Having a two touchdown margin at the half vanish on two quick aerials, the Wheeler Mustangs fought back to defeat the Lefors Pirates 19-12 last Friday night at Nicholson Field in the season opener for both clubs.

Taking away the two long passes for TD's, the Mustangs completely dominated the contest both on the field and statistic wise over their heavier opponents.

The scrappy Mustangs set the tempo for the contest at the outset as they forced the Pirates into a punting situation following the opening kickoff and then proceeded to methodically grind out 94 yards to paydirt in

18 plays, staying on the ground for the entire distance and overcoming a five yard penalty in route.

Gary Fischer got his first of three touchdowns for the night as he sneaked it over from the one on third down. The kick was wide and the Mustangs had drawn first blood in the '72 campaign.

The opening drive got off on the right foot as Kent Ware broke on a trap at right guard for 18 yards and this was followed a couple of plays later by a 23 yard jaunt by Lewis Britt on a pitchout to put the Mustangs at the Pirate 48.

The Pirates hopes of being able to use their heft to run right at the Mustangs never materialized as the Mustangs throttled the Pirate ground game. Lefors was unable to get their ground game going at all during the contest and ended up with a scant 42 yards gained via the infantry route.

A short kickoff and run-back to the Pirate 45 after the Mustangs initial score gave the visitors good field position and they were able to move the pigskin to the Mustang 19 for a first down.

An 18 yard strike from Randy Klein to Steve Timmons ate up nearly half of the yardage as the Pirates made two of their three first downs of the opening half on the drive.

Jimmy Crutcher got to the 15 on first down and then Dale Helton nailed Robert Gifford for no gain before Crutcher came back with 4 more to the 11.

With fourth and 3 facing them, the Pirates called on Crutcher but he was able to get just one step as Ware and Britt popped him at the line of scrimmage and put an abrupt halt to the one threat the Pirates made in the first two quarters.

The Mustangs got a quick first down as Britt and Ware got 6 each out to the 22 for some running room and Fischer tacked on 9 more to put the Mustangs on their own 31.

Wheeler continued to get yardage in big chunks as the Mustang forward wall opened the way for Britt to get 24 in a couple of tries and Fischer dashed 13 more to eat up most of the yardage down to the Pirate 23.

A personal foul fine against the Pirates moved the ball to the 13 and Ware got a first down at the 9 but the drive was halted on the next play as the Pirates jarred the ball loose from Fischer and recovered at the seven.

Lefors couldn't go and was forced to punt with Timmons booming it out 50 yards to the Mustang 40.

Fischer gathered the punt in at the 40 and with a clearing block from Larry Rives got to the wall that the Mustangs had set up on the right side.

Pirates toppled like dominoes as Fischer headed north behind the wave of white shirts that saw Wayne Wheeler, Danny Hardcastle, and Dale Helton clear the way and went over 60 yards later untouched for the Mustangs second TD.

The run for the extra points failed and the Mustangs had the Pirates down by 12 with 3:20 to play in the second quarter.

Klein tried to get the Pirates back in the game before the halftime break but the Mustangs would have none of it as first Hardcastle and then Calvin Sechrist nailed him for losses and the Pirates were on their 40 as the second stanza ended.

the second half kickoff and booted the ball to the Pirates who took over on the Lefors 40.

A motion penalty cost the Pirates five and then lightning struck the Mustangs as Klein lofted a screen pass to Gifford on the left side and the fooled Mustangs quickly gave pursuit. A couple of Mustangs had a shot as Gifford at the Wheeler 35 but either missed or bounced off the ball carrier and Gifford then outran his pursuers to complete the 65 yard scoring thrust. The extra point kick was no good and the Mustangs lead had dwindled to six.

Fischer returned the kickoff 20 yards to the Wheeler 40 and the Mustangs ground out yardage down to the Pirate 18 but a run by Britt came up a yard shy and the Pirates took over at the 18.

Maybe it was an omen but the Pirates were tacked another 5 yard penalty on first down and then here came the bomb again.

