FARM WELDING COURSE

A Farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held Oct. 18-21 under the sponsorship of the Wheeler high school Vocational Ag. Department according to Mr. Arling Cordell, superintendent and Mr. Dennis Wilks, teacher of voc. ag.

Mr. Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Voc. Ag. division of the Texas Education Agency and the department of Agricultural engineering at Texas A & M College will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Barton is a native of Glascock county, Texas and was reared on a west Texas ranch. He attended grade school in San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake. He holds a B.S. degree in animal husbandry from Texas A & M.

After five years as a pilot in the U.S. Air Force, Mr. Barton served as an ag. specialist in Texas State Hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Barton and all have met with outstanding success, according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of voc. ag. of Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labay's office.

The short course at Wheeler is scheduled to begin Oct. 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the voc. ag. building. Other meetings in the series of 4 days will be held Oct. 18, 19, 20, 21. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on the farm instruction according to Dennis Wilks, Voc. Ag. teacher.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of schools, Mr. Arling Cordell or the Voc. Ag. Teacher, Mr. Dennis Wilks. An entry fee of \$1.00 will be charged. Farm welding Short course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Barton states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operation in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hard surfacing and pipe welding.

"Short courses in welding as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M College," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, department of Agricultural Education at Texas A & M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M.

"This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of voc. ag. to provide improved educational services to farm people," states Jaska.

Specialists are available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy cattle, oxy-acetylene welding and pasture.

THE COMMISSIONER'S COURT OF WHEELER COUNTY HAS AUTHORIZED THE TAX COLLECTOR TO GIVE THE DISCOUNT ON ALL 1964 TAXES AS PROVIDED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AS FOLLOWS:

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A&M DOING PANHANDLE STUDY

Texas W & M University has undertaken a massive economic development study of the Panhandle designed primarily to identify the longrange problems and opportunities confronting the area.

Extension farm management specialists, James C. Murphrey, whose office is in Amarillo, is serving as coordinator of the study. He said it will be the most encompassing economic evaluation of an area's resources ever attempted by A & M. Wheeler county will have a part in the study since eight to ten county leaders will be interviewed and the Wheeler county agricultural agent has written a comprehensive report concerning Wheeler county in connection with the study.

Agriculture will receive the major emphasis in the study, Murphrey said, but data on the industries and sociological aspects of the area will also be compiled. This project will result in an inventory of all our economic influences which will be beneficial in preparing guidelines for future growth Murphrey said.

A report of the study will be printed and made available to people interested in the area's economic growth, he said. The report is tentatively scheduled to be printed next spring.

A number of agencies, colleges and organizations are contributing data for the study, although the largest portion of the information will be compiled by staff members with Texas A & M he said.

The study was first proposed in May of this year when a small group of economic and civic leaders and educators met in Amarillo to discuss what was known about the water resources in the Panhandle.

The group decided that a thorough investigation of all of the area's resources would benefit the area and the dean of A & M's college of Ag. Dr. R E Patterson, volunteered the services and staff of A & M to do the job.

Murphrey said that agricultural parts of the study

will include an inventory of pertinent research and recommendations for making better use of agricultural resources in the area.

We also hope to identify the outside factors effecting our economy such as foreign trade restrictions, freight rates and government programs, Murphrey said. We will be exploring the market situation, possibilities of new crops and the opportunities facing their particular segment of the economy, he said.

More than 200 economic leaders will be interviewed for their opinions on the problem and opportunities facing their particular segment of the economy, he said.

The report will include a summary of all the data compiled and will list hundreds of sources of available information so interested individuals, firms and organizations can readily compile data that may aid in planning the future of their particular interests.

Also included in the report will be suggestions, recommendations and guidelines that will help in planning for economic growth in the Panhandle, Murphrey said.
