Homecoming will be climaxed by the Wheeler-Shamrock football game beginning at 8 o'clock.



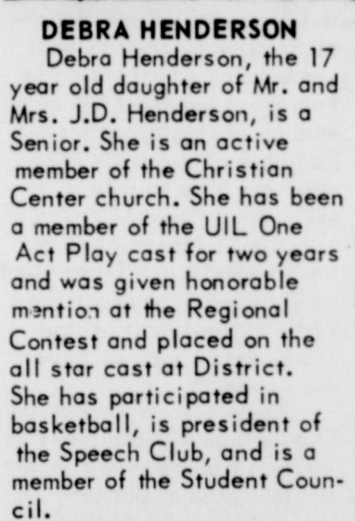
**SALLY BROWN**

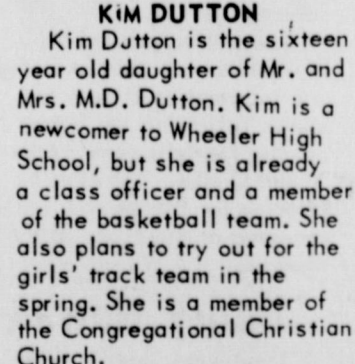
**DEBRA HENDERSON**

## Wildcats Hang 55-0 Rout On Mustangs

Canadian's vaunted Wildcats proved to be all that was said about them and used the wishbone formation to perfection as they ran roughshod over the visiting Wheeler Mustangs last Friday night 55-0 before a near capacity crowd at Wildcat Stadium.

The Wildcats scored the first three times they had the ball and had the Mustangs rocked back on their heels by a 21-0 count at the end of the first quarter and continued to pour it on for a devastating 42-0 margin at halftime.

Canadian found out early in the contest that the Mustangs were vulnerable on the outside pitches off of the wishbone and exploited this throughout the game.

Not only did the Wildcats run freely outside most of the night but they picked out another flaw in the Mustang defenses and rode the good arm of quarterback Ronny Williams for three TD's.

The visiting Mustangs could never seem to find the spark to keep a drive going and penalties at the most inopportune times had their effect.

Just six plays were needed for the Wildcats to travel 58 yards following the opening kickoff for the first touchdown with 41 of the yards being picked up on runs by Kem Carr and David Wilson at the Mustangs right side.

The touchdown was made by Wilson on a 10 yard sweep off his right end. Adcock kicked the extra point and the long night had begun for the Mustangs.

Drives off 87 and 74 yards ended in putting more points on the board for the Wildcats in the first period.

Both touchdowns came via the passing route with a Williams to John Davis completion covering the final 12 yards of the first drive and a 48 yard strike to Sam Schaffer getting the second.

Williams added both extra points by kicking for the quick 21-0 lead.

Williams changed up his receivers again for the next

The 15th Annual Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program will be held Thursday night, September 28 at 7:00 p.m. at the Kelton School. A free barbecue will be served beginning at 7:00 p.m. courtesy of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau and the Wheeler and Shamrock Chambers of Commerce.

"The Economics of Grazing Irrigated Alfalfa" and "A Ton and A Half of Beef to the Acre" plus "The New Ones" will be topics discussed after the barbecue. This part of the program will include the latest research findings on grazing management and in-progress research in Wheeler County.

All farmers, ranchers and businessmen are invited to attend, according to John Daberry, County Program Building Committee Chairman. The President of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Charlie Brown, and the president of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, John Miller, said they were look-

ing forward to expressing their appreciation to the farmers and ranchers in the county and in the trade territory of the two towns. Max Hatter, Wheeler County Extension Agent, who coordinated the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program, encourages those who are planning to attend the free barbecue and program to return their post-cards or give him a call as soon as possible so he will know how many to prepare barbecue for.

The on-the-farm research demonstration program is conducted through the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Duane Scott, Wellington, is Farm Demonstration Assistant Cattle and land for this year's grazing study was furnished by R. J. Smith of Wheeler and N.J. Burkhalter of Shamrock. Some of the fertilizer was supplied by Reneau Seed Co. of Shamrock. Fences, scales, fertilizer and other equipment were supplied by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The purpose of bringing together this type of information is to aid local farmers and ranchers in making management decisions on their farms and ranches. These demonstrations drew interest across the state. Thousands of visitors from surrounding counties and the state of Oklahoma visited the grass research work and the grass observation plot at the Wheeler Gin.