This time Klein passed to Timmons over the middle and as Fischer missed the interception, Timmons set sail and there was no catching him and the Pirates had tied the ball game with the 87 yard pass and run after being completely shut down in the first two quarters.

The kick was good for the extra point but the Pirates were guilty of illegal procedure to nullify it. Two kicks and one penalty against the Mustangs later, the Mustangs and Pirates were all knotted up at 12 with 4:45 remaining in the third quarter.

Even though the Pirates got their hands on the ball four more times in the game, they were unable to make another first down against the now aroused Mustangs.

Getting good field position at the Pirate 45 shortly after tying the game, Lefors had their chance but it was quickly snuffed out as Sechrist came roaring through and sacked Klein for a big 25 yard loss as he was attempting to pass and jarred the ball loose. Helton gobbled it up for Wheeler at the Pirate 22.

Ware got 4 and then Britt 6 for a first down at the Lefors 12. Fischer tacked on 4 at right end and then Britt got 5 in a couple of trips to put the ball at the 3 as the third period ended.

Fourth and one faced the Mustangs at the 3 as the final 12 minutes unfolded and Fischer ran a keeper at right tackle and not only got the first down but got the TD and the Mustangs took the lead once more.

Dale Stevens, who was unable to play because of injuries, came on the field and booted the ball through the uprights for another big point to put the Mustangs on top by seven with 11:57 to play in the game.

Neither club could get a sustained drive going in the remaining time and the game settled down into a punting duel as the Mustang defense rose to the task and protected the 7 point margin and gave Wheeler's young crew their first win of the year.

In assessing his club's opening victory, Coach Bateman was quick to give praise to his entire team.

"The whole team did an excellent job and we are real proud of the way they played and came back to win after Lefors tied the game on the long passes," the coach said.

"I've said all along that this bunch of kids really wants to play and they showed it Friday night and I know that they will in every game," Bateman added.

quick to give his two linebackers, senior Rick Hefley and Kent Ware a lot of credit. "Rick has a nose for the football and it showed up Friday night."

"Our entire defensive team gave a real good account of themselves and Calvin Sechrist came up with some big plays at defensive end," Bateman said.

The Mustangs now have two weeks to prepare for their next encounter against the highly touted Canadian Wildcats.

Across the Fence

The effects of the hail storm two weeks ago in Wheeler County is just now being realized. Damage to cotton was estimated to be 1/3 to 1/2 of the crop. Although the most apparent damage was widespread defoliation of cotton leaves, the damage to the cotton balls themselves will be felt economically. In a field at Kelton, three out of five balls were damaged.

Ed Cadra, of Pagan, Don Bradley of Shamrock, Verbon Smith of Wheeler and I attended a three county short-course for stocker cattle managers in the Southeast Panhandle last week at Wellington. The meeting was well attended. An idea presented concerning grass tetany on cow herds was suggested by Cal Parrott, Area Beef Cattle Specialist. Since magnesium oxide is not very palatable and hard to get cows

to eat, Cal suggested mixing 1 part salt, 1 part magnesium oxide and 1 part dehydrated molasses fed free choice.
The 4-H Club members are getting calves started on feed for the County Livestock show. Members feeding calves at Kelton include: Jerry Palmer, Tracy Killingsworth, Brenda Bryant, Janice Lister and John Harris.

I accompanied Wallace Fields, Shamrock Polled Hereford breeder, on a tour to Steve and Zana Corse's 4-H club project last week. Their calves are doing really well. In addition to feeding a steer calf from Wallace's herd, they have another Hereford calf on feed from the Brooks Hereford Ranch and a black baldface steer from the Nig Mills Ranch.

Keith Lahr, Research Associate at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Chillicothe tells us that rye will grow in the winter when other small grass grains will not. He says he has been quite impressed with Tetra Perkus winter rye for pasture. He says this strain of rye is late and stays green much longer in the spring than other ryes. In addition, the leaves are broad and long and fall growth is also good. Seed are larger, we noticed, than other ryes so seeding rates should be increased accordingly. As a matter of fact, he suggests that seeding rates where the rye is planted for grazing alone, should be increased at least fifty percent above normal rates for all crops. Tetra Perkus (winter rye) also makes excellent April and May forage when seeded in late January and February as it's not bad about heading at this time.

