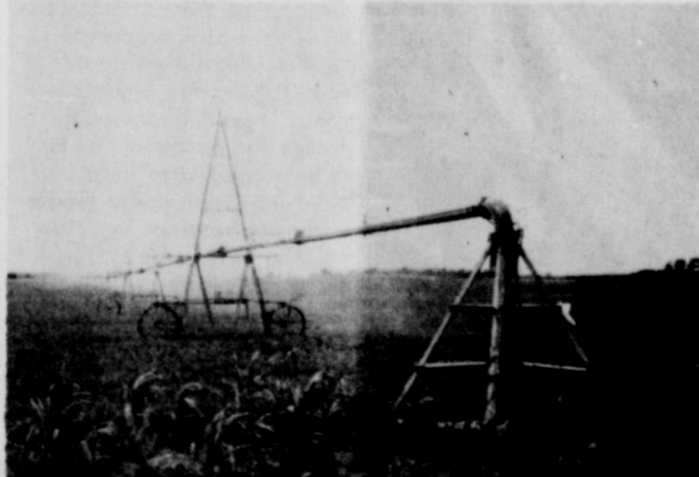

WHEELER BOND ELECTION

An election has been called for residents of the Wheeler Independent School District to decide the fate of a proposed \$150,000 Campus Development project.

The project calls for site preparation which would divide the school campus into four levels. The school property drops 100 feet from the Southwest corner to the Northeast corner. The plan proposes to divide the property into four level plains and put a drain running full length of the campus and carrying the runoff from each level.

The first level will be used for parking and tennis courts

at the west end of the school building. The tennis courts would double as basketball courts for use as all times. The parking would be for use by patrons and students.

Level two would be the playground. The board has set aside \$10,000 for the development of the playground

ground. The playground would be located north of the school building.

The ball practice field and ball diamond would be located on level three. The ball practice field would enable the band to practice without having to use the football field. The ball diamond development of the play-

Highway Beautification

The Texas Highway Department today announced plans for administration of the State Highway Beautification Act which was passed by the last special session of the Legislature. The Act becomes effective Thursday (June 29).

The Beautification Act, also known as the Billboard Law, charges the Highway Department with responsibility for regulating outdoor advertising signs along the Interstate and Federal-aid primary highway systems in Texas. There are approximately 18 thousand miles of highways in the two systems in Texas.

The law provides that any person who erects or maintains a sign within 660 feet of the highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising and a permit for each sign covered by the Act. Signs advertising the sale

of or lease of property upon which they are located or related solely to activities conducted on the property and certain utility marker signs are exempt.

The Highway Department will issue all licenses. Application blanks will be available at the district offices or at the Right of Way Division in Austin. Sign permits will be issued by either the Highway district offices or by those cities which elect to issue their own sign permits. Persons interested should contact the Highway Department district serving the county where their sign is located.

At the present time cities are being contacted by the Highway Department to ascertain whether the cities desire to establish their own permit systems. Once this is decided, the Highway Department dis-

tricts or the cities will start to process sign permit applications for those persons who have obtained licenses.

Plans will be announced later for implementation of sections of the legislation dealing with illegal, abandoned and nonconforming signs and junkyards and auto graveyards.

Northwest Texas Demonstration Program Anniversary

The Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program is observing its 15th Anniversary this year. The program is a three-county program designed to provide farmers and ranchers with on-site demonstration experiment information based on results of tests right in the area where the increased management practices are needed.

The program, the only one of its kind in the state, is supervised by Don Reeves of Collingsworth County, W. B. Hooser of Hall County, and Max Hatter of Wheeler County. These men are all county agricultural agents who believe the program to be very successful. Duane L. Scott, farm demonstration assistant to all three counties, has been with the program since its birth in 1957. In the fall of 1956, farmers and ranchers in Collingsworth, Hall and Wheeler counties, through legislative representa-

tives, requested that Texas A & M University conduct a program of research and demonstration to resolve some problems peculiar to their general area. Representatives of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service met with agricultural leaders, members of the commissioner's courts and other citizens of the counties, including Senator A.J. Rogers, and Representatives Will Ehrle and Grainger W. McIlhany to discuss the problems and formulate a tentative program.

