## MUSTANGS PLUCK SILVERTON OWLS 27-0

### DEATH CLAIMS DR. G. R. WALKER

Funeral services were held Saturday, October 14, 1967, at the First Methodist Church in Wheeler for Dr. Glenn R. Walker, M.D.  
Rev. Wilber Gaede officiated with Bro. Ronnie Clayton assisting.  
Burial was in Wheeler cemetery under the direction of Wright-Denson Funeral Home.  
Pall bearers were Joe Rogers, Harrison Hall, R. J. Holt, Grainger McIlhenny, Ocie and Al Thomas.  
Honorary pallbearers were Reid, Cliff Weatherly, Britt, Carl Lafin, D.O., Harlan, Harold Kenady, Leonard, Harold Hill and Tom.

Dr. Walker graduated from Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. He taught there for one year and then graduated from the University of Tennessee Medical School. He interned at Shreveport, La. Charity Hospital.  
He moved to Mobeetie from Austin in 1929 and set up practice there. In 1936 he moved to Wheeler to begin practice. He was a partner with Dr. Harold E. Nicholson in building Wheeler Hospital.  
In 1945, Dr. Walker built his own private clinic. He was the anesthetist for Shamrock General Hospital for several years and practiced in Wheeler until eight months ago.  
He was a World War II veteran and was a member of the Methodist Church, Masonic Lodge, American Legion, American Medical Ass'n., Texas Medical Ass'n., and the Greenbelt Medical Ass'n.  
Surviving is his wife, Elise W. T. Walker of Gallatin, Tenn. Dr. Walker was preceded in death by his father and one brother.

Don't bury the Mustangs yet! After suffering two straight defeats, the Wheeler Mustangs came back to play perhaps their finest game of the year and thoroughly whipped the Silverton Owls 27-0 last Friday night.  
Scoring the first three times they had the ball was convincing enough and the Mustangs held the three touchdown margin at half-time. The Mustangs concluded their scoring in the third quarter and the win was even bigger when it was learned that the district favorite, the Claude Mustangs, had fallen in an upset to the McLean Tigers.  
Silverton started out like they might make the Mustangs their victims as they drove to the Wheeler 33 but they lost the ball on downs that proved to be their deepest penetration until they got to the Mustang 2 late in the game.  
Moving the 67 yards in 13 plays for the first score, the Mustangs stayed on the ground except for an 8 yard pass play from Ware to Rives. Bobby Ware got the TD as he sneaked over from the one. The attempted pass for the two point conversion failed and 50 second remained in the first quarter when the Mustangs kicked off.  
Wheeler had to move 63 yards for their next journey to paydirt. Only eight plays were needed with 47 big yards being gobbled up in two passes from Ware to Frankie Rogers. Rogers circled right end from four yards out with Fred Goad throwing a key block. Goad split the uprights and there was no doubt as to the better team on this night.  
The Mustangs defensive line kept the pressure on the Owls all night and a lot of the credit for the Mustangs success should go to the unsung heroes in the forward wall.  
Behind two touchdowns the Owls gambled on fourth down and lost at their 48 and the Mustangs were off again. Staying on the ground the gold clad Mustangs wore the Owl tackles and flanks out with Goad slamming over

from the one for the TD. Goad got his second of three conversion kicks to give the Mustangs their big lead at halftime.  
Wheeler threatened once in the third period before scoring their final tally of the game but were forced to try a field goal which was blocked.  
Frankie Rogers got the final touchdown as he went over untouched from 16 yards out behind beautiful blocking by the Mustangs left side of the line. Goad was true with the kick and the score rose to 27-0 where it remained to the final whistle.  
A 71 yard pass and lateral play gave the visiting Owls their big chance in the fourth quarter but the Mustangs rose to the occasion and kept their goal line uncrossed. Having a first down on the 8, the Owls managed to get to the 2 but on 4th down Arnold was thrown for a loss of 2 and the Mustangs took over. Wheeler had to punt from the 11 on the last play of the game and for all concerned the Mustangs had shown that they could get up off the floor after being defeated.

