County Agents Report

Ham is an all season favorite and extremely popular during the holiday season, reminds Vivian Waminski, county home demonstration agent.

Ham is often served instead of Turkey at Christmas because of its ease to prepare and serve.

Ham is available to the consumer uncooked, fully cooked or canned. The consumer has a choice of purchasing ham as whole ham, Shank ham, butt ham, shank end and butt end are the pieces of a whole ham split in half.

Ham may be scored and glazed if desired. Remove ham from oven one-half hour before ham is done. Pour off drippings. Remove shank skin if present and cut the fat into diamond shapes.

Coat fat surfaces with one of the suggested glazes. Return ham to oven to complete baking.

Suggested glazes:
1. One cup brown sugar and one tablespoon mustard
2. One cup honey or one cup orange marmalade
3. One cup brown sugar, 2 T. vinegar, 1 teaspoon dry mustard and 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves.

Whole cloves may be used to stud the ham after any one of the glazes is spread on the ham.

Wheeler county has high gaining bulls on test

The November report of the beef cattle improvement and meaty sire evaluation test at Pantex showed two sets of bulls belonging to Wheeler county ranchers have been doing quite well on test. The pen of Angus bulls belonging to Grady Harris of Wheeler was rated sixth over all with an average daily gain of 3.92 pounds per day. Grady had the fifth high gaining bull at 4.89 pounds of gain per day. Wallace Fields of Shamrock has a pen of three Polled Hereford bulls that had an average daily gain of 3.24 pounds per day. Of course this is only a 28 day report, but this is a very good weight gain on all the bulls. A report is issued every 28 days. The performance tested bull sale at Pantex is March 24, 1966.

Back tags available at County Agents Office

Back-tags are available at the County Agents office that may be assigned to livestock producers individual herds. Backtagging is a method where by a rancher may tag a three year old cow or older when she is shipped to market and she will be tested through the market testing program for Brucellosis. The tag is coded to indicate the individual herd, county and state of origin. The blood from the slaughtered animal is tested by the state lab in whatever state that she is slaughtered. Credit for negative animals will be given the individual producer as well as the Modified-Certified Brucellosis free county that

she may originate from. A card is mailed by the producer to the state lab on the date that the animal is shipped. If a positive animal is not slaughtered within two weeks from the date of shipment, then the reactor will not count against the herd. This is for the ranchers protection in case someone buys the animal at the time of sale and keeps the animal for over a two week period before she is slaughtered.

If every rancher co-operated through the back-tag program, then it would probably eliminate testing twenty percent of the cattle in the county every three years. About five to six percent of the cattle should be backtagged and tested each year. The livestock markets are supposed to be following this market testing program now, but I understand some of them aren't co-operating. Each livestock producer should either backtag his cattle or see that the market that sells his cattle performs this service. I would like to remind producers that a herd is retested immediately when a reactor shows up. This is for the producers protection to prevent an outbreak from spreading.

1966 Outlook: Prices of cattle, hogs and lambs
Prices of cattle, hogs and lambs next year will likely average higher than in 1965. And cash receipts from livestock marketings should advance despite little change in the volume of marketings. The cattle inventory at year-end will probably be down more than a million head, ending 7 straight years

of buildup. Herd rebuilding may begin next year. This reduce cattle and calf slaughter slightly from 1965 levels, but probably would not keep the inventory from declining again. This would point to less beef production per person for several years.

Fed cattle prices next year are expected to continue strong and average at or above 1965. Output of fed beef may be up somewhat, but there will probably be less non-fed beef and other red meats. Any bunching of fed cattle marketings, however, would depress prices for short periods.

Feeder cattle prices probably will make a strong seasonal rise this winter, than stay relatively strong through the year. Brish demand is likely for feedlot replacements and for additions to breeding herds.

Hog slaughter will likely continue below year-earlier levels through the summer of 1966. This indicated sustained price strength for hogs through most of the year. Later price difficulties may develop, however, depending on the size of the pig buildup late next spring and next fall. If farrowings increase sharply, prices will decline late in 1966 and in 1967.

Lamb prices above 1965 levels are expected. There will likely be a further decline in sheep and lamb slaughter as many sheep producers build their breeding flocks after holding back a large number of ewe lambs this year.

Wheeler county. Ownership transfer may be made outside of Wheeler county. Ownership transfer may be made outside of Wheeler county, but lease and sale must remain within the county. Details concerning this program will be explained at this meeting Thursday night, Dec. 16.

The present recipients of Social Security are automatically being sent letters with a card to file for Medicare. In case of loss of card, apply to local Social Security office.

Persons on Old Age Assistance will receive instructions from the Texas State Department of Public Welfare.

At the present time everyone who is 65 and over is entitled to apply. Applications must be filed by March 31, 1966.

Those persons who are not 65 now but reach 65 before the 1968 enrollment period must apply 3 months previous to their 65th birthday or 3 months afterward.

The next enrollment period will not be until 1968. Under present law, work requirements must be met to apply at that time.

A traveling plaque, carrying the names of all Regional winners since 1949, will hang at the school of the winner.

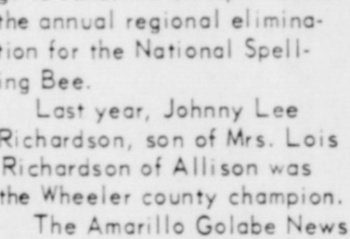

Christmas at the Post Office

It is urgent that any remaining Christmas mail be sent out over the weekend, Postmaster Virgil Jamison stressed today.

In the last three weeks, the nation has witnessed more people mailing gifts, cards and letters than ever before.

The Postmaster said that across the nation every piece of Christmas mail that can possibly be delivered on time. However, at this time of the year, the strain on transportation facilities and the unpredictability of weather can mean unexpected delays.

Mr. Jamison suggested that mailers consider the use of air mail and special delivery, especially for out of town mail.

He noted that holiday schedules will be in effect on Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 25 and 26. Although Christmas falls on a Saturday and many business firms will be letting their employees off Friday, a sufficient number of postal workers will remain on duty to see that all Christmas mail entering post offices in time for delivery will reach its destination. Only special delivery and perishable mail will be delivered on Christmas Day.

The Wheeler Postmaster thanked all his customers for their excellent cooperation so far.

We noted that the use of Zip Code has increased significantly over last year and that most people mailed early. The local peak day was Dec. 16. However, there still is an extremely heavy volume of mail to be delivered.

In order to handle the late mail the Wheeler Post office windows will be open all day on Saturday, Dec. 18. There will be clerks on duty to sell stamps and handle mailings until 5 p.m. on that day.