A joint agreement was reached between the Texas Extension Service and Texas Experiment Station to operate the northwest project for three years. In 1959 it was extended and is now part of the overall program in the three counties involved.

The two services share equally in the total cost of the project, contingent on funds available.

Research personnel at the Chillicothe Experiment Station, and certain extension specialist, provide detailed planning and technical assistance. Extension agents do the research work and the Experiment station provides the necessary equipment.

Dr. James Mulkey, Jr., superintendent at the Chillicothe Station is fund administrator.

Reeves, county agent for Collingsworth County, says, "The Northwest Texas program is unique in that full experiment station back-up is provided covering a wide area of a belt which offers a lot of sandy loam soil. Most of the success for the program can be attributed to Duane Scott's dedication and to the efforts of the cooperating farmers."

Not simply a research project, the Northwest Texas program fits the problems of the people living in this area. A good example of what it can do is the lovegrass project which has been in progress for several years.

The introduction of weeping lovegrass, a native of Africa, in the 1930 dust bowl days was a wise decision although not realized at its full potential until the Northwest Texas program took over. Refined management practices are needed to make maximum use of the grass.

The lovegrass makes maximum use of available moisture and is now known to stay green at the base of the clumps as long as the winter remains mild. It is quick to green up at the beginning of warm weather after a severe winter.

Improved management procedures have proved that it is not only palatable to cattle, but is good pasture and gives weight gains that seem impossible when no supplemental feeding is planned. Under irrigation it will probably be more than sufficient.

When the lovegrass was first introduced to this area it was seeded in 40 inch rows and successfully stopped much wind and water erosion as had been intended. But, when planted in such a manner, it tends to stool badly and creates clumps rather than solid pasture.

The testing proves that properly managed lovegrass can probably convert non-producing land into grazing land, creating jobs, boosting the economy and adding fuel for the Panhandle area's vast feedlot industry.

The grass responds to irrigation. In Collingsworth County, on the Hartman farm, a six-acre plot supported 16 heifers which went on at about 350 lb. and eight grown cows. It produced enough forage for the cows and had to be mowed after light pre-plant irrigation and a single water application.

The heifers had an average daily gain, without supplemental feeding, of 1.47 lb. per day. This was grass seeded at what has been considered "the wrong time of year". In addition 340 bales of hay were cut from the plot in mid-September.

Up to 50,000 acres of land has been seeded to lovegrass in Wheeler County as a part of the program. County Agent, Max Hatter,

says, "We have good hard facts on which to operate and to prove that it is a good pasture grass."

On the Verbon Smith farm, in Wheeler County, a 10 acre plot, held 19 head of heifer cows which gained an average of two pounds a day from April until September 1971. The data collected was on the two driest years in history. Net returns of close to \$75 per acre was realized on the stocker calf grazing studies which were properly fertilized and properly managed.

In a 1970 winter grazing study, cows gained 88 pounds from November to March 15 grazing dormant weeping lovegrass. No hay and very little supplemental feed was fed.

Data on the research done in the Northwest Texas program is printed in a handbook and mailed to county farmers and ranchers each year.

Over 350 people attended the Annual Northwest Texas Research Demonstration program meeting at Kelton this past September. Chamber of Commerce in Wheeler and Shamrock and the County Farm Bureau co-sponsored the barbecue and enthusiastically support the research program that is in progress in this area.

"All in all, the program is people working together to get at the problems and opportunities agriculture in our area has", says John Daberry County Program Building Chairman, who helps plan some of the research projects. Income from Livestock doubled from 1964 to 1969. At the same time row crop income has remained the same.

"Consequently, a majority of the research in progress is oriented toward cattle grazing", says Max Hatter. Hatter, a native of Central Texas where his brother and dad make their living from cattle, took over the reins of the research program 5 years ago.

