HAIL DESTROYS AREA COTTON

There wasn't a dry eye late Saturday afternoon for cotton farmers north, south and east of Wheeler as they surveyed the devastating hail damage that occurred about 5:30 p.m. "It only took about 17 minutes for the hail to beat the cotton to pieces", exclaimed Mrs. Fred Waters at Wheeler. The cotton stalks looked like small match-sticks after the hail. All of Truman Bradstreet's eleven acre garden, north and west of Wheeler was beat to pieces by the hail. His cotton crop was all destroyed. Heavy rains washed across roads in that area causing big potholes that had to be repaired before cars could use the roads again.

Dale Meadows was on his way Tuesday morning to plow up Grant Meek's 200 acres of cotton. Dale said Grant, who lives near Gageby, figured he lost

\$12,000 on the cotton crop.

M. C. Burgess lost 28 acres of cotton. "I figure I'll drill in milo now", he said. Bob Martin lost about 30 acres of cotton north of Wheeler.

The hail appeared to cover about a two mile strip in Wheeler County, stretching from the Zybach community south to Memphis according to Vernie Hardcastle at the Wheeler Produce in Wheeler. "We lost 250 acres of cotton out of 300", Mr. Hardcastle said. "We'll put out cotton land to milo by going under our trellan which is put on for weed control but will also kill milo," he added.

Dub Goad, who farms north of Wheeler, lost cotton on the east and west sides of the road going toward Briscoe. The cotton looked like match-sticks and the milo looked like it had been thrashed.

Dean Tipps, north and east of Allison, had his irrigation system damaged and the milo, which was knee high, looked like it had been combined. The damage to milo at this stage will be a touch-and-go situation and it will probably be several days before the extent of the damage is fully determined.

Bob Zybach, whose place joins Dean's, had the roof of his hay barn torn off. His cotton crop was wiped out. Bob's dad, Elbert Zybach, had his young milo crop stripped of leaves. Bob Marcum and Coley Parker had water damage in their homes where part of the 3.6 inches of rain blew in their houses. W. D. Mitchell up that way also lost his cotton crop. After the hail and rain, sand started blowing the next day in some fields and finished up what the hail didn't get.

Some of the folks losing cotton at Twitty included Haskell Salmons and Jack Jolly. Bill Hampton at Wheeler lost 200 acres of cotton. "I'll probably plant back to milo", he commented.

Cotton and milo crops got off to the best start here that they've had in several years. This was a crop that we needed badly. The last two years had been drought years and the crops yield were below average both years. We needed to make this one. Some believed they had time to make a milo crop on the hail damaged cotton acres. Others thought they would be able to plant acreages to hay crops like hybrid sudans and make some hay.

When the skies cleared, however, most realized that the hail storm had been very expensive, with damages running at least in the neighborhood of a quarter of a million dollars. What can be salvaged from the crops that are planted will in reality determine the long range damage.

Shamrock and Kelton, for the most part, escaped the damaging hail and were optimistic about their crop prospects. Kelton didn't get as much rain as folks in the Shamrock area and were in the fields Monday cultivating young milo.

On the brighter side, thousands of acres of newly seeded lovegrass that were seeded earlier were benefiting from the rains. The grass revolution in Wheeler County is still moving on.

The old west will come to life in Wheeler at the 17th Annual Rodeo as it gets underway Thursday, July 13 and continues through July 15. Each night's performance of the Rodeo begins at 8:30 p.m.

The parade is slated for 4:00 P.M. followed by the annual free barbecue.

The rodeo will be staged at the all steel arena which was completed by the Wheeler Riding Club last year. The arena has seating on either side which offers an enjoyable view of ac-

in anticipation of the free barbecue which will be served at 6:00 P.M.

A crowd of 1500 is expected to be on hand to hold out their plates as they go through the "chow" line. The menu for the evening will be barbecue beef, sauce, brown beans, onions, pickles, peaches, bread and iced tea or coffee.

1500 pounds of beef was prepared last year for the barbecue. The meal

is free to each person buying a ticket to the first performance of the rodeo.

Six rodeo events are slated for the three nights of rodeoing. The first event of the evening will be Bareback bronc riding. Other events are Calf Roping, Girls Barrel Race, Bull Dogging, Bull Riding, Heading and Heeling and Brama Bull Bold Rush.

A shop made saddle will be given away to some lucky person Saturday evening. The saddle will be on display at the rodeo. Anyone wishing to make a donation to the Wheeler Riding Club will be eligible to win the saddle; contact a Riding Club member for more information.

The rodeo books will open July 12 at 8:00 a.m. and will close 8:00 p.m. the same day.

