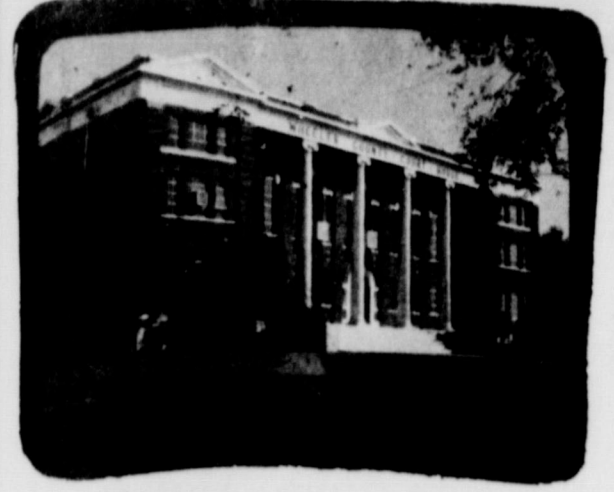

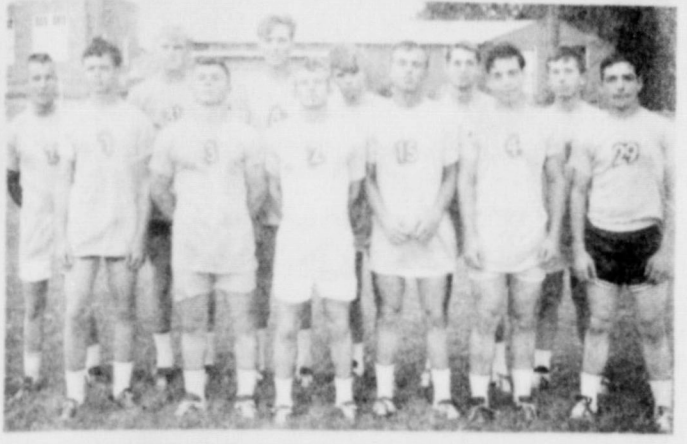

## PROCLAMATION

By The GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS To All Whom These Presents Shall Come: BE IT KNOWN THAT I, John Connally, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby order a Special Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on September 7, 1965, and notice is hereby given to the people as required by law. The County Judge of each county is directed to cause said election to be held on such date in each precinct in the county in the manner required by law. Said SPECIAL ELECTION IS ORDERED FOR THE PURPOSE of adopting or rejecting the following Constitutional Amendment submitted by the 59th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1965:

