Connie Farmer Killed In Accident Near Dallas

Funeral services for Miss Constance Delores Farmer, 27, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Farmer of 4219 Clifton, Amarillo, were held Wednesday, August 16 in the Boxwell Brothers Funeral Chapel in Amarillo with interment in the Wheeler Cemetery.

Miss Farmer was dead on arrival at Parkland Hospital in Dallas following an automobile accident. The accident occurred about 2:00 a.m. Monday morning when Miss Farmer, a Dallas-based stewardess for Braniff Airlines, lost control of the small automobile she was driving on the LBJ Freeway in northwest Dallas.

According to Dallas police, the car struck an abutment. Miss Farmer was thrown from the car.

She was a native of New York City and was a graduate of Wheeler High School. She attended West Texas State University in Canyon and Frank Phillips Junior College at Borger.

She had been with Braniff since May 1966 and had been in Dallas for the past year. Before that she had worked in San Francisco for five years with the San Francisco Military Airlift Program, a service for flying soldiers to Vietnam.

She was a member of Bonita Chapter 184 of the Order of the Eastern Star and a member of the First United Methodist Church of Wheeler.

Survivors, besides her parents, include a brother, Lowell Farmer, Jr. of 6059 Ward, Amarillo, and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. P.L. Farmer of Wheeler.

SWEETWATER CREEK DAM TOPIC OF CHAMBER MEETING TUESDAY

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday evening at Nora's Cafe. Topic of discussion was the Sweetwater Creek Dam.

Tom Puryear reported on his work for the past month on the Dam Project. Having discussed the project with a member of the opposition, Mr. Puryear reported the points of objection. If built, the dam would cover some of the best land in the county and take it from the tax rolls. Wheeler is a dry county; with the completion of the dam would come the effort to vote the county wet. The possibility of seepage and the dam breaking.

The opposition maintains an ample supply of water can be obtained with the drilling of a well west of Wheeler; the dam is not needed for this purpose.

Tom Puryear will continue to work on the project with the help of a committee. He will appoint his co-workers.

With the completion of this report, Harrison Hall asked for the floor and delivered a speech expressing his feelings on the project.

Wheeler presently needs water and the need is fast arising in surrounding towns. In years to come the lake will be needed primarily to supplant the underground water supply.

Hall cited Sherrill creek as an example of what happens with the use of underground water. During the time Harrison was 'growing up' the creek ran four inches deep and had a pebble bot-

tom. This creek furnished water for the people in Porter Flats. Today the stream is just a dry creek bed. With the use of underground water, the water table lowered and the springs dried up.

The people of Wheeler can do anything they decide to do. We have a hospital, a school and paving. Probably the hardest fought project in recent years was the paving project; now that it is finished, much of the opposition wishes more streets were paved, Hall stated.

The recreation of the times is boating. With more and more free time people are traveling miles to lakes. Wheeler continually has people moving in, both permanent and temporary, who would like to have recreation.

It is time, continued Hall, for the town to take a stand and put forth the money, time and effort to see this thing through. He can sympathize with the opposition but feels that a few should not stand in the way of progress.

Chamber president, Charlie Brown, expressed his concern over the few people present at the chamber meeting. Business men and the citizens interested in the future of Wheeler should be willing to make these meetings and give a little time for the future of Wheeler. "If we don't do something, who will?"

FOOTBALL WORKOUTS UNDERWAY THIS WEEK

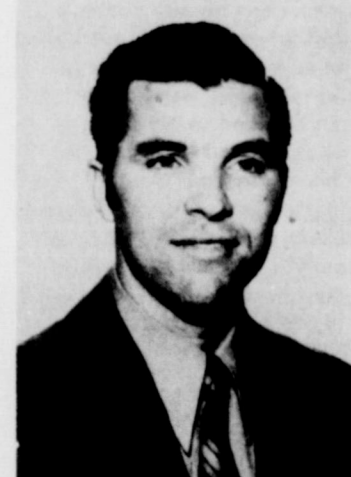

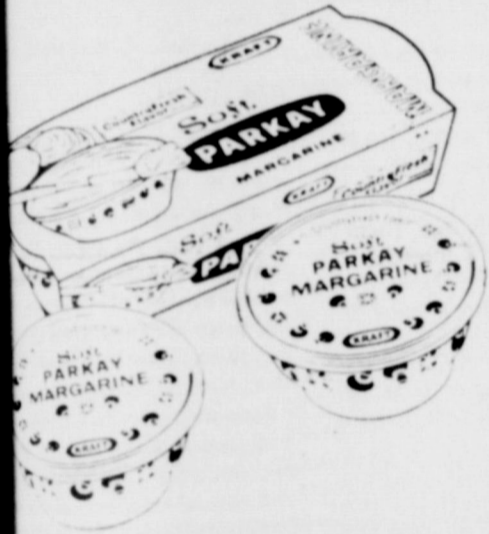