Producing the rodeo again this year will be Charlie Plummer, Jr. of Elk City, Okla. Rose Plummer will serve as secretary. The collecting of contributions for the rodeo began Monday. Heading the committee for the fund drive is Delbert Thomas. The barbecue is served each year by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

Riding Club officers are: Gerald Johnson, president; Darrell Moore, vice-president; and Lyndon Lloyd, secretary. Serving on the board of directors are Charles Moore, Larry Finsterwald, Charlie Brown, Fat Jones and Delbert Thomas.

Top o' Texas Rodeo Dates Set

The 26th Annual Top O' Texas Rodeo is scheduled in Pampa August 2-5 in an all new grandstand and pens built recently following a tornado of two years ago. Pampa has not had a rodeo for the past two years due to the tornado in 1970 and the VEE quarantine of last year which made necessary the cancellation for two years in a row.

Directors of the Assoc. report all plans finalized and an all-time record number of entries are expected for the rodeo which has been in operation here since 1945.

A street parade is scheduled for Wednesday afternoon, August 2 at 4:00 p.m. to get the rodeo underway, with nightly performances at 8:00 p.m.

Tommy and Beverly Steiner of Austin will produce this year's rodeo, featuring some of the top specialty acts on the rodeo circuit, including the Kaju Kid, popular rodeo clown. Helen Taylor and her all-girl show band direct from Las Vegas will be featured at all rodeo performances and will play for dancing in the National Guard Armory Wednesday through Saturday nights.

All of the regular RCA events will be included, with cowboys and cowgirls competing for an estimated purse of \$10,000. An amateur bareback riding contest, with a purse of \$200 plus entry fees, is scheduled in order that all amateurs in this area may participate.

Tom Hadley of Kerrville, Texas will be the announcer. Hadley has gained a national reputation as a rodeo announcer and has worked with Steiner for many years. He has had extensive experience in the national finals and national televised rodeos.

Holly Gray, president of the Top o' Texas Rodeo Association, said that ample free parking will be available. Ticket reservations may be secured by writing the Top o' Texas Rodeo Office, P.O. Box 1942, Pampa, Texas 79065.

The Kid Pony Show, which is a miniature rodeo for ages 5 through 15 will be held Tuesday, August 1 with both afternoon and evening performances. Practice nights will be July 26 and 28.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Poisoning Child's Mind

"Your father is a mean, nasty man. Stay away from him or he will whip you with a great big strap."

Laura, recently divorced, kept drumming this warning into her five-year-old son. She had been given custody of the child at the time of the divorce, and she meant to tighten her grip on him by any and all means.

Actually, her ex-husband was devoted to the boy. When he found out about Laura's tactics, he haled her into court. The judge took the matter so seriously that he changed the custody order, transferring the boy from his mother to his father.

As a general rule, the law condemns efforts by one divorced parent to poison the mind of the child against the other. It condemns "implanting in his tender mind the seeds of hate and the cankerous beginnings of malice toward those whom he should cherish."

Likewise, the law frowns on the use of the child as a pawn in financial bargaining. For example:

A divorcee constantly belittled her ex-husband to their small daughter. But she also let him know that she would stop as soon as he agreed to a large cash settlement.

Again, a court denounced her tactics and switched custody from mother to father. The court said she had no right to use the child as a kind of blackmail weapon for her own benefit.

Of course, in these highly emotional situations, it may be difficult for a court to separate fact from fiction. As a result, judges sometimes fall back on solutions that are admittedly less than perfect.

In another case, at the time of the divorce, custody of a child had been divided between husband and wife. Later, in a court hearing, each accused the other of "poisoning the child's mind against me."

After due deliberation, the court decided to leave custody just as it was—divided. Even though this meant exposing the child to parental crossfire, the court said at least it gave each parent "equal time" to defend his character.

AT'S PARAGRAPHS

Pat Palmer, CHDA here was some way the brakes on and it's soon going to be the things planned to do "this

Recently I have been investigating the compact spin-dry washers that connect to a faucet, and "mini" dryers that need only to be plugged into a regular outlet.

The spin-dry washers have two tubs, one for washing and rinsing, one for spinning water out of clothes (one model allows you to rinse in the spin basket). Clothes come out damp-dry, in some cases dry enough for ironing. These portable spin-dry washers don't require permanent installation. Costers make them easy to move from storage area to

sink, where you simply connect a hose to the faucet. The largest is only 31 1/2" wide, 18 1/2" deep and 33" high. The washers sell for about \$200. Some have attractive tops which hide the tubs when not in use, and allow you to use the washer as a counter top.

