Most ornamentals are susceptible to one or more species of aphd s. Aphids cause loss of plant vigor, stunted growth, deformation of buds and flowers and curling or puckering of

Aphids pierce the plant with their needlelike mouth parts and feed on plant sap. The insects create a sweet sticky substance called honeydew which attracts ants, flies, wasps and lady beetles and provides a medium for mold growth. Infested arborvitaes, pines and other trees drip the honey. dew on sidewalks and

Aphids can be many different colors, including black, green, yellow, pink, red and gray. These pests cluster in large groups on buds, stems, leaves and the bark of willows and arborvitaes.