"I like to have the facts and figures we have done right here in our county or an adjoining county that we can make available to the agricultural producer", says Hatter. "This is especially important when a new grass, an old grass, an approved farm practice or a system of new crops is involved that the producer is considering", he says.

"If a man wants unbiased, unprejudiced and accurate information that will be adaptable to our county, I believe we can supply it," he adds. And with a grin, "The people here will 'make it work'".

Wheeler County cooperators for 1971 were N.L. Sechrist, Verbon Smith, Louis Grayson, R.J. Smith and N.J. Burkhalter. Hall County cooperators were Ralford Hutcherson, Merriam Posey, James Moss and Harold Hodges. Collingsworth county cooperators are Duane Scott, J.W. Thomas, David Baumgardner, John Brim, Dick Sweat, Murl Lacy and Cliff Hartman.

In addition to the work on lovegrass, other work done during 1971 include: cotton variety demonstrations for irrigated and dryland conditions, grain sorghum hybrids, small grain dryland demonstration, cotton fertilizer demonstration, observation nursery projects for possible introduction of other grasses, winter grazing aftermath demonstration and studies on chemical weed control in cotton and sorghum, on alfalfa varieties, cotton

insect control, and a peach orchard demonstration.

One of the projects in progress in Wheeler County is the observation nursery for possible introduction of other grasses to our area. Hatter says, "Kentucky Fescue, Wintergreen Hard Grass and Jose Wheat are looking very promising as winter perennials for area. We may find that will offer a whole new area to the farmer." The advantage of growing the winter perennials would be the saving in seeding and ground preparation involved in growing wheat and rye for winter grazing.

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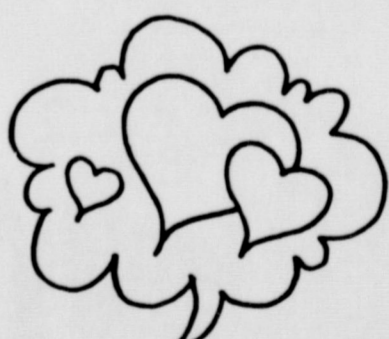

I have received several questions lately concerning home care products that can be made from basic ingredients. Earlier in the month a formula for a general cleaner was given (2 tsp. ammonia, 2 tsp. liquid detergent, 1 qt. water). CLEANING WINDOWS AND MIRRORS: try one of these:
a. add 4 tsp. household ammonia to 1 qt. warm water,
b. add 2 tsp. vinegar to 1 qt. warm water,
c. use 1 tsp. kerosene to 1 qt. warm water
d. use 1 tsp. washing soda to 1 qt. warm water.

First remove surface soil with tissue or a soft cloth. Then apply, cleaning liquid with a soft cloth or sponge. Rub dry and polish with newspaper or cloth. Avoid spilling ammonia on painted or varnished woodwork. Clean varnished surfaces and polish with the following: 3 tsp. linseed oil, 1 qt. hot water, 1 tsp. turpentine. Wring a cloth out of this mixture. Wash the surface and wipe dry. Polish dry with a clean cloth. Protect neighboring surfaces from the solution. Caution: Do not heat this mixture; turpentine is flammable! Try these silver polishes:
a. 1 cup boiling water, 1 piece of sheet of aluminum (aluminum foil may be used) 1 tsp. baking soda, 1 tsp. salt. Add salt, soda and aluminum to boiling water. Add silver and boil for 2 minutes. Wash in hot soapy water, rinse and dry. (Make enough of the solution so that water completely covers the silver.)
b. Add ammonia, alcohol, or castor to whitening to make a paste. Apply with cloth to silver in hot soapy water, rinse and dry.
c. 1 cup boiling water, 1 1/2 cup whitening, 1/4 cup soap flakes. Heat soap flakes in water until dissolved. Remove from heat and add whitening. Stir until a smooth paste. Use as any other silver polish. A new drycleaning substance has proved successful: fluorocarbon. It is expected to improve drycleaning performance. Fluorocarbons have cleaned 500 difficult-to-clean bonded knits and layers of noodles, cottage cheese, Mozzarella cheese slices and spaghetti sauce and bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes. Serves 4.