When you are using a spin-dry washer, you can regulate water temperature, agitation time, and number of rinses, but you can't set it for a complete cycle. You must be on hand to regulate the wash and deep-rinse fills and transfer clothes from wash tub to spin basket. The washers handle about five pounds per load and use about ten gallons of water per tub full. You must use care in loading since overloading

and underloading can cause problems.

Vinegar is usually used in cooking, as a seasoning for salads and as a preservative for pickling and home canning. But, its mild acidic nature and taste give it a number of other household uses.

BRIGHTNESS - Vinegar removes tarnish from brass and copper. Add salt, then vinegar and rub with a paper towel. Rust stains on washable items respond to vinegar and salt as well as to many commercial rust removers. Before washing, apply a heavy solution to the rust spot, then place the item in the sun to dry. Buildup of hard-water sediment in a tea kettle by boiling water may be removed by boiling a vinegar-and-water

solution in it once a week.
CLEANER - Three tablespoons of white vinegar added to a quart of warm water and a little liquid detergent should do general cleaning of surface.
DEODORIZER - (If you don't mind the strong vinegar smell before it has time to evaporate!) After frying food that leaves an odor in the air, such as fish, pour some vinegar into the hot frypan to get rid of the odor. Vinegar also helps to get rid of perspiration odor.

COMPANY JELLO SALAD
1 package orange jello

1 package raspberry or strawberry jello
Mix jelloes together and add 2 cups boiling water. Stir until jello is dissolved. Let stand at room temperature until cool.
ADD: 1 small can apple sauce
1 small package chopped nuts (optional)
1 package frozen raspberries or strawberries.
Mix into jello thoroughly and chill until firm. Serve topped with whipped cream

CHEESE SQUASH
Cut squash crosswise, flour, salt and pepper to taste. Fry in butter till desired hardness. Place squash in casserole dish and mix in one small can creamed style corn. Cover with grated cheese and bake in slow oven until warm

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT WINS AWARD -- Texas Highway Department received the National Safety Council Award of Honor for an outstanding occupational safety record during 1971. "Less than five out of 1,000 of the nation's total number of work units meet the award of honor requirements," said Howard Pyle, National Safety Council president.

The Texas Highway Department got the award for a 52 per cent decrease in frequency and 42 per cent decrease in severity of accident rates of its employees last year. TEXAS BEEN CATTLE LEADER--Texas is the nation's leader in all major categories of the beef cattle industry, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White states.

The livestock industry in Texas is a \$2 billion industry, accounting for almost half the total agricultural income of the state. There were 12.8 million cattle and calves in Texas in January, more than five million head above second-ranked Iowa.

Rankings by counties for livestock categories include the following: All cattle and calves; Deaf Smith, Parmer, Hansford, Castro, Swisher, Sherman, Randall, Ochiltree, Hale and Hopkins.

Texas ranks second in the nation in number of slaughter plants, third in cattle and calves slaughtered during 1971, third in sheep and lamb slaughter and 15th in hog slaughter. DEMOCRATS AT MIAMI BEACH--One hundred and 30 Texas Democrats--most of them new to the party -- are busy at Miami Beach this week, helping nominate a candidate for president. Another 70 alternates were named to the convention.

Austin, Texas -- The Parks and Wildlife Commission handed one controversial issue back to the Attorney General and was handed another one by the Legislature. PWC voted four-to-two to

ask Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to review and reconsider a May 26 ruling that a 1970 contract to purchase 3,965 acres of Mustang Island property for park development is a "binding obligation." Martin's opinion, according to PWC Chairman Jack Stone of Wells, is expected in about a week.

The Mustang Island battle has raged from Austin to Washington and back and through the federal courts and has figured in battles over Senate confirmation of PWC members.

Legislators, in special session, thwarted long-standing plans of the State Highway Department to build a 10-story, \$20 million headquarters building on a block near the capitol and governor's mansion.

Instead, the Legislature decreed, the Parks and Wildlife Department would purchase with \$1.5 million from its cigarette tax the barren, dusty block in downtown Austin and convert it into a park.

The highway department was directed to consider placing its plush new building elsewhere.

Neither agency, conceded legislative leaders, was deliriously happy with the arrangement.

Under the circumstances, however, neither seemed to make it as a musical journalist and it is with elation that he receives word Duncan Ely the world's greatest pianist, will grant him the first interview Ely has given in many years.

Frosty at first, Ely does a complete turnaround when he notices Myles' hands which he describes as "those of a Rachmaninoff."

She finally commits suicide but the final scene we see Myles and Roxanne in passionate embrace, but now Roxanne seems to have taken on some of the personal characteristics of Paula.