Data on stocking rates, rotation schedules, pounds of beef produced per acre and net profits per acre on this often controversial grass was not available until Wheeler county initiated the work. This year's data will cover work on Common Weeping Lovegrass.

Date this year indicates that Wheeler County has a potential \$4 million dollar increase in net farm income if the countless acres of Common Weeping in the county are managed properly. A veritable "grass land revolution" has taken place in Wheeler County the past several years as more and more communities plow up shinnery oak and weed patches to plant weeping lovegrass. Several producers are carrying an animal unit to the acre on land that was formerly not suited to growing anything.

Delbert Thomas, Agricultural Representative for the Wheeler Production Credit Association, will introduce the speakers. Mike Riethmayer, who is Area Extension Economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will speak on "Grazing Irrigated Alfalfa". The Wheeler County Commissioner's Court will be official greeters for the program. A men's quartet composed of Ernest Henderson, Clois Hanner, Bus Dorman and Hester Dodson, accompanied by Patricia Palmer will provide entertainment during the barbecue.

This is the 15th Annual Program conducted through the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program. The program came about in 1956 when farmers and ranchers meeting with their state representative Grainger McIlhenny, requested that Texas A&M University conduct a program of research and demonstration to solve certain problems peculiar to our area. Interest in the program, which includes the latest research findings of interest to local farm and ranch people has steadily increased over the years.

A question and answer session will be part of the program. A panel composed of the following people will field questions: Bill Brooks, S.C.S. of Wheeler; Dr. Gene Cope, Area Vet., Texas Extension Service; Mike Riethmayer, Area Economist, Texas Ext. Service; N.J. Burkhalter, Cooperator from Shamrock; Duane Scott, Area Farm Demonstration Assistant and Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist, Texas Extension Service

The fumble route gave the Wildcats possession at the midfield stripe as Britt was jarred loose from the ball and Canadian, with the aid of a 15 yard personal foul penalty against Wheeler, racked up touchdown number five in the half three plays later.

Carr swept right end for the final 21 yards and Williams added the extra point.

A short 23 yards was all the Wildcats had to make in their final assault on the Mustang end zone in the first half as the Mustangs coughed up the ball once more on a fumble as Stevens lost the handle.

Carr was the culprit again and rode a wave of clearing blocks to score standing up from the 8 yard line.

The deepest the Mustangs could penetrate Wildcat territory in the first half was to the 26 following a 52 yard runback with a kickoff by Fischer to the Canadian 33. A costly penalty hurt the Mustangs chances to narrow the score and they gave the ball up on downs at the 26.

Wheeler moved the ball a little bit better in the final two quarters but couldn't put it all together for any points.

Glenn Watson broke free off his left guard and raced 64 yards with 7:27 remaining in the third period for the first of two Wildcat touchdowns in the second half.

Kent Ware stepped in front of a Schaffer pass on the Wildcat 45 and returned it to the 5 just before the end of the third quarter but the Mustangs couldn't punch it in and gave up the ball at the 1 to halt the deepest threat of the night for Wheeler.

Canadian used an 11 play, 74 yard drive for their final touchdown and stayed on the ground for the distance with Wilson punching it over from the one.

Dale Helton broke through and blocked the extra point try to leave the final score at 55-0.

### PP&K Schedules Competition Sat.

Local boys, ages eight through 13, will be blowing the dust off their footballs and loosening up their throwing arms soon for the 1972 Punt, Pass and Kick Competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be co-sponsored by the Lions Club in conjunction with Pete Burton Ford.

Nationally PP&K, now in its 12th year, is co-sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted over 8 million boys, ages eight through 13, and participation this year is expected to top the 1,100,000 mark.

Participants in the Punt, Pass and Kick program compete only against boys their own age. Any boy eight through 13 years of age may register to compete at a participating Ford Dealer.

There is no entrance fee and no body contact during competition. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a boy's amateur standing.

Scoring is based on accuracy and range with one point added for every foot of punting, passing and kicking distance and a point subtracted for every foot off a center line.

Twelve national finalists will compete for the National championship in their age group during the half time of the Pro Bowl Game in Dallas, Texas, January 21, 1973. Winners will have their names permanently enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Their trophies will be presented by Football Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Boys may register at Pete Burton Ford or at the football field before the competition begins.

