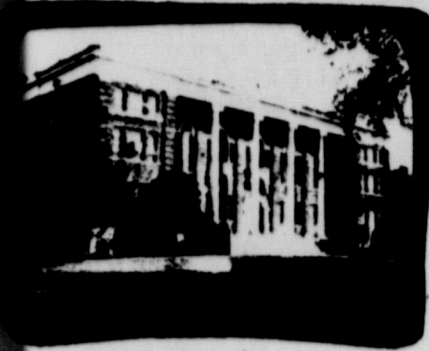

BETA SIGMA PHI MEETS

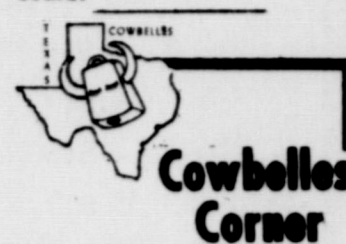

Many packing plants, retail stores, and independent retail shops do their own grading, relying on their many years of experience they have acquired in satisfying their customers. The grades of beef that the consumer generally sees in the store are prime, choice, and good. Other beef grades are usually used in processed meats, sausages, and canned meats. The consumer should expect to pay less for beef graded good than for choice and less for choice than for prime.

Remember, the INSPECTION MARK tells you the beef is wholesome, and the Grademark tells you its quality. Why not have some wholesome, high quality beef for your Valentine's Day dinner? Have a happy Valentine's Day!

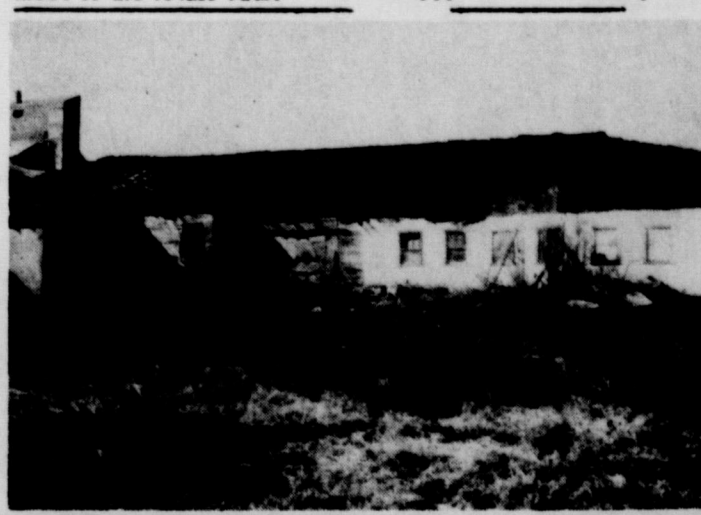


Many people are a little confused about what is meant by most inspection and grading. As some knowledge of these terms is important to the consumer, so that he may get the most value for his money; we hope the following information is useful. Remember, too, that the retailer stakes his reputation on the beef he sells; therefore, it is in his interest to have satisfied customers.

By law, meat inspection is mandatory. All beef sold must be inspected for wholesomeness. This is to guarantee the consumer that all beef inspected and passed is from healthy animals, slaughtered and processed under sanitary conditions and that is suitable for consumption when it leaves the establishment.

The inspectors are experienced veterinarians or supervised lay inspectors. The beef is inspected both before and after slaughter. Beef which is to cross state lines must be federally inspected, which is supervised by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). Beef sold only in the state is state inspected. The inspection mark is placed only once on wholesale cuts, so it is likely to be seen only on large cuts of beef.

Grading of beef is voluntary. The USDA has a meat grading service for which they charge a fee to the firm requesting the service. USDA graders are highly trained specialists who grade carcasses or wholesale cuts. When the grade is determined, the grade shield is rolled on, in a long ribbon-like imprint, all along the length of the carcass and across both shoulders. This is done so that, when the carcass is divided into retail cuts, some of the grademarks will appear on most of the retail cuts.

