### Hon. M. Kent Sims Serves College for New Judges

Hon. M. Kent Sims of Wheeler served as dean and faculty member of the Texas Center for the Judiciary, Inc.'s 1995 College for New Judges. The college offers an educational program designed to prepare new judges for the bench.

Sims, judge of the 31st District Court in Wheeler, joined 20 of the state's most experienced judges and other professionals to educate the 1995 class of new judges.

More than 30 new judges participated in the program which was held at the Grand Kempinski Hotel in Dallas on December 3-8. All judges appointed to a statutory or district court or elevated to an appellate court in the last year were invited to attend the college.

Topics covered in the College for New Judges program included ethics, judicial writing, family violence, evidence, trial management, and court administration.

"The college provides a unique opportunity to analyze the role and responsibilities of being a judge and develop the skills necessary to be effective in this position," said Mari Kay Bickett, executive director of the Texas Center for the Judiciary, Inc. "It provides valuable information and training in the pursuit of becoming a fair and impartial administrator of justice."

The Weatherly Family, Wheeler, Texas

The Weatherlys have found that environmental stewardship is one of the best ways to improve the bottom line. By applying manure resources from the feedyard to adjacent fields, the Weatherlys have built up the humus in their soil, thus increasing forage growth on once desolate, erodible land. The family now produces 40 times as much beef per acre as it did in the 1960s. In addition, the family has incorporated a gravity-flow water system that reduces energy costs and recycles water from the feedlot onto the pasture. Savings from the new system amount to 111 million gallons of water and \$7,880 in energy costs annually.

From using wasps to control stable flies, and gravity-flow watering systems that maximize land use in arid regions, cattle-producing families are increasing productivity and profitability through careful land-stewardship.

NCA began honoring farmers and ranchers for innovative stewardship practices five years ago with the Environmental Stewardship Award Program (ESA). Funding for the award is provided by a grant from Pfizer Animal Health. NCA honors farming and ranching families whose stewardship improves and protects the health and productivity of their land and the health of their businesses.

### National Spelling Bee Is Planned For April 13

AMARILLO, TX.: Directors are being named in the Texas Panhandle, parts of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas to support the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University in the annual National Spelling Bee program.

The date of the regional event in 1996 will be April 13 and the educational event is open to any student who will not have gone beyond the eighth grade at the time of the national event (June 1, 1996), or older than 16. Public, private and parochial students are eligible to enter.

Directing the Wheeler County Bee(s) will be Pat Seward, teacher, Shamrock Elementary School, Shamrock.

Each county director will select a location and set a date for his/her county bee(s) and notify all schools in the respective area.

All county champions are to be reported to Jeanne Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Amarillo, Tx., no later than March 30.

The 1996 regional bee will be held on the campus of West Texas A&M University, under the direction of Judy Kelley, bee coordinator for the sponsors.

She is instructor of mathematics and associate director of the Texas Engineering Experiment Station Regional Division, WTAMU.

The new champion will be the recipient of an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. to represent the area in the 69th annual Scripps Howard National Spelling Bee during the week of May 27.

There will be other prizes although the complete prize list is not yet available.

There are two levels of competition: (1) The Junior Bee is for all elementary students, grades five and below, and (2) the senior Bee is open to any student in grades eight and below—and can include elementary school participants if the directors so choose. Normally a Junior county winner will not compete in regional; however, if an elementary grade student should win his/her county title, this speller will be allowed to compete. Each county will have only one representative in the regional competition.

The area sponsors will honor all county winners at a luncheon on the WTA&M campus on April 13.

The study booklet "Paideia" will be available by mid-October and the price will be 75-cents per copy. The booklets will be available from the personnel department of the Amarillo Globe-News.

**INFORMATION FOR THOSE PLANNING TO RETIRE**

If you are approaching age 62 and you are thinking of retiring next year, you should contact Social Security now to discuss your plans. In some cases, your choice of retirement month could mean additional benefits for you and your family. Because the computation varies based on your earnings for the year and the month in which you file, it is a good idea to check with a Social Security representative before making your decision.

Because Social Security rules permit people to work and receive retirement benefits at the same time, it could be to your advantage to have your benefits begin in January even if you do not plan to retire until later in the year. This would allow you to apply

earnings in excess of the annual limit to those months and possible avoid a reduction in monthly benefits for the rest of the year. For your application to be effective in January 1996, you should file for benefits any time before January 31, 1996.

In 1996, beneficiaries under 65 can earn up to \$8,280 with no reduction in Social Security benefits; and beneficiaries aged 65-69 can earn up to \$11,520 with no reduction in Social Security benefits. The amount a person can earn and still receive benefits increases each year with increases in average wages. Of course, if you are 70 or older, your benefits will not be reduced no matter how much you earn.