Competition will be held at the Wheeler Football field at 9:30 A.M. Saturday Sept. 30. Coach Bateman and staff will help conduct the competition.

If you're searching for a "something extra" trim, try making some flowers out of rickrack. Cut off five complete "zig-zag". Join five points with a running stitch and draw up thread. Five pointed flowers will form. Sew center to garment with bead trim. Tack ends under and bind stitch edge.

 lemon juice  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup sifted flour  
 Cinnamon  
 salt

# Across the Fence

Don't miss the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program and barbecue this Thursday night, September 28 at the Kelton school at 7:00 p.m. A lot of the program content concerns research work done right here in Wheeler Co. Several thousand people from all over the area have visited the research plots and seen what you folks are doing here in the way of grassland management. George Williams, Raymond Whitten, Melvin Shirgley and Howard Johnson, all of Hall county, came up last week to see the grass and the fine job you folks are doing with it. They report that folks there are now coming to the

place where they are looking for a way to increase farm income. My good friend Bonnie Hoosier, who is county agent in Hall County, brought a bussload of USDA people the first part of the week to look at our grass. They seemed to be well impressed with the grassland work here. Quite a lot of folks from surrounding counties are now looking at us like we know what we are doing. Several hundred farmers and ranchers in the Wheeler County area are making plans to attend the program. The barbecue and program are sponsored by the Wheeler County Farm Bureau and the Wheeler and Shamrock Chambers of Commerce.

A bumper cotton crop is being produced in Central Texas, according to a letter from my Dad. He reports cotton trailers bumper to bumper in my home town. There is a strong possibility that a lot of our cotton here will go into the loan when our crop comes off as this seems to be the trend setting in. Folks down at Paducah are reporting an all time good cotton crop as well as in the south plains.

Caladium tubers should be dug, cured and stored before frost. Dig the tubers up without removing the leaves. Wash the tubers with a hose to remove soil and debris. Place the tubers in a basket, slatted tray or other container allowing good air circulation. Allow to cure in a dry, well ventilated area. In about 2 weeks remove the dry foliage and store tubers in dry sand, perlite, peatmoss or vermiculite. Place some of the materials between each layer of tubers. Store tubers indoors at 60° F. until spring planting time.

Zone 4 residents of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, in the Mobeetie area, have an election date to keep on October 12. This election is very important and we urge all eligible voters to cast their ballots. A farmer or rancher in Zone 4 of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District will be elected who will serve as their Director and representative on the Soil and Water Conservation District Board for the next five years.

You are eligible to vote if you are over 21, own land in Zone 4, or if you are the wife of a landowner. Soil and water conservation districts are sub-divisions of the State of Texas and by law are charged with the responsibility of carrying out a soil and water conservation program in their district. Through them such items as technical service, leadership, in small watershed projects and many other services are provided to cooperating landowners.

The election will be held at the Mobeetie School on October 12 at 8:00 p.m.

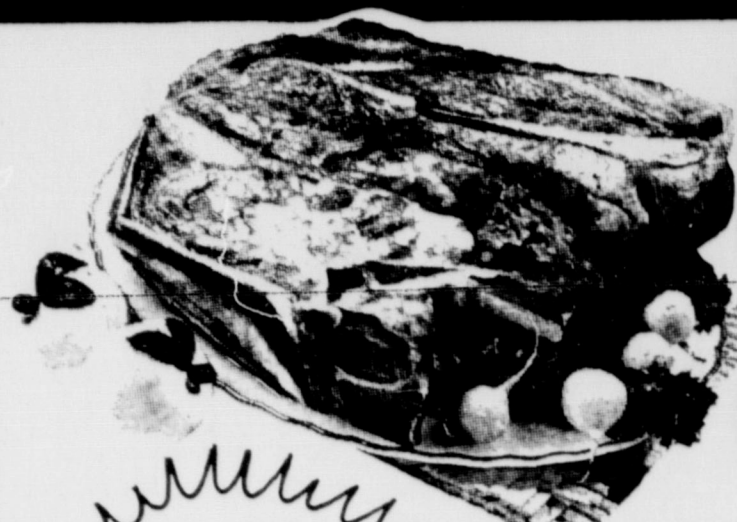
