Dr. J. Anderson Dies In Houston

Dr. John Q. Anderson, 58, Professor Emeritus of English at the University of Houston, died Wednesday, February 19 at his home in Houston. He was a graduate of Kelton High School and of Oklahoma State University before serving 5 years in World War II. He returned from service, and attended Louisiana State University, and received his M.A. in American Literature. He then taught part time and did graduate work at the Univ. of Texas, then to the Univ. of N. Carolina where he received his Ph.D. He was head of the English Dept. at A. & M. before going to the University of Houston in 1966. He was honored as the outstanding Author of the Texas Writers Roundup in 1967, and was the first Texas Professor to receive "distinguished fellow" by the American Studies Association and chosen by Gov. John Connally in 1955 to be a delegate to the White House conference on Higher Education. He was author and editor of 10 books, and numerous articles.

He was the son of the late A. S. Anderson, who was well known in the Kelton and Wheeler Communities.

Survivors include his wife, Loraine of Houston, 2 sisters, Mrs. C. C. Baird of Wheeler, Mrs. A. C. Shinn of Albuquerque New Mex. three brothers, Albert Anderson of Wheeler, G. B. Anderson of Fritch, Texas and Gene Anderson of Miami, Texas.

Funeral services will be held at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, March 18, at the Wheeler Funeral Home. Burial will be in the Wheeler Cemetery.

St. Patricks Day Celebration Friday, Sat. at Shamrock

"Despite inflation, deflation and the energy crunch, the Shamrock Irish will stage their 29th Annual St. Patrick's Celebration on schedule," General Chairman Robert O'Adams said today.

Billed as an "Irish Pilgrimage," indications are upwards of 25,000 sons of the auld sod—and their relatives from the hamlets, the cities and the forks of the creek—will make it to this year's whingding.

As the great day approaches things are turning green. The Kiwanians have strung their green and white streamers over the top of Main Street and placed the green welcome banners throughout the city.

The weekly Shamrock Texan's special edition of March 13 commemorating the occasion will be printed on green newsprint; even Editor Bill Howe's beard has turned green. It is rumored he takes authentic green Irish chlorophyll tablets to accomplish this feat.

"Most of our events are scheduled Saturday, March 15, although St. Patrick's Day doesn't arrive officially until the following Monday," Adams said.

"We will have our usual pre-St. Patrick's Celebration Banquet on Friday night, March 14. We've found over the years we have a better turnout on weekends than trying to hold the event during the week.

Irish celebrations began in Shamrock, current population 3086, when the late Glen Truxax, bandmaster of Shamrock High School, talked the town into the event in 1938, since the senior play for that year had to be cancelled.

The celebration was cancelled from 1942 through 1946 because of World War II, was revived in 1950, cancelled in 1951 account the Korean Conflict, but has been staged every year since.

The Duke of Paducah, who will be featured at the pre-celebration banquet, along with the popular Booker Bank Notes had this to say when accepting his invitation to appear at the Irish Festival.

"I am not of Irish descent but if I am ever born again, I will be Irish and I will have it happen in Shamrock, Texas. I am going to Shamrock for a couple of days. If you see me on the street and recognize me, stop and talk to me, and if you don't recognize me and somebody introduces me, I'm a very friendly fellow and I like to talk about fishing and you can ask me about my big, fat wife if you want to. Well, in fact, it has been said that I know less about more things than anybody so just talk to me. I'll be happy to talk to you. I'm going to the wagon, these shoes are killin' me."

Truly making a pilgrimage to Shamrock to march in the hour-long street parade will be the famous Kiltie (all girls) Band of Oklahoma City. The Kiltie group appeared in the first four celebration parades, and came again in 1950 and 1952. Their appearance this year will add much to the parade.

Also appearing in the parade will be the Ft. Sill, Oklahoma Half Section, a 75 millimeter cannon drawn by eight horses, with accompanying personnel dressed in the uniforms of the various wars fought by the United States.

The Khiva Shrine group—band, drum and bugle corps, and klowns—also will be making their traditional pilgrimage to march in the big parade.

Some 15 decorated floats, plus many riding clubs, comic entries, and a Kiddie Parade Section, will add color to the passing parade scene.

A celebration highlight at National Guard Armory in the afternoon will be the crowning of Miss Irish Rose of 1975, the winner to receive a \$300 scholarship, first runner-up \$150, second runner-up \$100 and Miss Congeniality \$50.

Following the Irish Rose coronation, the Donegal Beard Contest will take front stage

center under the direction of Chief Puzzer Junior Vinyard. One of the judges will be Miss Irish Rose herself. The winners will receive cash awards.

Meanwhile, back at Clark Auditorium, the Old Fiddlers will be putting it on for some \$400 in prize money. This popular annual event is directed by Mr. and Mrs. Bill King.

At eight o'clock at High School Auditorium, Shamrock's Ministerial Alliance will please the crowds with presentation of a program by the Bob Willis Inspirationalists.

The day's events will come to a close with the annual St. Patrick's Dance at National Guard Armory. The dance will start at 9 o'clock and end at 1 a. m. Music will be furnished by R. T. "Windy" Wood and New Sons of the West.