## William Guest Captured in Ohio

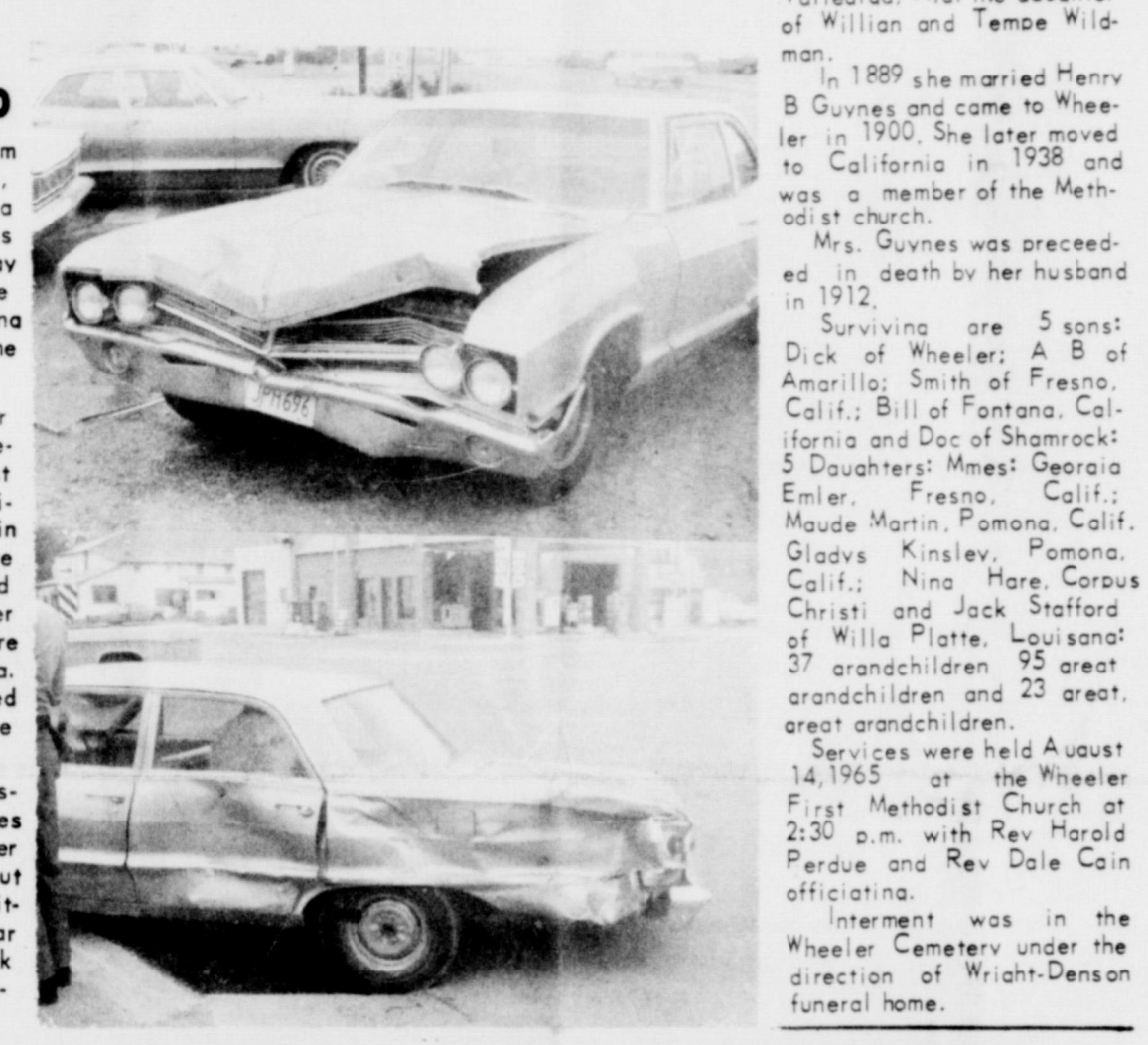
The capture of William Eugene Guest in Lancaster, Ohio brought to a close a year long search which has been underway since May 17, 1964. Guest at the time of the capture was leading a life of leisure under the name of William E. Guess. Guest was one of four prisoners who escaped Wheeler county jail on the night of May 17. Three of the prisoners traveled together in Sheriff Bus Dorman's private car. The car was abandoned nine miles east of Wheeler and two of the prisoners were captured near Chevene Okla. and the third was captured in Sweetwater, Okla three days later. Guest made good his escape after riding seven miles east on 152 with the other prisoners and starting out afoot. Guest walked to Twitty where he stole a car which he drove to Shamrock. The Trail ended in Shamrock. Warrants were issued for his arrest by Wheeler county officials and the FBI. Guest was recognized in his home town and arrested by the FBI. He is at present fighting extradition. Guest is 33 years of age and has been charged in Wheeler county with burglary, car theft and jail breaking.