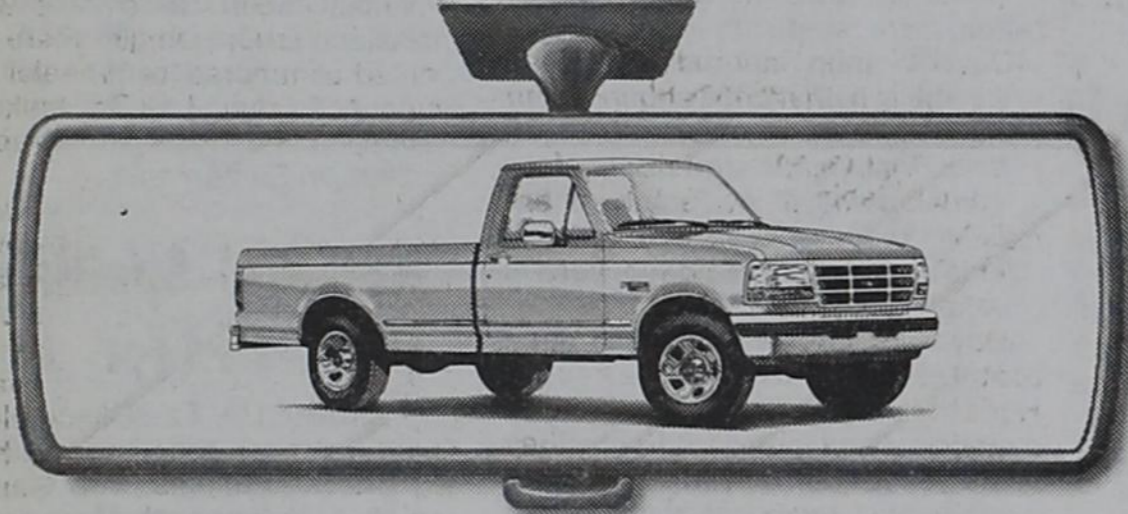

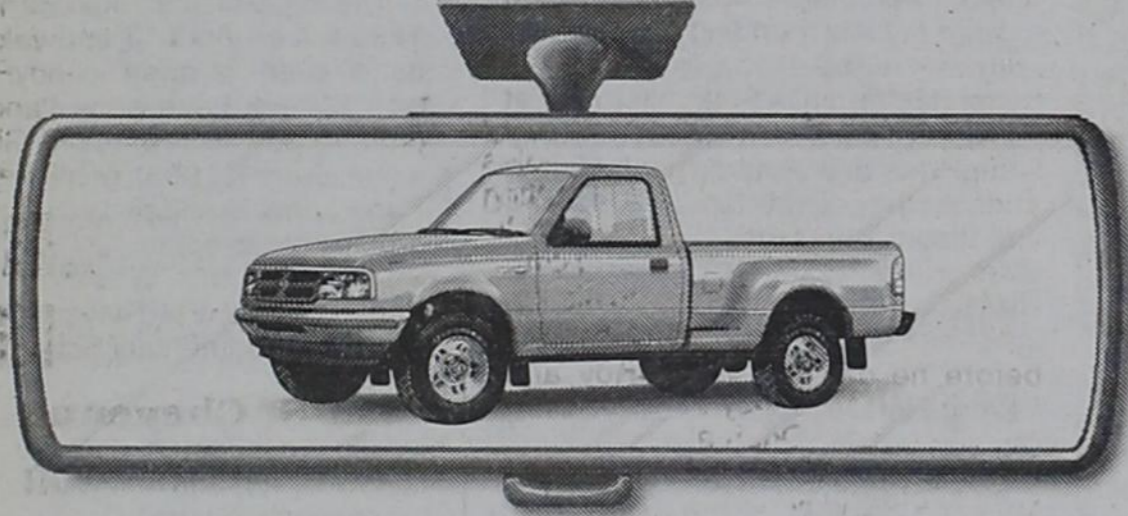

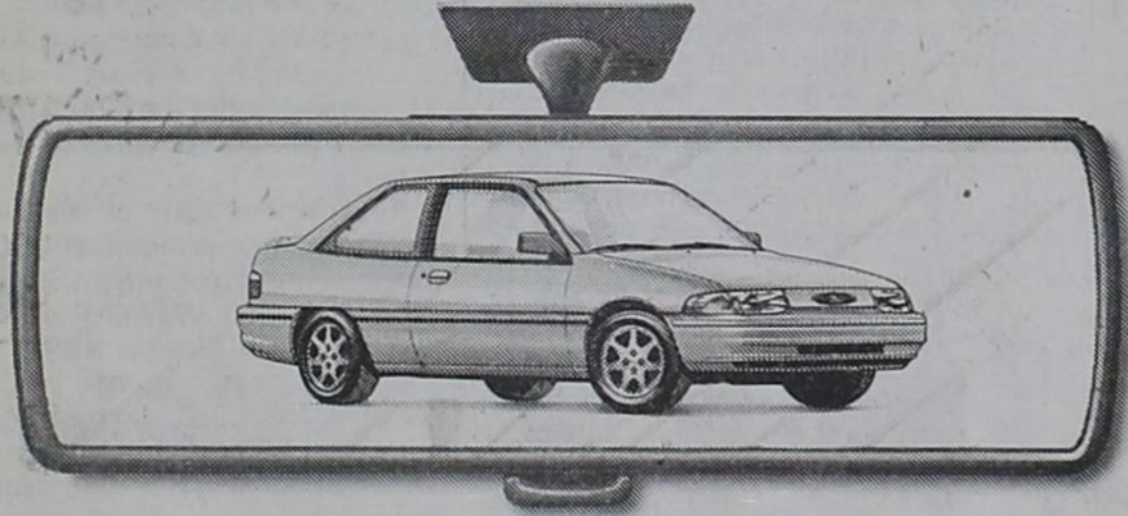

**In West Texas, Energy for a New Century**

As students of Texas history know, Jan. 10, 1901, is a red-letter day for the Lone Star State. That's the day the Spindletop oil well blew in, ushering in a century-long era of world energy leadership for Texas.

A hundred years from now, our children's grandchildren may look back on Nov. 14, 1995 as a date of equal significance. Not as dramatic as a gushing, spewing Spindletop, perhaps, but certainly a red-letter day. That's the day that Texas officially ushered in a new energy era.

On Nov. 14, the state General Land Office and the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) inaugurated a \$40-million 35-megawatt (MW) wind plant in the Delaware Mountains of far West Texas. Called the Texas Wind Power Project, this orchard of 80-foot turbines is coaxing energy out of the air for the people of Texas. It is the state's most ambitious wind energy project to date.

The Wind Power Project has been on line since September. One-hundred-twelve wind turbines in the remote ranching area of Culberson County, near Van Horn, have been harnessing the wind's energy in an area where breezes whistle through the mountains at a 20 miles per hour on average, with gusts up to 80 miles per hour.

The West Texas winds, the second strongest in the nation for wind turbines, will be providing electricity for LCRA customers in Austin and dozens of Central Texas communities, including Seguin, New Braunfels, San Marcos and Bandera. This wind-generated energy will be provided at a fixed price of less than five cents per kWh over a 25-year period.

By committing itself to this clean, abundant sustainable energy source, Texas is committing itself to the most cost-effective, readily available energy source we have. The Lone Star State has come to recognize what other states already have discovered about wind power's potential. California, for example, is producing 2 percent of its electricity using modern wind turbines; as a result, the