Capping the evening for the teen age set will be a dance beginning at 8 o'clock and ending at midnight at Junior High Gymnasium. Billy and the Kids, a band from Amarillo, will furnish the music.

BLOWING SEASON IS NEAR: The two pictures above are reminders that the season for wind erosion is upon us. Picture above shows us the severe damage that can occur to good soil if not protected. Picture on the right shows us on of the conservation measures that can be used to prevent soil erosion from the wind. Leaving stubble on or near the surface of the soil through the severe blowing season can be a very effective method of controlling wind erosion. We need to be particularly mindful of this problem due to the fact that a good deal of grassland has been plowed out and put to cultivation recently. Much of this land is of a sandy nature and very susceptible to wind erosion.

Other effective ways of protecting our land is to interseed rye into our cotton land. Also, it is a good practice to mulch on bare land with cotton burrs.

We have had severe wind erosion in Wheeler County in the last two years, and now is the time to make preparations for preventing it this winter and spring.

TO SAVE ON GROC.

On a few cents, saved several items at the grocery store, can cut the grocery bill from 10-15 percent.

Conscious consumers begin with one thing to see how money is saved.

Consider breads and cereals as a started. Several items are helpful to the shopper.

Less expensive rolls. Day-old bread, available is even cheaper. Meals to cook usually less than the ready-to-eat.

Unsweetened cereals cost less than sweetened. Whole grain, enriched or bran cereal products are less expensive, wholesome, than fancy cereals and special breads. Compare the cost and nutritional value, then decide if it is for your family. Buy intelligently. The shopper must understand the numerous terms used in grocery items. Many foodstuffs now come in several different forms - with quite a difference in costs. For example is oatmeal - regular, "Minute" or "Instant." It takes five minutes to cook regular oatmeal, 10 to 15 minutes for "Minute" and only the time to heat water to cook "Instant" oatmeal. Regular and "Minute" are in the familiar box cost the same. Savings in cooking time is approximately four minutes.

Instant oatmeal, however, packaged individually in eight servings to a can and costs several times more than the medium sized round box which contains 20 servings. Consumers "buy time" purchasing convenience foods. If the difference is great between the amount of time it takes to prepare the regular item and the convenience item, it may be making a wise choice. The two items are together in preparation, we need to take

tain situations. Some - such as instant coffee - costs less per serving than the regular variety.

Often, however, we pay far more for convenience than our time is worth.

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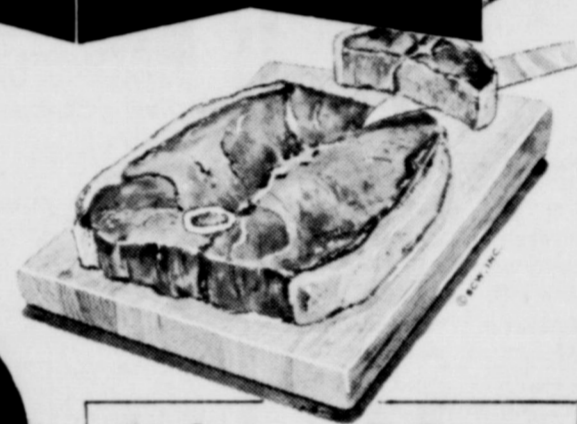

- Elimination of conformation from the quality grade standards.
- Determination of quality grades on the basis of marbling only (for cattle in the "A" maturity group, 9 to 30 months of age), in-

stead of the current combination of marbling maturity and conformation. Mandatory yield grading of all carcasses that are quality graded. Narrowing of the Good grade by increasing marbling requirements. Gordon Van Vleck, ANGA President is quoted as saying, "The final changes are in line with those proposed last September and are in line with recommendations made earlier by ANCA. We endorse the new standards. The new standards will help the industry maintain production of quality beef in the face of more generally

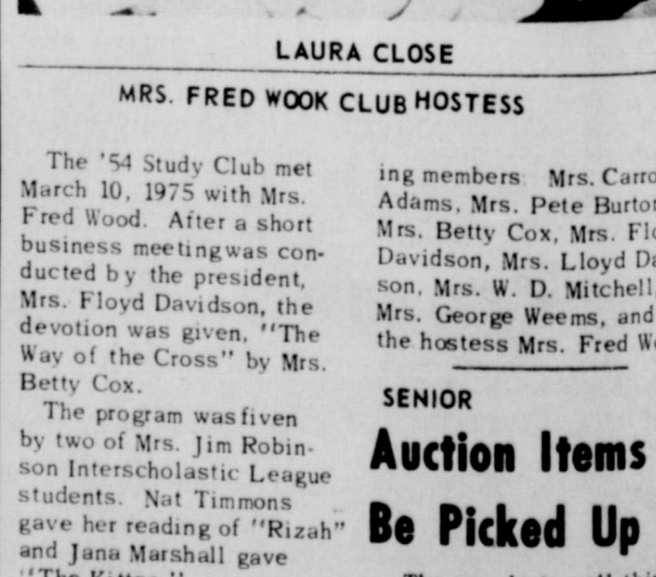
