Slightly later and somewhat taller from Tascase and Scout wheats, its grain yields compare favpraisily with the best adapted wheat varieties. Grain is larger, softer, slightly wrinkled, and high in protein. Test weights overage 50 to 52 sounds.

Fas Gro Brand 385 is adap ted for grain production in Oklahoma, Kansas, Northern Texas and adjacent areas. Resembles rye in appearance at maturity, but grain shows strong gluten. Heads are semi-beardless. A few days later than adapted wheats, it yields comparably. Grain is very nutritious, and has excellent malting characteristics.