price of wind power has dropped to about three cents per kWh. With our abundance of high-quality winds in the Panhandle, in far West Texas and along the Gulf Coast, we have the potential to meet this state's growing energy needs in ways unimagined just a few decades ago. In fact, we have enough accessible wind energy to produce more than half again as much energy as we use annually. And unlike fossil fuels, we won't be running out of wind.

The exciting thing about wind power, in addition to its abundance, is the fact that it's environmentally benign. It doesn't pollute the air, it doesn't produce radioactive waste, it doesn't spew out carbon emissions. It hardly produces any noise. The rancher who owns the land where the wind project is located is still grazing cattle within the shadows of the turbines. The turbines, all 112 of them, take up only about 5 percent of the 65,000-acre site.

The Wind Power Project is a prime example of government working with the private sector—for the benefit of the people of Texas. LCRA was looking for ways to diversify its energy sources, while we at the GLO were seeking new revenue sources for the Permanent School Fund, the fund we administer that helps finance public education. Although the wind project is on private land, the GLO receives royalties from the "wind rights." I expect the project to generate \$3 million to \$4 million during the 25 year contract. That's money that "energizes" the state in another very important way; it helps educate our children.

The project is particularly good for rural Texas. As Culberson County residents are well aware, their part of the state has been offered up in recent years as a dumping ground for sludge and nuclear waste; a wind plant, in contrast, looks like a godsend. The people of Culberson County, knowing that as the project expands it means employment for the region, accepted a one-time fee payment in exchange for tax abatements. That employment potential helps explain why the good people of Van Horn, the county seat,

gave their annual Frontier Days festival a wind theme: "Blowing and Growing."