The cost of the Chamber's share of the cost of the noon meal for the Wheeler County Crops tour was reported. The Chamber's share for this year was \$96.00. County Agent Max Hatter sent word that the number of people taking the tour was increased over last year's attendance.  
The forms which will be used to mold concrete picnic tables for the park have been ordered. According to James Verden, chairman of the Park Improvement Committee, the cost of the forms will be \$150.00. The forms are being made by A&K Welding. Wheeler Redi-mix will furnish the concrete for the tables.  
The Board of Directors for Parkview Hospital asked the Chamber's help in obtaining another doctor for the Wheeler area. The organization voted to purchase advertising in the Medical Journal to publicize the excellent facilities and opportunity offered in Wheeler.  
A short meeting was held following the Chamber meeting to discuss the Christmas promotion for Wheeler. No definite plans were made, with several suggestions being mentioned. Garland Abemethy is chairman of the Merchants Committee.

The councilmen voted to ask the Southwestern Public Service to install a street light in the middle of the block in front of Parkview Hospital. Lights have been installed at the corner of Sweetwater and Ninth and Sweetwater and Tenth.  
City Employees will soon be roping off three blocks of the Wheeler business district to clean up the trash which is piled along the sidewalks. Blocks to be "roped off" and cleaned are the 400 and 500 blocks of Main Street and the 100 block of East Texas.  
The "city fathers" moved their meeting time up to 7:30 p.m. for the coming winter months.

### Texas State Historical Meeting

Mrs. Grady W. Harris, chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee as well as all members of the county committee have been invited to represent their county at the 1967 Annual Meeting of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the Texas Historical Foundation, its private affiliate.  
The meeting will be held at the Moody Convention Center in Galveston, October 26 and 28. The joint membership of the two organizations totals more than 3,000 members in 254 county committees.  
The county committees will be competing for several annual awards at the meeting. These include "Best Committee Newsletter", "Best Program of Work for 1967", "Best Historical Scrapbook" and "Best Publication of Local or Regional History." Awards will also be presented for the "Best Chairman of a County Historical Survey Committee" and the "Best Sub-Committee Chairman of a County Historical Survey Committee."  
In addition to the awards, a versatile and informative program has been drawn up featuring noted speakers in the historical field as well

as related areas of endeavor.  
Keynote speaker for the meeting will be Ernest Allen Connally, Chief of the Office of Archaeology and Historical Preservation of the United States Department of the Interior, National Park Service. Connally will address the Annual RAMPS Banquet on Oct. 7, at 7:00 p.m.  
Topics to be covered at the meeting include "Authentic Reproductions in Texas", "Texas Travel Trails and "A Comprehensive Museum Program."  
Participants will hear progress reports from the Institute of Texan Cultures; the State Building Commission on the state's archaeological work; and from the Parks and Wildlife Department on their Land and Historic Sites Acquisition Program as well as restoration of six historical Texas forts.  
There will also be scenic and historical tours of Galveston and the surrounding island. The group will visit Sea-Arama, NASA, San Jacinto Battleground and attend a complimentary Luau.

### Prairie Chicken Hunt 373 BIRDS KILLED IN HUNT

The first Prairie Chicken season in thirty years was deemed a success by Dick DeArment, wildlife biologist for the Panhandle district. The total kill for the three county area was 373 birds. The majority of the kill was turned in Saturday of the two day season.  
World renowned authorities of Prairie Chicken and Grouse, Drs. Fred and Frances Hamerstrom of Plainfield, Wis., were present and helping the biologists identify the birds shot. Department personnel collected the crops of the dead birds in order to further study the food habits of prairie chickens. Shinn-ook and acorns were found to be the main source of food.  
Approximately 18 game wardens patrolled the three county area to check on hunters and their kill. There were three check points located in this area. They check points were at Higgins, Allison and Wheeler.  
Mr. DeArment was not able to say whether or not this would be an annual event. This will be determined by the number of birds still inhabiting the area.  
People interested in having hunters on their property this coming year, provided there is a season, are asked to contact the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The property owner was free to set the charge for each hunter on his property.

**Veterans Adm. News**

**Veterans Insurance Expires**

Veterans of Vietnam and all servicemen recently separated from active duty are reminded by Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office of the right to apply for an individual life insurance policy within 120 days after separation from service.

More than 99 percent of the servicemen participate in the Servicemen's Group Life Insurance program and are eligible to convert to private insurance when they are discharged, Coker added. Veterans are covered by the group policy for 120 days after separation, without further payment of premiums.

During the 120-day post-separation period any insured veteran may apply for an individual life insurance policy from any of the 540 participating insurance companies without taking a physical examination, the Manager said.