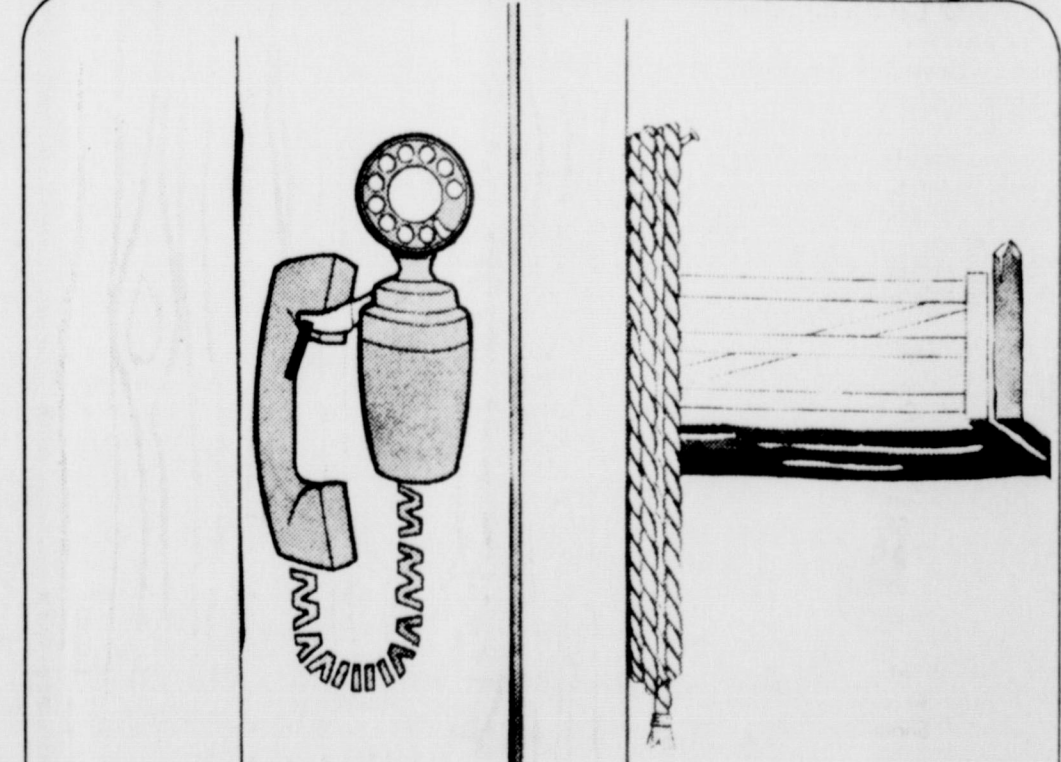

Co Agent Reports

By Charles Jackson Ballworm Control For the last few weeks ballworms have been increasing all over the rolling Plains. If these ballworms are not controlled within the first five days after hatch, they are capable of causing significant losses.

Producers should inspect fields regularly and make insecticide applications when ballworms eggs and four to five young worms are found per 100 terminals or 5 per cent of the squares and balls have been injured by small ballworms.

Insecticides should be applied at 5 day intervals until the infestation is brought under control. When heavy infestations are present, it may be necessary to shorten the interval.

Cotton ballworms eggs are pearly white when first laid but in 24 to 36 hours a purplish brown band appears on the upper third. The eggs are usually about the size of a pinhead.

They are laid singly, and on cotton they are usually placed on the tender terminals on the upper third of the plant. A ballworm egg is taller than its width at the base and resembles a small finely ribbed inverted cup. Eggs usually hatch in two to four days, but may take as long as 10 days.

The recommended materials for ballworm control are: Insecticides and pounds per acre of actual insecticides to be applied as spray.

Ballworms have developed a resistance to some chlorinated hydrocarbons, but not to methyl parathion, where resistant ballworms or tobacco budworms are encountered 9.5 to 1.0 lb of methyl parathion should be added to one of the above listed recommendations. If ballworms are hard to kill at 0.5 lb of methyl parathion per acre plus one of the above recommendations, increase the methyl parathion to 1.0 lb per acre. Keep on schedule and apply this insecticide until control is obtained, then drop back on methyl parathion to 0.5 per acre if desired. Proper applications and timing are also very important in ballworm control.