It's not only Van Horn that benefits economically. Kenetech Windpower, Inc., the manufacturer of the wind turbines used in the Texas Wind Power Project, is providing 300 jobs at its plant in Waco, more than 800 jobs, direct and indirect, across the state. Kenetech's Waco plant is the largest dedicated wind turbine manufacturing and assembly facility in the world; Kenetech expects it to be a primary export center for a worldwide market.

One more point about this public/private collaboration: The Texas Wind Power Project, Central and Southwest Corporation's wind farm in Fort Davis and Texas Utilities' planned wind farm in Big Spring would not have happened had it not been for the wind energy tax credit at the federal level. The federal government has a long, honorable history of encouraging innovation—from railroads in the 19th century to supercomputers in the 20th—and this tax credit follows in that worthy tradition. It is a valuable incentive for developing renewable energy, helping diversify the Texas economy and ensuring adequate energy supplies for this nation. This tax credit makes sense and should remain intact.

The Texas Wind Power Project is just the beginning, as Texas moves enthusiastically into other sustainable energy projects. Here at the General Land Office, we are working to develop prudent, economically feasible projects on state lands, both wind and solar, and we are encouraging other private ventures. We are well aware that Texas is one of the top two or three states nationwide in terms of wind and solar potential.

Just as our predecessors "saw their chance and took it" when Spindletop roared in, we too have an opportunity to provide the energy—sustainable energy—that powers a new century. We see our chance. Now is the time to take it.

2) Any cost of drug or alcohol treatment programs shall be borne by the employee. Motion carried unanimously.

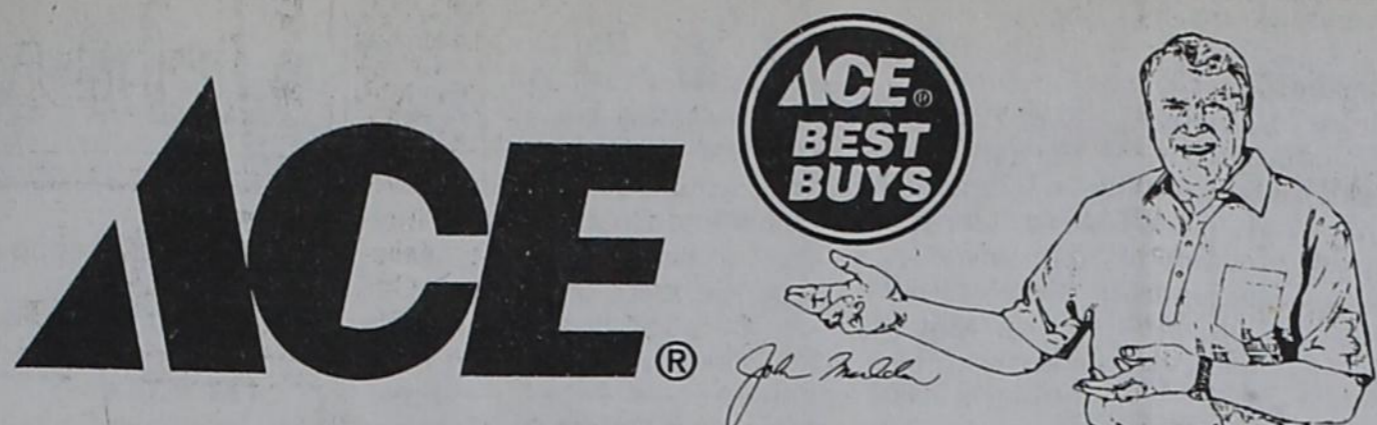

The Board adjourned at 8:51 PM.

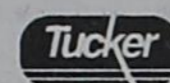

**EMERGENCY FARM LOAN APPLICATIONS**

Applications for emergency farm loans due to damages and losses caused by excessive rain, flash flooding, flooding, hail, and tornadoes are being accepted at the Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) office located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, FmHA County Supervisor, Johnny Earp, said today.

69 counties in the State of Oklahoma were named as disaster areas. In accordance with section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, counties in adjacent States that are contiguous to one or more of the 69 designated areas are named as contiguous counties. Wheeler and Hemphill Counties were recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman, as eligible contiguous counties for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the flooding, flash flooding, excessive

rain, hail and tornadoes, during the period of May 1, 1995, through June 15, 1995, a late hard freeze, which occurred on April 10-11, 1995, and an unusually mild winter which contributed to increased insect and disease infestation during the 1995 small grain growing season.

Mr. Earp said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business of \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an RECD emergency loan," Earp said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 5/13/96, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Earp said.

RECD is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The RECD office is located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, Pampa, TX. Our hours are 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
