

After all moisture has dried off, cut the stems withn 3 inches of the crown. A small fine-tooth saw is excellent for this purpose. The Holiday Season is ust around the corner; do you have all of your Christmast decorations made? If not, here are some ideas that might be of interest to you.

Needed: Pine Cones, paint, shellac, colored chalk, Pledge of Allegiance wa window screen wire, (small piece) small brush. Select cones that have

stems attached (or they may be wired) because they will be easy to fasten to wreaths and other holiday decorations.

Some of the cones may be given the appearance of gold or silver by brushing or by spraying with gold or silver paint. If brushing methodm use sterwald, Lyndon a small brush so the paint can be worked among the scales.
