

ACROSS THE FENCE By Max harrer, WCAG

Our cot ton crop looks better than we thought it was. Happened to see Stacey Arnold east of Shamrock beginning to gather his crop this past week. He figured he could make his lint average or better this year.

Dwarf Maize Mosaic Virus may be a real threat to our maize growers next year says Doctor Robert Berry, area Plant Di sea se Control Specialist from Lubbock. Bob Metzer, our area agronomist, thinks the best solution is to grow those varieties that are tolerant to the virus. They have completed a survey of variety trials in the Plains region noting varieties not as to lerant to the virus.

Enjoyed presenting the program to the Wheeler Garden Club at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Farmer Hefley last week. We showed slides of insects that bother ornamental plants in our county. We have a brochure available in our office in Wheeler listing control measures suggested

for these insects. Gardening: Gardeners who want to get a good start for spring planting may want to spade the ground now. A rough surface on the ground will bet maximum benefit of winter frost. Raking up diseased or dead vegetables to burn is a good idea this time of year. Just piling diseased plants in the corner of the garden is a bad practice. Those plant diseases will

me back with us next spring.

We're experiencing a fantastic expansion of the cattle feeding business on the high plains. A surplus of maize, plenty of cattle, good climate and closeness to a market, makes the expansion on a pretty sound basis. Lot of cattlemen took a dim view toward the cutting back production talk at the Texas Cattle feeders Ass'n in Amarillo last week. Feelings are among many is that losing the market to fish, chicken andpork will be a lot easier than getting it back. We suggest taking the positive approach and go to market with that 5 to 10% of our cattle that aren't getting the bale out anyway and concentrate on getting more pounds of wuality beef from every ranch we have.

Wheat: Seems like glot of wheat farmers disgusted with prices, plant to graze their wheat out this year. Those who plan to do this may want to consider certain management practices important to grazing wheat. Early maturing varieties like Triumph should have cattle taken off by March 1. Mid-season varieties like Tascosa should have stockers off by March 15. Remember that the amount of grazing taken off doesn't affect grain yields, but the length of the grazing period does. Some of the Experiment Station personnel at Bushland believe that in some cases, pasture value

of winter wheat is so high

that farmers might profitably graze out without taking a grain crop.

Folks in Wheeler County should be wary of a new wheat variety, Red River 68, which has filtered it's way into the Hi gh Plains of Texas.

Rex River 68 is a dwarf spring-type wheat which will probably will not survive the winter here. It's our understanding that drought, heat and disease will also keep this type of wheat from performing well if spring planted. The Crop Quality Council headquarters at Minneapolis, Mi nnesota, which evaluates spring wheats has reported that Red River 68 is not acceptable in milling and baking quality.

So we don't recommend the use of Red River 68 as well as any other new varieties that are not adapted or have not been adequately tested in this area of the

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
