Mr. Whaley's program was an explanation of the proposed beef check-off plan. Mr. Whaley seated that while all the details of the plan had not been worked out, the basic plan is good and is badly needed by the beef industry. While most people in the industry know the facts, the consumer is swayed by various public comments against beef. The beef industry now spends only .016 of 1% of its money

of beef promotion and research. This is very, very little in comparison with other industries. Mr. Whaley stated that more must be spent to help the industry in its present difficulties. The main points of the program are: (1) The money will be used in the advertising and promotion of beef, consumer education, research, and nutrition. (2) Efforts to improve markets, and locate new markets abroad. (3) The proposed check-off amount is (three tenths of one percent) .3 of 1% on the increased value of the animal each time it changes ownership. For example: A rancher

sells a calf for \$100 to a stocker. The Stocker pays the rancher \$99.70. later the stocker sells the calf to a feeder for \$200. The feeder pays the stocker \$199.40. When the calf is ready, it is sold to the packer for \$400. The packer pays the feeder \$398. 80 and sends \$1.20 to the Beef Board. The packer isrequired by law to remit the check-off to the Board. As you can see, no money is actually sent to the board until the final sale and the rate is always the same .3 of 1% (three tenths of one percent) of the increased value. provision. If a seller did not wish to participate in the check-off, he can fill out a form when the sale takes place and send it to theBeef Board for a refund of his share of the checkoff. (5) The Beef Board will have 68 members. The Secretary of Agriculture is to appoint one member from each cattle producing state. The other members are to be selected based on cattle numbers. For example, a state with more cattle numbers will have more members than a state with fewer cattle numbers. (6) This Beef Board will have the responsibility of controlling and enforcing the collecting and spending of the money received from this plan.