Because they are no longer paying premiums many returning veterans forget about their life insurance and fail to apply for individual insurance policies until after the 120-day period has expired, Coker said.

These veterans lose the advantage of becoming insured without a physical examination and, if they have a disability, may not be able to obtain private insurance at standard rates, the Manager cautioned.

Veterans who plan to take flight training under the new G.I. Bill benefit were cautioned today to check carefully into their eligibility before committing themselves for flight lessons.

Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration

Regional Office in Waco said that Public Law 90-77, recently signed by the President authorizes flight training at approved flying schools only for veterans who have a private flying license or who have satisfactorily completed the required flying and ground school instruction for a private license.

Veterans with at least 181 days military service, part of it after January 31, 1955, are eligible for the new education and training benefits at the rate of one month of training for each month of service up to a maximum of 36 months, Coker said.

Allowances range from \$130 per month for single veterans in full time programs to \$175 for those with two dependents plus \$10 per month for each additional dependent.

Unlike ordinary classroom studym flight training allowances are based on cost. VA pays 90% of the ordinary costs of the training up to the limit of a veteran's total eligibility for educational assistance.

For each \$130 a veteran receives for flight training assistance, his eligibility is charged one month.

Flight school courses must be approved by both the Federal Aviation Administration and the appropriate State authority, the VA Manager said.

Full information is available at all VA offices. Veterans who write to inquire about personal eligibility should include their VA file number if they have applied previously for VA benefits.

More than a year ago, the water authority board hired Marvin D. Springer and Associates, a Dallas city planning firm, to plan recreation and further development for the lake.

"In general, what we anticipate are maximum facilities for intense recreational use by the public," said Dr. George Smith, president of the Donley County Industrial Foundation. "We anticipate everything the public would like to have from trash cans to marinas to trailer camping areas."

But, that's not all. Public beaches are in the plan, as well as swimming pools, riding stables, bridle paths and camp sites.

Yesterday's plans are already a reality at the lake. Only four miles north of Clarendon, the lake is nearly half full. With a maximum depth of 88 feet of water, the static level lake now has a depth of about 37 feet.

That 37 feet of water has accumulated behind the mile-long dam almost without the aid of pumps.

Just northwest of the proposed country club and golf course site is a development which puts a smile on the faces of civic leaders of Clarendon, a small town of about 2,200, which, according to Smith and H. M. (Flip) Breedlove, president of the chamber of commerce, is losing population.

Not long ago, a south Texas firm, Sherwood Shores, bought up 700 acres of land adjoining the lake site, just across Carrol Creek from the Old Clarendon townsite, abandoned in 1886 when the railroad came through.

Sherwood Shores is a development company, and it has already started clearing the land and selling plots.

About 4,000 house sites, ranging in price from \$795 on up, are available, said Walter Ligon, general manager of the firm.

Road building equipment is already cutting streets for the new town, and 14 sites have been sold.

A good part of Sherwood Shores property is water or will be water when the lake reaches capacity. The land is split by breaks, and rolls endlessly.

Carrol Creek runs right through the property.

"And, it all makes for a good view, Ligon says.

"We can tier the lots so that everybody who isn't right on the water, can see the water," Ligon said. "We will utilize the terrain for the best possible view."

The view isn't all that would make living on Sherwood Shores property worthwhile.

The company will provide all utilities plus boat landing facilities, swimming pools, a community house and a security guard.

Persons who build homes in Sherwood Shores will be restricted, but not prohibited,

Ligon said, on type of construction. They will be required to meet the minimum, but will be given much leeway in their building.

On the Old Clarendon they're going to build a recreation area, with picnic tables and maybe a pool.

And the company will give the shoreline on its property to the fishermen.

Ligon is optimistic about the land and the possibilities created by the Greenbelt. He sees a lot of money to be made a lot to be done.

He probably isn't, however, excited about the lake and acid of rain. Several spring creeks including the large Carrol Creek, empty into the lake.

The dam itself, more than years in the planning, is sprung into being and serves two of the authorized five member cities — Clarendon and Quanah — with much needed water.

Within about 60 days Clarendon is expected to begin taking water from the lake, and Crowell, Memphis and Hedrick should follow suit shortly.

But, now that the authority assured of a good future water supply, interested parties have turned their interests to recreation angle.

And, they are going after full steam.

