


# Emma Connell

Mrs. Emma Sara Connell. 80, one of the first trained nurses in Wheeler County died Tuesday, February 4 in Parkview Hospital. The funeral was at 10 a.m. Thursday, February 6, in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler.

Rev. David Campbell, pastor, officiated at the services. Burial was in McLean Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler. Mrs. Connell, born at Shive, in Hamilton County, Texas, had been a Wheeler resident since 1949. She moved to Wheeler County in 1927.

A registered nurse, Mrs. Connell, received her training in Hamilton before moving to Shamrock. During the time she nursed in Shamrock, she worked in all phases of nursing and at one time was the adminstrator for a hospital in Shamrock.

Moving to Wheeler in 1949, Mrs. Connell worked at the Wheeler Hospital until her retirement from nursing in 1961. At this time she began babysitting, a profession she continued until



"Connell", as she was affectionately known to the youngsters she kept and the patients she nursed showed the same love and devotion to both professions. Mrs. Connell was an active

member of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler and the Rebekah Lodge of Shamrock. Her husband Alva, died in 1959.
