Parking At Football Games

With the safety of fans in mind, parking inside the stadium at the south end of the stadium has been discontinued. There will be a special parking area with a limited number of parking spaces inside at the north end of the west bleachers. This area will be for the physically handicapped and/or elderly people that could not see the game without this privilege. There will be a parking area outside the stadium directly behind the west bleachers. Parking attendants will be on hand to help you park. Come out and back the Mustangs.

Four weeks of preparation will come to an end Friday night when the Wheeler Mustangs take on the Lefors Pirates in the kickoff of the 1972 gridiron campaign. Nicholson Field will be the site for the 8 P.M. kickoff as the Mustangs and the Pirates continue a long standing rivalry.

Graduation and other losses took away 11 lettermen and the Mustang coaching staff has been faced with a rebuilding job in pre-season workouts.

The youthful Mustangs will lack the size and speed of most of their opponents this season but the coaching staff has been well pleased with the overall effort and desire of the squad.

The pre-season polls have the Mustangs pegged from 4th to last place in the District 2-A chase.

In Lefors, the Mustangs will face a veteran club that has been tabbed to get at least as far as the regional playoffs in Class B this year. The Pirates operate offensively with a straight T attack and use a basic 5-2 alignment on defense.

Randy Klein leads the Pirate offense from his quarterback position and the mammoth forward wall is anchored by 210 lb. Bill Bates, a senior tackle.

An injury in the Chillocothe scrimmage might keep Dale Stevens, senior tailback out of this week's opener and if he is unable to play, Lewis Britt will operate at the tailback slot in a backfield operated by the talented Gary Fischer, senior signal caller.

Larry Rives, wingback, and Kent Ware, fullback, will round out the backfield for the Mustangs.

These backs will operate behind a forward wall of J.C. Brooks and Walter Simmons at ends, Danny Hardcastle and Wyatt Brooks at tackles, Dale Helton and Calvin Sechrist at guards and All District Rick Hefley at center.

"We will have our work cut out for us Friday night but these youngsters really get with it and they want a win real bad to start the season", Coach Jim Bateman said this week. "This is one of the finest bunch of boys I have ever worked with and we hope that the fans will get behind them and support them Friday," the coach added.

Quarterback Club Has First Meeting

Approximately 40 people were in attendance Tuesday night at Nora's Cafe as the Quarterback Club had its initial meeting of the year. Bill Brooks, club president, explained to the ones assembled the projects that the club had for the year and urged all fans of the Mustangs to show their support through their attendance at the games and their attendance at the Monday night meetings of the Quarterback Club.

Kent Sims and Donald Reeves had their names drawn to be "members" of the team for the Lefors game. These men will be present with the team from the time they get to the fieldhouse Friday afternoon until after the game.

"We think that this will give people a better insight as to what really goes on prior and during a game," Coach Bateman explained.

Names are drawn each meeting and a person cannot be with the team more than once during the season. Men present at the club meetings will be eligible for this.

The addition to the scoreboard that the club has purchased was shipped on August 28th but has not arrived as yet and will probably not be in operation until the Shamrock game.

The Quarterback Club will once again help with the parking of cars prior to the home games and will furnish three men to run the chain and down marker during the game.

Fans will be able to park just west of Nicholson Field this season as the area behind the school plant has been closed to traffic.

A few reserved seats remained unsold as of Tuesday night and Thurman Rives, ticket chairman, requested that people should contact him immediately if they desire a reserved seat for the five home games.

Corky Guthrie reported that a record number of ads were given for the football programs and thanked all who were willing to back the Mustangs in this manner.

Coach Bateman introduced two of his coaches, Bill Wiggins and Byron Bass to the group. Coach Richard Gaines was unable to attend. Also introduced were the four Mustang captains for 1972: Gary Fischer, Dale Stevens, Rick Hefley and Lewis Britt.

Matter of Urgency

The late J. Edgar Hoover warned of a moral decay which is eroding the foundation of our society:

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