Taking into consideration various recreation possibilities which Springer proposes, the board of the Clarendon County Club has decided, with member approval, to build a new club overlooking the lake with a championship 18-hole golf course.

The directors have entered into an agreement with Greenbelt authority to finance and construct the course. The lake is to provide the water and water for the course maintenance.

An Amarillo architect has been hired to plan the course plus other club related facilities including swimming pools, tennis courts, club building and boat docks.

The golf course will be just east of the lake.

The clubhouse is to overlook the lake, with water on its sides.

Smith said, if everything goes as planned, the club and its course will be finished by summer.

Of course, other recreation possibilities are obvious at the lake, which, when filled, capacity, is expected to have a surface area of about 2,000 acres with a 34-mile shoreline. It will be six miles long.

Fishing the lake, with its dreds of natural cover and harbors, will be an anglers dream.

Last spring the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked the lake with 140,000 northern pike. The pike, 14 inches long, had reached length of 19 inches. They're still growing — 240,000 bass were also put in lake. They are now between 10 and 12 inches long.

The department added 20 channel cat, 10,000 blue cat, 20,000 hybrid sun fish.

Right now, however, the lake is closed to fishing. It's too hot to boat. The lake, says, isn't big enough yet.

Springer proposes in his small plane airfield and large motor hotel. But, they are not yet in the overall picture.

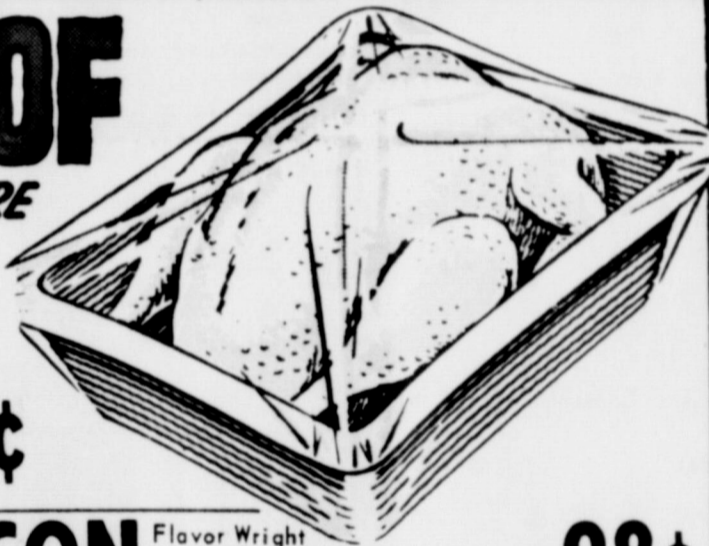

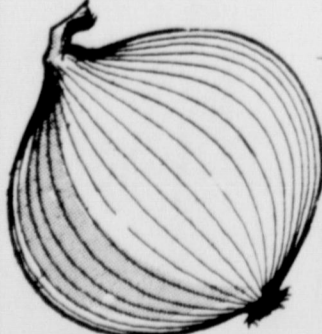

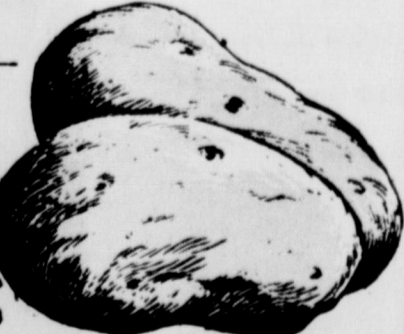

## ACROSS THE FENCE

**Brucellosis:** Wheeler County is showing up real well at the markets as far as back tagging is concerned and chances are good we won't have to be retested if our percentage of reactors keeps running as low as it has, according to Dr. Lindsey with the Texas Animal Health Commission.

**Freeze Branding:** Grady Harris, Wheeler, is sold on freeze branding. So are a lot of other ranchers who see this type of identifying cattle with a permanent brand as a better way. Not all freeze branding has produced legible results, however. Unsatisfactory results, we understand, can be contributed to (1) a poor job of clipping (2) failure to saturate the brand area with alcohol immediately before the iron is applied (3) failure to apply the iron with firm enough pressure (4) not holding the iron on the hide long enough and (5) the possibility that freeze branding may be more successful if done at certain times of the year. Sheep's head clippers to clip the area to be branded and the clipping with regular clippers will save numerous sets of blades. So if you try freeze branding, check your technique and make sure you have all the materials, methods and timing necessary to give best results.