Lahr says mixtures of rye, barley and oats will make a real good pasture. He suggested Caprock Wheat - Era Barley - Checoa Oats (Oklahoma) - Winter Rye (Tetra petkus) - Fas Gra 131 Triticales. The winter rye (Tetra petkus) incidentally is available at Shamrock, right here in our county.

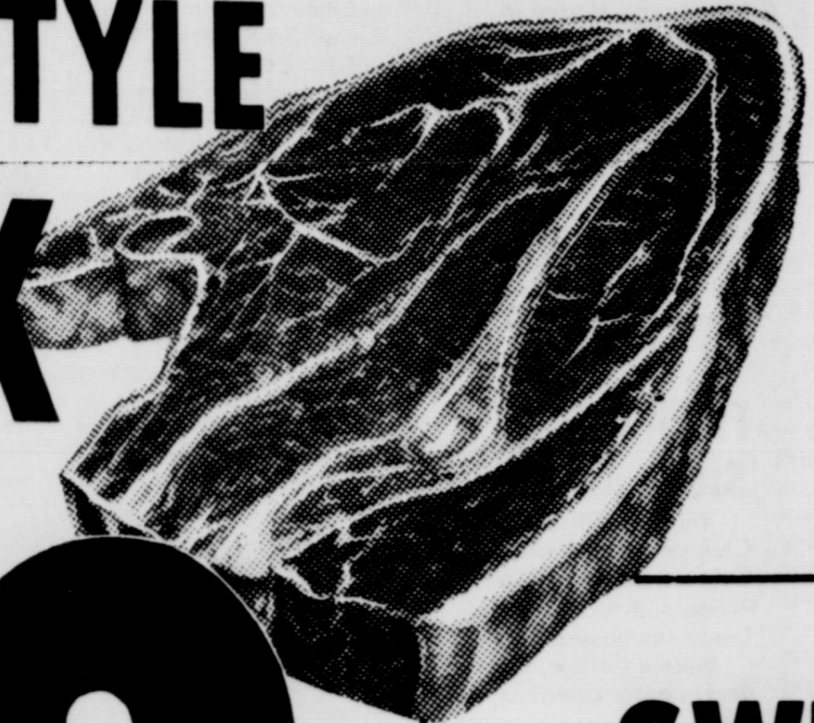

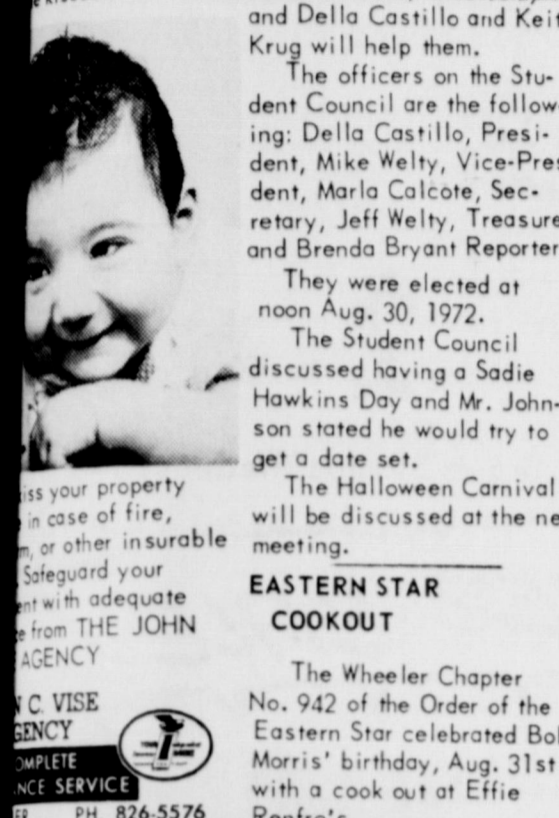