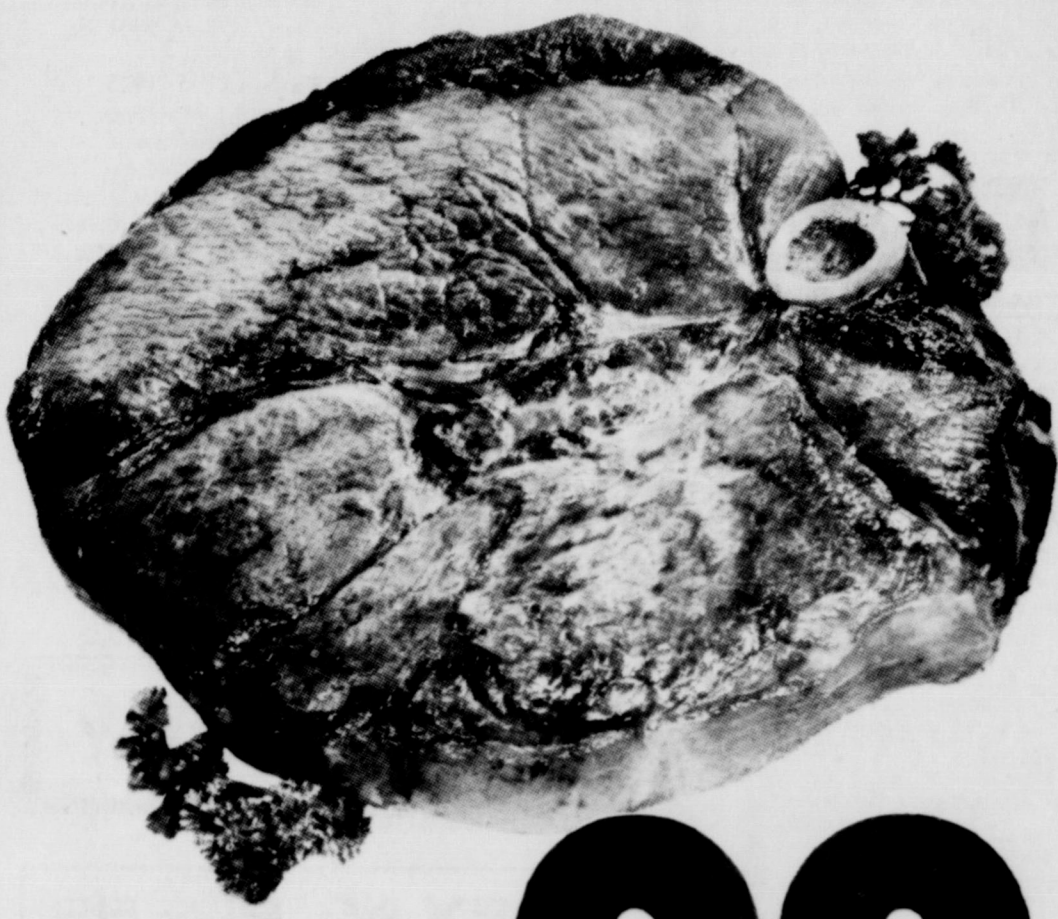



WHEN CHILDREN ARE ILL
 As winter weather gets harsher, the rate of children's illnesses increases. Parents need to be able to spot early signs of illness in young children so they can make pertinent decisions about their care.

A child's general health is reflected in both his appearance and the quality of his behavior. This means that most parents can make a fairly good estimate of a child's health by looking at him and observing his behavior or actions.

Practically all healthy children have rosy skin tones and usually stand erect, acting happy and content.

The ill child appears pale, shower paced, has bent, poor posture, is irritable and subject to more temper tantrums.

Activities are also affected by a child's health. The healthy child is full of energy and prefers play activities which require lots of physical energy. The sick child will usually select quiet, sitting activities, such as television, or will just lounge about.

Most children who are ill like to be alone more than when they are well—or they may prefer just their parent's company. Large groups are often irritating to the sick child.

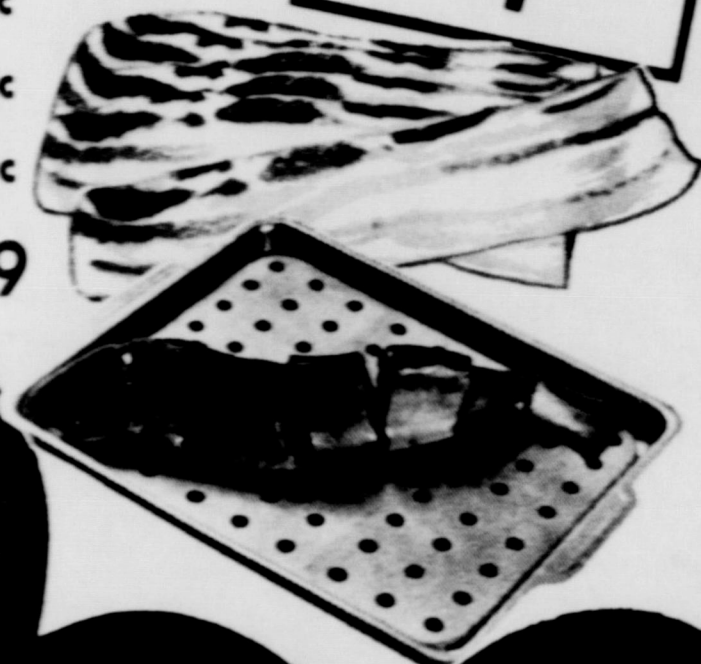