**Prussic Acid Poisoning:** We've been getting questions and calls on the dangers of poisoning of cattle from grazing Johnson grass and sorghums following frost. There definitely is a danger and something we need to be aware of as light frosts have already come our way. Frosted Johnson grass shouldn't be grazed until it's completely dry. For some reason, certain chemical changes occur in frost wilted plants that are responsible for the prussic acid development. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether or not a poisoned animal can be saved generally depends upon how quickly a veterinarian can be consulted.

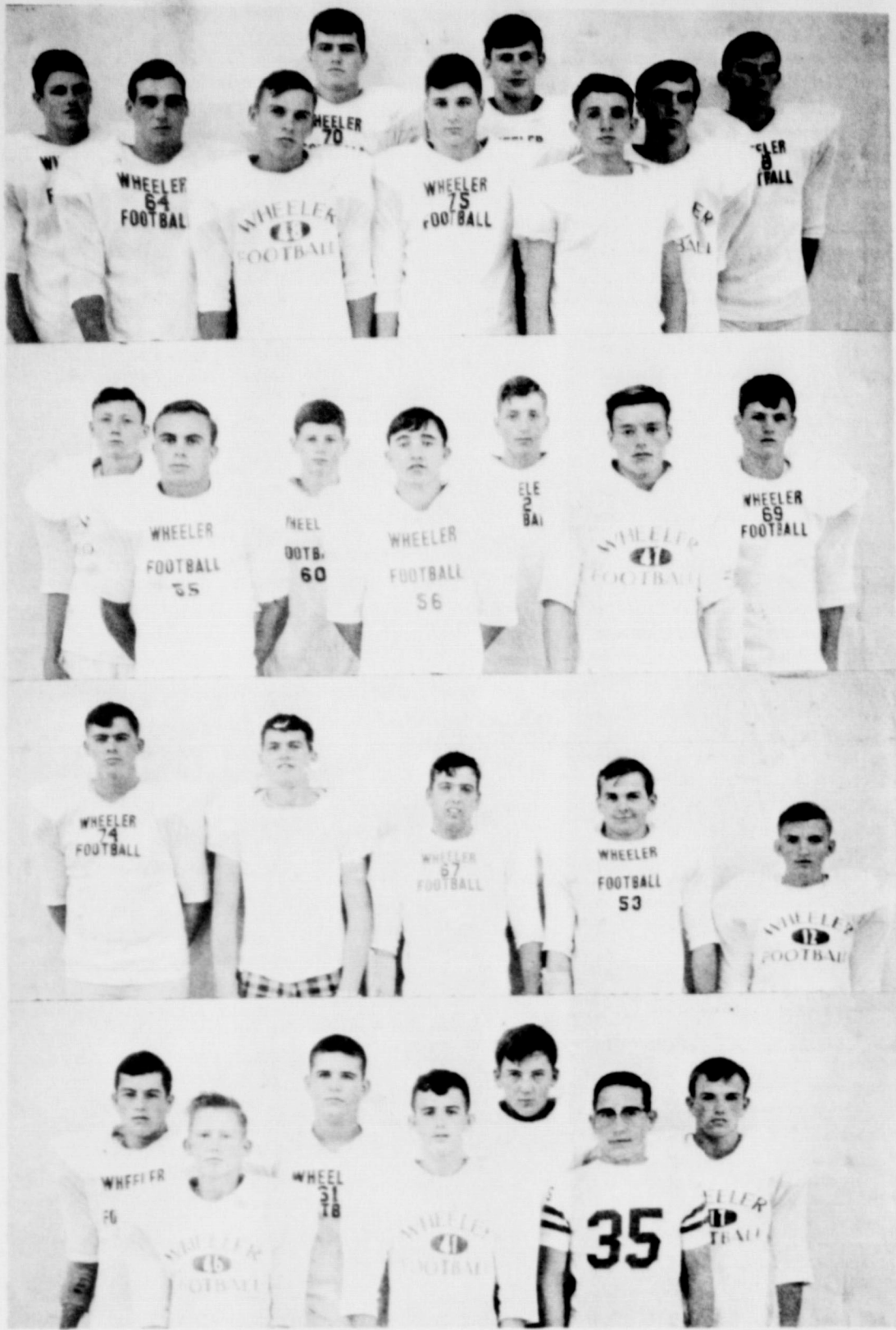
