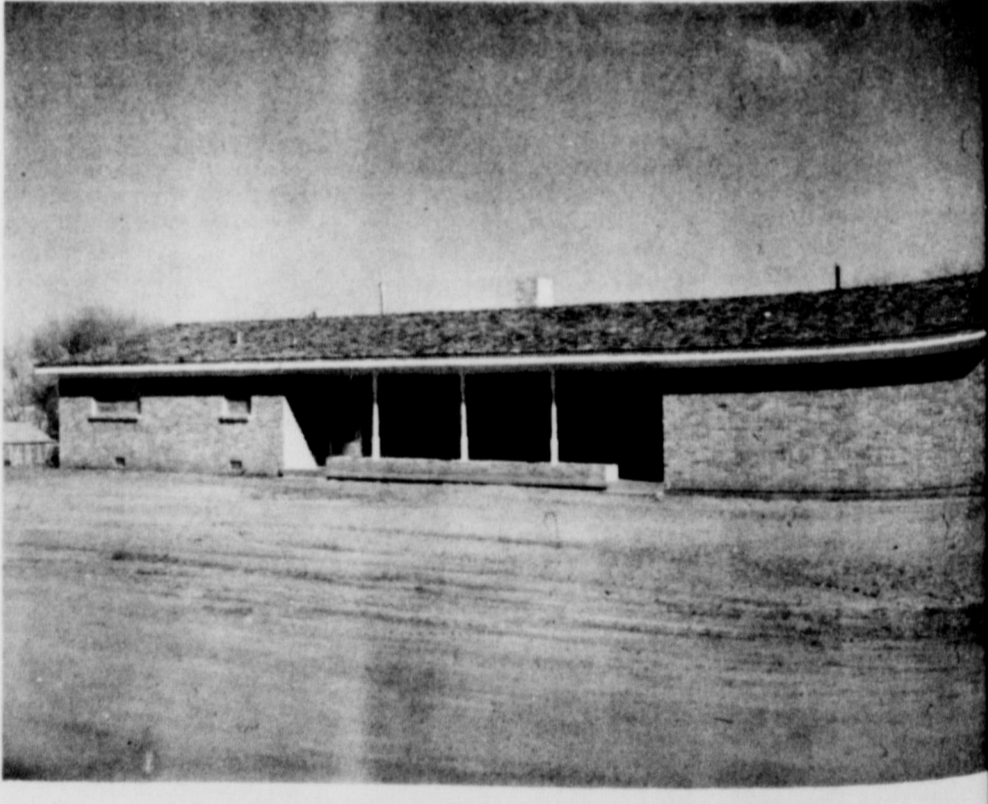

Information About Knits

Knits have become an important part of every girl's wardrobe--since they are both smart and comfortable. But remember even though knits are very much in the news, they do require special knowledge and care on the part of the buyer.

A single knit--such as Jersey--has just one set of wrap yarns and one set of filling yarns, so it is lighter in weight than a double thickness to the fabric. Many new knits are pre-lined.

When choosing your pattern, select a simple one with as few seams as possible. Do not choose patterns requiring cutting on the bias, such as circular skirts.

In preparing your knitted fabric for sewing, first establish your guideline--or grain line--by hand basting along one straight lengthwise rib. Fold double knits parallel with the basted rib and then lay out your pattern, using pins placed closely together.

On all knit fabrics, you should stay-stitch the edges you do not want to become distorted, such as necklines, and shoulder seams. Use a fine sewing machine needle, synthetic or cotton thread and sew from 12 to 16 stitches per inch. Single knits require a medium tension; a loose tension--a size 11 or 14 needle and a straight or small zig-zag stitch--for double knits is recommended.

It's best to sew seam tape or ribbon into the shoulder seams and waistline of all knits. Stitch double knits around the bottom and then catch-stitch the raw edge invisibly to the garment.
