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





Persons on Old Age Assistance will receive instructions from the Texas State Department of Public Welfare. At the present time everyone who is 65 and over is eligible to apply. Applications must be filed by March 31. 1966

Those persons who are not 65 now but reach 65 before the 1968 enrollment period must apply 3 months previous to their 65th birthday or 3 months afterward.

The next enrollment period will not be until 1968. Under present law, work requirements must be met to apply at that time.