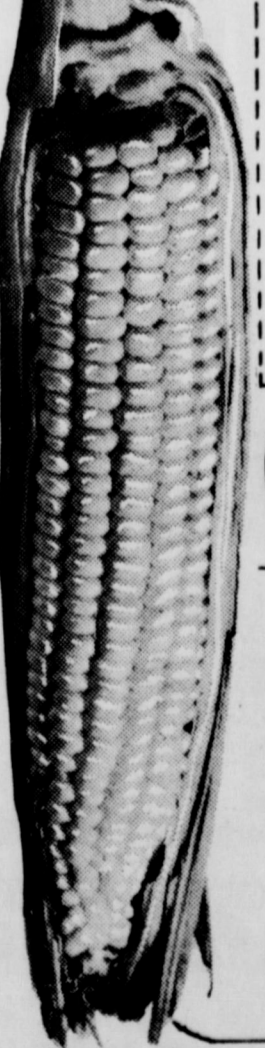

Hot dry cotton growing weather! Cotton and milo crops are looking good. Some hail damaged cotton is making a comeback.

A number of homeowners have been troubled with whiteflies on Eucalyptus shrubs. A 50% malathion spray at the rate of 2 tsp. per gallon of water will control this pest. Indication of damage is the characteristic white flies and yellowing of the leaves. Uncontrolled, the plant may eventually die. We suggest that homeowners check ornamental shrubs closely.

Another pest that's building up is the garden aphid on bedding plants and flowers in the flower beds. If just a few are present, wash them off the leaves with the water pressure from the garden hose. If there's a big buildup, control with malathion spray.

Hot dry cotton growing weather! Cotton and milo crops are looking good. Some hail damaged cotton is making a comeback.

A number of homeowners have been troubled with whiteflies on Eucalyptus shrubs. A 50% malathion spray at the rate of 2 tsp. per gallon of water will control this pest. Indication of damage is the characteristic white flies and yellowing of the leaves. Uncontrolled, the plant may eventually die. We suggest that homeowners check ornamental shrubs closely.

of a pound per day at a cost of about 7 1/2 cents worth of protein for each pound gained. Supplementing the lovegrass with wheat or rye could up the gains to over a pound and a half. A stocking rate of about a head to the acre on a dormant standing lovegrass that is rested from the middle of August to the frost date in November is a good rule of thumb.

Be on the lookout for screwworms! Lonbet Moore from east of Wheeler submitted a suspected case to the Mission Laboratory last week. We have plenty of mailing cartons and it just takes a few minutes to take a suspected sample and mail it. We need to keep our guard up and report all suspected cases to the Mission Lab. They were predicting we would have some cases before the summer was out. Ranchers should postpone all dehorning and castrating work they possibly can until after frost to cut the risk of screwworm cases.

Although most dog owners are aware of the necessity for having their animals protected against distemper, hepatitis and rabies by proper vaccination, many are unaware of another common disease of dogs and other animals — leptospirosis.

"Lepto" as it is frequently called, is caused by spirochete bacteria which tends to localize in the kidneys. Canine "lepto" is spread to other animals and man by way of the urine from infected dogs. "Lepto" is generally more common in male dogs. Rats may carry the organism which can also infect dogs.

The disease in dogs may range from mild or inapparent to severe, with fatal outcome

after a sickness of several days. The disease is apparently responsible for the majority of cases of chronic kidney disease in dogs and commonly causes death.

Although medical authorities receive reports of only small numbers of confirmed human infections, more cases likely occur. The close contact between dogs and humans, especially children, increases the risk of exposure. Symptoms in humans may mimic influenza or other conditions and therefore go unrecognized.

Dog owners should take their animals to a veterinarian for examination when they become ill and to routinely have the dogs vaccinated against leptospirosis.

Booster inoculations are recommended on an annual basis or more often if exposure is high. Antibiotic treatment can eliminate the infection from dogs recovering from the disease.
