"Yould You Believe "Popsorghum?

In tests at Texas A&M University, steers receiving a ration of popped grain sorghum gained more effic ently then those fed a ration of rolled grain sorghum. Animals receiving the popp ed grain required only 5.5 pounds of feed to make a pound of grain, while the others needed 6.9 pounds for a pound of gain, reportes K. Riggs of the Animal Science Department at Texas A&M University.

Steers receiving theor nary grain sorghum ration gained an average of 3.1 bounds a day for 94 days on feed, while the animals getting thepopped grain sor ghum gained at a lower rate of 2.7 pounds a day. Because of the smaller amount of grain needed per pound of gain, it cost a little less to out the same amount of gain on the animals with a ration of popped grain.

The sorghum grain was popped in a gas-fired infrared burner and then dry rolled. As in the case of popcom, not all of the grain sorghum popped. Steers fed the "normal run" (which consisted of both popped and unpopped grain) showed the greatest efficiency. Animals fed a 100 percent popped ration were next in efficiency, foll owed by those fed partially popped and unpopped grain. The lowest efficiency was

attained by animals receivng theoriginal grain which simply had been rolled.

Christmas Idea: The beauty of a fire in a fireplace durng the up coming Holiday season, can be made even prettier with the addition of


multi-colored flames. Chemical treatment of the material to be burned can result in green, red, blue orange or purple flames instead of the usual yellow flame from wood.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, cupper chlorideblue, potassium chloridepurple, strontium nitrate-red, lithium chloride -carmine, and copper sulfate--emera; green. Dry pine cones, smal chips or blocks of weed can be soaked in these chemical for multi-colored flames. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or drugstores.

To treat the conesor wood, a plastic pail and an onion sack are needed. The conesor chips areplaced in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted so that all of the material is completely covered and the cones and wood should soak for at least 10 minutes.

After soaking place the treated material on newspapers to dry and then they will be ready to brighten the holiday fireplace.

With the rising cost of wood, newspapers can be turned into "logs" which will burn with a rainbow of color. Simply tie the loosely rolled newspapers with heav twine and soak them in a olution of four pounds of copper sulfate and three pounds of rock salt dissolved in a gallon of water. After

The real danger of including the artifically sweetened drink in the diet is that of excluding other foods from the diet. The dietor who excluded all food and drink except the artifical sweetened ones has no source of energy except hisown reserve. (Using this reserve does not necessarily remove the pounds - but does remove

strenath.) It is good for us to remember that sugar is not the only source of calories. Being a corbohydrate the sugar is burned or used up faster by the body than the fats; therefore leaving less calories to add pounds. Also fats have more than twice the number of calories as carbohydrates. The person who uses artificial sweetners in coffee so that he may indulge in extra rich desert will continue to fight the 'battle of

the bulge.' So to really loose pounds concentrate on the fats, too.

Because the use of artificial sweeteners seem to fill the psychological need that we are trying to do something about our weight, we will all continue to use it

Here is a recipe in which artificial sweetner is used. Chocolate Freeze

Calories in serving: 75 1. In a small saucepan dissolve 6 saccharin tablets in peaks. in 2 T. lemon juice; 4 cup cold water.

2. Add and let stand 5 minutes, 1 tsp. unflavored gelatin; 3 T. cocoa.

3. Cook and stir over low heat until mixture is smooth and gelatin is dissolved.

4. Remove from heat and stir in 1 tsp. vanilla.

5. Cool until your hand can be comfortably held on

the bottom of pan. 6. In a quart bowl sprinkle 2 cup nonfat dry skim milk

over 2 cup water 7. Beat with rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until mixture stands

8. Slowly beat in cool cocoa mixture. Pour into quart refrigerator ice trays. Freeze, without stirring ,until firm. Makes 4 servings.

Over 910 rural Texas famlies isolated in poverty were given a chance to break their economic barriers with economic opportunity loans in fiscal 1967, according to John L. Manning, Farmers Home Administration County supervisor.

County Supervisor Mann ing reported on progress of a lending program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Admini stration for the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity. The past fiscal

year, ending June 30, saw 797 loans totaling \$1,479, 159 made to rural individual fam-

group to provide tools, supplies, and working spacethey need in order to earn a better income

Another 114 families, members of rural cooperatives, benefited from the 17 loans advanced to groups in fiscal 1967 by the Farmers Home Admini stration. Loans totaling \$231, 170 were used to develop new cooperatives or improve existing organizations ranging in membership from 3 to 58 families,

Since the start of the EO loan program in January 1965, over \$3.9 million in individual loans have gone to 2,296 rural families and more than \$335, 620 in group loans have been advanced to 29 cooperatives involving about 1,067 rural families.

Mr. Manning pointed out that individual economic opportunity loan borrowers are following over 27 different kinds of no nagricultural enterprises, in addition to farming as a result of the helping hand extended them through the program. Individual loans average \$1, 732 a family with a maximum of \$3,500 in effect.

Under the program, cooperatives, unlike individual families, are not limited in the amount of financial assistance they receive, but in fiscal 1967 group loans averaged \$13.598. Through the cooperative, low-income people gain the use of equipment or facilities they cannot afford individually.

Opportunity loans are doing a tremendous jon, " Mr. Manning said, "in helping low-income rural people overcome their most common handicap -- a lack of money or credit to equip themselves for

"Theloans stake them to the things they need for a profitable farming enterprise or to increase their income by following a trade or performing a service needed in their home communities.

Mr. Manning said cooperatives formed under theprogram operate farm machinery or provide supplies, markets and work centers for the bene

fit of low-income rural people. Both cooperative and individual economic opportunity loans are made through 139 FHA local offices serving all rural counties in

Texas. Information concern

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

Checks pour through our banking system at the fantastic rate of 17,000,000 per business day. Considering this figure, the process works with remarkable smooth-

But every so often, into this vast machinery, someone drops a small monkey wrench. Like a bad check. What are the legal consequences?

For one thing, you are committing a crime if you buy something with a check that you know is bad. The essence of the crime is the obtaining of merchandise by false pretenses. For, by handing over the check, you are implying-falselythat you believe the check is good. But intent is a crucial point. Sup-



of an innocent mistake you made in keeping your checkbook. Then, with no intent to defraud, you would not have committed a crimi-

Likewise, in most cases, it is not a crime to give a post-dated check that eventually turns out to be bad. At the time you gave the check you may well have had an honest expectation that it would be good when the due date arrived.

What if your check bounces not because of insufficient funds but because of a clerical error by the bank? Assuming this casts a reflection on your honesty, would you have a right to collect damages from the bank?

Ordinarily, yes. A check is your instruction to the bank to pay certain sum out of your account. If the bank negligently fails to follow your instructions, it may be held liable for the consequences.

However, it may be difficult for you-as a private individual-to prove that you suffered any measurable harm. Bouncing a business check may really hurt the company's credit rating, but bouncing a personal check usually causes nothing worse than a few moments of embarrassment.


Nor can you blame the bank for rejecting a check which you yourself made out wrong.

In one case, a man complained that his check was bounced "even though I had plenty of money in the bank." But it turned out that his money was in a savings, not a checking, account-hence was not subject to withdrawal by check at Denying his claim for damages,
